#### INTRODUCTION

This inquest into the death of Ian Geoffrey Bush commenced at 0930 hours on May 22, 2007, at Houston, BC, and continued on May 23-25 and July 3-6, 2007. Mr. Mitch Houg was counsel to the coroner and Ms. Helen Roberts appeared on behalf of the Attorney General of Canada (representing the RCMP). Mr. Douglas Eastwood appeared on behalf of the Province of British Columbia. Mr. Howard Rubin appeared on behalf of the Bush family. 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#### PRESIDING CORONER'S COMMENTS

The following is a brief synopsis of the issues reviewed during the inquest. The purpose of these comments is to assist the reader to more fully understand the Verdict and Recommendations of the jury. It is not intended to be considered evidence nor is it intended in any way to replace the jury's verdict.

On October 29, 2005, Mr. Ian Geoffrey Bush made plans with friends to attend the opening game of the Houston Luckies hockey season. Prior to the start of the game, Mr. Bush and his friends attended the residence of an acquaintance that lived in an apartment across from the arena. They had planned to stay there and have a couple of drinks prior to walking to the arena for the start of the hockey game. Witnesses reported that Mr. Bush was not drinking much at the apartment as he had complained of heartburn and not feeling well.

The group of friends attended the arena to watch the first period of the game prior to returning to the apartment for some more drinks at the first intermission. Again, witnesses reported that Mr. Bush complained of heartburn and was not seen drinking like the rest of the group.

Mr. Bush and his friends returned to the arena for the second period of the hockey game. At the second intermission, they were asked not to go back into the apartment as there had been a complaint about the amount of people during the first intermission. A member of the group went to the apartment and brought back the alcohol that they had been storing in the residence during the game.

At approximately 2100 hours on October 29, 2005, Constable Paul Koester and Corporal Derek Donovan started doing a foot patrol around the arena during the Houston Luckies hockey game. There had been a previous discussion at the Houston RCMP Detachment about the amount of drinking and subsequent fighting that often happens outside these games.

Upon their arrival at the arena, both Corporal Donovan and Constable Koester discovered open cases of alcohol that they either confiscated or the owners were directed to empty the bottles. Testimony from Constable Koester and Corporal Donovan was that the cases of alcohol were open, but none of the bottles within the cases had been opened.

At approximately 2104 hours, Constable Koester reported seeing Mr. Ian Bush by the main entrance to the arena with an open bottle of beer. Constable Koester stated that he asked Mr. Bush to empty the beer and then asked him his name. Reportedly, Mr. Bush responded by saying his name was "Jeremy".

Constable Koester then explained that he was going to be giving Mr. Bush a ticket for having an open bottle of alcohol in a public place. At this time, Auxiliary Constable Shane Ketchell and Constable Darren Woroshelo



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pulled up in an RCMP police cruiser. Constable Woroshelo suggested Constable Koester use the cruiser to fill in the ticket with Mr. Bush. Mr. Bush sat in the back seat while Constable Koester sat in the front seat of the car.

To fill in the ticket, Constable Koester asked for Mr. Bush's full name. Mr. Bush responded that his name was "Jeremy Stapleton". Constable Koester testified that Mr. Bush appeared unable to spell the last name which indicated that he was probably not telling the truth. At this point, he reports saying to Mr. Bush that he could be charged with obstructing a police officer by lying about his name.

Constable Koester testified that Mr. Bush then said that his real name was Tyler Poznikoff and he gave a birthdate. Constable Koester called RCMP Dispatch to run the name through their computer system. Dispatch responded that there wasn't a driver's license issued to a person with that name and birthdate. Mr. Bush responded that he did not, in fact, have a driver's license. At this point, Constable Koester wrote a liquor ticket with the name Tyler Poznikoff.

Constable Koester testified that he then heard someone from outside the vehicle say that the man in the back seat of the car was Ian Bush. After this was corroborated by others, Mr. Bush acknowledged his identity and admitted he tried to lie about his name to get out of the ticket. Constable Koester then told Mr. Bush he was being arrested for obstructing a police officer. The decision was made by Constable Koester and Constable Woroshelo to have Mr. Bush go to the RCMP Detachment where he would be released on a promise to appear.

At 2120 hours Constable Koester and Ian Bush arrived at the Houston RCMP Detachment and went to the Interview Room to fill in the initial liquor ticket as well as the Promise to Appear. Auxiliary Constable Ketchell and Constable Woroshelo were also present in the Detachment until they were called to an emergency outside of town. Prior to leaving the Detachment, Constable Woroshelo asked Constable Koester if he was going to be okay alone with Mr. Bush. As Mr. Bush had been compliant to this point, Constable Koester advised he would be fine.

Constable Koester reported that he was sitting at a table to the right of Mr. Bush in the interview room to do the paperwork for the two documents. Mr. Bush signed the new liquor ticket with the proper name and Constable Koester then started to read the Promise to Appear to him. It was at this time that Mr. Bush unexpectedly struck him on the left side of his head.

Testimony by Constable Koester was that this first strike caused him to try to hold on to the front of Mr. Bush's clothing to hold himself upright. He stated that Mr. Bush continued to hit him on the left side of his head and that they stumbled against a far wall before ending up in the middle of the room. Constable Koester reported



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that although he was trained to fight back in different ways, he couldn't recall if he managed to strike back at Mr. Bush during this initial combat.

Constable Koester stated that while in the middle of the room, Mr. Bush struck him extremely hard on the side of the head which made his knees buckle and caused him to fall forward. Following this hit, Mr. Bush was reported to have placed Constable Koester in a head lock from behind. While in this position, the two fell forward onto the couch that was at the end of the interview room.

Constable Koester testified that his face was down on the couch's cushions and that he believed Mr. Bush had his left arm around his throat in a hold against his carotid artery. He is unaware of where Mr. Bush was specifically located as he was pinned underneath and couldn't see him. He reported feeling signs of losing consciousness and attempting to break the hold around his neck. He stated that he reached back and pulled out his service pistol and attempted to strike Mr. Bush several times prior to making the decision to pull the trigger and shoot Mr. Bush.

Constable Koester stated that immediately following the shooting he called for assistance on his police radio. He testified that he is unaware how he got out from under Mr. Bush or if he moved him in the process. Corporal Donovan was the first person to respond to the call for assistance and reported finding Constable Koester lying on the floor of the interview room and Mr. Bush deceased lying across the couch. Corporal Donovan testified that he immediately contacted RCMP Dispatch and asked them to notify the North District Major Crime Unit in Prince George as he knew it would be their responsibility to investigate the incident.

RCMP Blood Spatter expert, Sergeant James Hignell, attended the Detachment to analyse the blood evidence present in the room as well as on Constable Koester's handgun. Sergeant Hignell testified that after analysis of the weapon, he believed it was most likely that Mr. Bush was struck several times by the handgun in an inverted position consistent with Constable Koester being beneath Mr. Bush. The evidence indicated the gunshot happened while the handgun was near or against Mr. Bush's head. He also believes the blood spatter evidence in the RCMP Interview Room was consistent with Mr. Bush being behind Constable Koester, lying across the couch, when the handgun was fired.

Blood Spatter expert Joseph Slemko testified on behalf of the Bush family that he had reviewed Sergeant Hignell's written report as well as reviewing photos of the blood evidence photographed at the scene. Mr. Slemko reported that his bloodstain analysis of this evidence supported Mr. Bush's head being on or near the cushions of the couch at the time the shot was fired. He testified that he thought it most likely Constable Koester was not directly beneath Mr. Bush's head as that would have raised the elevation of Mr. Bush's head which was inconsistent with his analysis of the blood stain evidence.



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Forensic Pathologist Dr. John Stefanelli testified that the cause of death was a single gunshot wound to the head of Mr. Bush. It was Dr. Stefanelli's evidence that the gunshot wound was indicative of the muzzle of the handgun being in partial contact with Mr. Bush's head at the time of discharge. In addition, he testified that other wounds on the top of Mr. Bush's head were of a size and shape consistent with being caused by the sight on Constable Koester's handgun.

Dr. Walter Martz of the Provincial Toxicology Laboratory testified that Mr. Bush had a blood alcohol level of .24 percent. However, he explained that this level was artificially elevated due to natural autolytic changes that happen in the body following death. He reported that Mr. Bush's actual blood alcohol level would be .17 percent when adjusted for these changes.

Sergeant Sheila White presented testimony regarding the use of recording equipment in the Interview Room of the Houston RCMP Detachment. Sergeant White reported that there was a camera in the Interview Room that covered the table that Mr. Bush and Constable Koester were using. This camera could record images and audio through a connected VCR. In addition, there was also a sound recording device that recorded onto a standard tape for stenographers to use. These devices would be started from the room adjacent to the Interview Room.

Sergeant White stated that the recordings were only done when taking statements from witnesses or suspects that had to be recorded for future use. This recording equipment was not utilized in situations where an individual was coming in to sign a Notice to Appear as a statement was not being taken at the time.

Sergeant White testified that since this incident, the RCMP has upgraded the equipment in the Interview Room. The video is no longer recorded on VHS tapes which required the changing of the tape after sixty minutes. They are now utilizing a digital system which can record up to 284 consecutive hours. In addition, they are now able to start the recording with a remote control located in the Interview Room.

1. RCMP "E" Division's information technology staff should design and set the standard for audio and visual recording equipment to be installed in every detachment. Further, it is recommended that the equipment be similar to those commonly in use by banks and retail stores to minimize human intervention with the equipment. Finally, the use of the recording equipment be made mandatory. Verbal warnings be given, and printed signage be installed, advising those entering an interview room that they will be recorded for everyone's safety.

3. The RCMP should conduct a business design review to look at current procedures and find potential areas where processes can be revised with the goal of continuous improvement.

RCMP members should annually conduct a self assessment and have a continuing education plan aimed at maintaining competency.

In the area of public relations, the jury recommends joint efforts between Mayor Sharon Smith, representing the District of Houston, and Sergeant Sheila White, Officer in Charge of the Houston RCMP Detachment, to further educate the general public on various aspects of the criminal code with the aim of reducing the violations of the law.

For example, but not limited to the following:

Liquor Violations, Obstruction of Justice, Theft, Assault and Vandalism.

The potential vehicles for disseminating this information may include:

- Articles in papers



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- Reminders on the radio and television
- Workshops in schools and/or community
- Local Council motions to adopt the support of the principles of law.
- Increased signage at public venues to describe the law and how to report offences.
