TAKE NOTICE THAT:

1. (a) Any peace officer, including any R.C.M.P. officer, having jurisdiction in the Province of British Columbia who finds the party NAME(S) OF PARTY(S) _____ breaching any of the terms of this order may immediately arrest that party **without warrant** pursuant to s. 495(1)(b) of the *Criminal Code*, and may cause that person to be detained in custody and to be taken before a justice to be dealt with according to law.

(b) Any peace officer, including any R.C.M.P. officer, having jurisdiction in the Province of British Columbia who on reasonable and probable grounds believes that the party NAME(S) OF PARTY(S) _____ has, in the past, breached any of the terms of a restraining order made under s.56(3)(c) of the *Adult Guardianship Act* may arrest that party **with a warrant** obtained pursuant to s. 26 of the *Offence Act*, and may cause that person to be detained in custody and to be taken before a justice to be dealt with according to law.
