"an investigation into a fire must start within three days of the incident, excluding holidays. The fire must be reported to the Office of the Fire Commissioner when the investigation is completed".



Create a new incident

To create a new fire incident report:

- Navigate to the "Fire Incident Reporting" dropdown menu at the top-centre of the webpage
- Select "Create New Fire Incident Report" from the dropdown menu






INCIDENT NUMBER and TYPE

 LOC – 3 letter code for your reporting area (or numeric for FN)

Example: DNS for North Saanich

- YYYY Year
- MM Month
- DD Day
- HR Hour (the time of the callout)
- OCC Occurrence (originating fire is '01'. Exposure fires are '02', '03' etc.

Reporting guidelines

All fires that cause damage to property, injuries or fatalities, or which require fire department resources to suppress must be reported. Examples include:

Structure fires

- Buildings
- Piers
- Decks and patios
- Parkades and covered parking lots

Vehicle fires

- Cars and trucks
- Trains
- Boats
- Planes
- All-terrain vehicles (ATVs)
- Recreational vehicles (RVs)

Outdoor fires

- Dumpsters
- Playground equipment
- Telephone/Hydro poles
- Grass
- Bark mulch



FAQ's

 Do I report a beach/backyard fire? Attended or unattended?

Beach Fire – if you are required to put it out – **YES**





Remarks: Explain circumstances under which fire originated.

Home owner, FLINTSTONE was making french fries on the stove but was distracted by bowling on TV and forgot about them. Fuel was a pot with vegetable oil (FU4300), etc.



When you need to describe a code – you enter it in the remarks



NEW CODES

PC3750: PC – (structure only) Encampments of persons experiencing homelessness

PR3780: PR – (vehicle only) Vehicle used as a residence in an encampment of persons experiencing homelessness (includes cars, light trucks and vans, single body units, motorhomes) (excludes all vehicles not in a homeless encampment complex)

PR8199: PR – (outdoor only) Outdoor property inside an encampment of persons experiencing homelessness (includes brush, trees, grass & light ground cover, trash)




Products and equipment report














Structures: https://www.bcassessment.ca/Property/AssessmentSearch

Vehicles: https://www.canadianblackbook.com/

Contents: There is no standard app/website that can assess the value of personal belongings. Keep in mind that insurance companies will be calculating the cost to REPLACE the items.



EXPOSURE REPORT

- Incident number exactly the same except the Occurrence number is '02'
- Igniting Object Code: IG8100-IG8900
- Remarks: Note exposure. Example "Exposure as a result of..."



Exposure FAQ's

- Car parked in the driveway?
- Cars in an underground parkade?
- Shed?
- Fence?
- Backyard shrubs/trees forest?
- Heat exposure (example damage to siding on neighbour's house)

1	Cooking Equipment	Examples: Stove, range, oven top burner, toaster, deep fryer,
2	Match / Lighter (Not used in Conjunction with Smoking)	Examples: Match, lighter, candle, torch,hot ashes
3	Heating Equipment	Examples: Furnace, wood stove, fireplace insert, space heater, baseboard heater
4	Smoker's Material	Examples: Cigarette, pipe, cigar, match/lighter (when used in conjunction with smoking)

Areas of Interest for this Quarter



There were **397 fires (27%)** reported that were considered to be incendiary or suspicious.



154 structure fires (25%) this quarter were initially detected by a heat/smoke alarm.



194 structure fires occurred in single, detached residences, resulting in 10 injuries and five deaths.



There were **six incidents** of drapery catching fire, resulting in **one death**.



Areas of Interest for this Quarter



44 fires were reported at an encampment of people experiencing homelessness, resulting in one injury and one death.



17 fires were ignited by a candle, resulting in two deaths and \$23 million in losses.



410 fires were ignited in areas containing trash/rubbish/recyclables, including dumpster containers.



There were **60 fires** in structures built in 1920 or earlier. There were **two deaths** recorded in these incidents.

FAQ's

- If two suites in an apartment building are damaged is that 2 reports?
- Is a BBQ on a balcony an outdoor fire or a Structure Fire?
- If the vehicle fire is a result of a MVA do I need to report it?
- If the location is on Federal Land do I need to report it?



FAQ's continued

- Is a trailer that someone is living in considered a structure or a vehicle?
- Dock fire?
