# **VELVETLEAF**

(Abutilon theophrasti)

## **HAVE YOU SEEN THIS PLANT?**

#### **DESCRIPTION**

- Native to Asia
- Annual, shrub-like herb
- Erect stems grow 1 to 2 m tall, with increased branching in the upper portion
- Leaves and stems covered with dense hairs, soft to the touch
- Large, alternate, heart-shaped leaves, 8 to 20 cm long and wide, with toothed edges
- Leaf veins originate at a common point and emit a foul odour when crushed
- Flowers are yellow to orange with 5 petals, appearing late July to August
- Seeds produced in a circular capsule of 12 to 15 seedpods (1 to 2.5 cm long) with a ring of 'prickles' around the upper edge
- Slender taproot with fibrous branches
- Prefers roadsides, ditches, riverbanks, disturbed areas, gardens and cultivated fields
- Reproduces by seed
- Local dispersal mainly by humans, animals and equipment.
  Ornamental plantings and contaminated feed, soya bean and imported grains are the main pathways for long distance spread.

PRIMARY THREAT: Significantly reduces soya bean and maize crop yield and quality.


#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

Velvetleaf produces 700 to 17,000 highly viable seeds per plant. Seeds can remain viable in soil for over 50 years and can germinate throughout the year.

#### **LOOK-ALIKES**

Venice mallow, Prickly sida/teaweed, Spurred anoda, Tropic croton, Common mallow, Morning glory, Wild buckwheat, Violets, Sunflower, Common burdock, Cocklebur.
