

Current spill response regime model







Area Response Plans in a 3 Tier Planning system



Area Response Plans – Vision

- Opportunity for interested groups to collaborate at regional and provincial scales
- Plans will provide confidence in spill regime
- Plans will be catalyst for continuous improvement



What are Area Response Plans?

- For large geographic areas
- Plan for response anywhere in the plan area
- Range of hazardous materials & sensitive environments
- Rely largely on existing information

Area Response Plans - Requirements

- Spill response procedures and strategies
- Form, Content, Notification and Publication
- Plan must be reviewed, updated, tested and Republished



Area Response Plans - Content

- Spill hazard sources
- Potentially affected areas & their sensitivities
- Preparedness & response actions
- Resources and personnel needed to respond
- Success factors



Consultation Provisions

- Provincial oversight ARP approval
- Authors must consult interested persons
- Authors must establish an advisory committee and reimburse committee members




Government oversees the PRO.



The Certified PRO

- "promptly and capably deal with spills and the impacts of spills within [an] area including having the necessary equipment and resources to personnel and other resources and
- Perform prescribed duties given to a regulated person or a PRO."







- Will it be housed in 1 place or many?




Possible PRO Response Functions


