How to Use this Guide

Lesson plans at the beginning of each lesson provide learning objectives, suggested delivery techniques and specific equipment and material requirements that you will have to coordinate. Each lesson contains explanatory information and copies of required overhead transparencies. Where slide presentations are used, details are provided on the concept behind each slide and the explanatory text.

You should also review the participant's workbook and become familiar with that material.

Workshop Introduction

Purpose

The main purpose of this workshop is to clarify the use, intent and requirements of the *Pruning Guidebook* and the associated regulations and legislation under the Forest Practices Code.

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Specific Learning Objectives

Participants will:

- discuss pruning benefits
- ▲ be introduced to basic pruning methods
- discuss and describe key biological pruning principles aimed at maximizing the value return from pruning
- rank stands using the guidebook stand selection guidelines and discuss the rationale behind the guidelines
- ▲ investigate some potential conflicts in management objectives with pruning projects
- ▲ discuss the two pruning scenarios that require a pruning treatment in a silviculture prescription to meet free growing obligations
- ▲ become aware of requirements in an SMP that are critical to pruning prescriptions
- ▲ become aware of implementation issues regarding contracts
- discuss the key evaluation criteria for monitoring and compliance with pruning contracts
- ▲ become aware of the key reporting issues for pruning.

Target Audience

This workshop will be of interest to industry, government and consulting personnel responsible for preparing, implementing or monitoring prescriptions and contracts for pruning.

Format

The workshop is intended to be a half-day indoor session. It could be combined with the one-day juvenile spacing workshop, or with a half-day pruning field session if local demands require it.

A variety of instructional techniques are used to achieve the objectives of the workshop including:

- 1. lecturettes and videos,
- 2. case studies, and
- 3. group exercises (classroom and field).

Participant involvement throughout the workshop should be the focus. The role of the facilitator is to direct discussions and to clarify points. Maintaining tight control over time during the exercises and field trips is a major task.

Materials

Materials included with this guide for facilitators are:

- ▲ the Pruning video
- ▲ the Pruning for Value demonstration box (#2 preferably)
- the participant's workbook
- ▲ references.

The workshop is designed for 20–24 participants per session. Trying to include more participants will make the group difficult to manage and will reduce the value of the learning experience for everyone.

Facilitators

This workshop was designed to be delivered by one facilitator. Facilitators should be intimately familiar with the subject matter.
