To His Honour

The Lieutenant-Governor in Council: *Res. No 2070/59* *See 718/48; 438/50*

The undersigned has the honour to RECOMMEND THAT, pursuant to subsection (5) of Section 14 of the "Mineral Act" as enacted by Chapter 28 of the Statutes of British Columbia, 1944, a reservation be placed upon all minerals in the following lands, namely, All and singular those lands and premises in the Lillooet Mining Division lying along the valley of Bridge River and along the valleys of the tributaries to the said Bridge River:

(a) Bounded by and below the 2157-foot contour of elevation from a point on the said Bridge River known as No. 1 Dam site, six and three-quarters miles above the junction of the Yalakom River with the said Bridge River, westerly to the junction of the Hurley River with the said Bridge River, and

(b) Bounded by and below the 2460-foot contour of elevation from a point on the said Bridge River known as Lajoie Falls, above the junction of the Hurley River with the said Bridge River, westerly to a point where the said Bridge River crosses the said 2460-foot contour.

AND THAT the undersigned Minister of Mines do sign an order to that effect, and that notice of the said order be published in one issue of the Gazette.
