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Introduction

In 2020, the Salmo Valley Public Library pivoted and worked hard to continuing connecting and serving our community. We continued to deliver services people can count on, despite the challenges we faced with COVID. The staff and Board spent much of the year working to build a strong sustainable library for the communities we serve. We did not let the pandemic stop us as we strived to sustain and provide service.

The direct funding, we receive from the province is very much appreciated and well managed. These funds help us be responsive to the specific needs of our community, which was an extra challenge this year. With that said, we continue to see our local funding not increasing as well as the provincial, which has meant it is becoming harder to meet the ever-growing needs of the community, along with the extra challenges we all faced in 2020.

Incorporated in 1946, Salmo is a small rural community found in the central Kootenay region, in southeastern British Columbia. For the last many years Salmo has been known as the 'hub' of the Kootenays; Salmo is located at the junction of Highways 3 and 6. The Village is about a 30 to 45-minute drive to the surrounding communities of Trail, Castlegar, Nelson, and Creston. With a population of 1141 residents, the community relies on the forestry, tourism, agriculture and mining

sectors in the area. The surrounding area, to which the library

provides services, is part of the Regional District of the Central Kootenay Area G and has a population of 1624. Salmo and

area offer an outdoor lifestyle with activities such as hiking, skiing, fishing, and canoeing in the nearby mountains, rivers, and lakes, as well as enjoying trails with ATV's.

In the 2020 OCP Economic Development Survey the top five reasons for choosing Salmo as home are its affordability, access to nature and outdoor recreation, the easy commute to Nelson, Trail and Castlegar, and the overall lifestyle. These were strongly followed by the sense of community and that it's a great place to raise kids. In the survey done for developing this plan one

Salmo Resident commented, "It is a great, safe place to bring up children. It has a great library. Everything is within walking

distance. Best water in the world. The ski hill is close."

The median age of the Village of Salmo at 45.7 is just over average for the Kootenay region. This demographic could account for the historical priority that has been placed on seniors' concerns within the Village. Salmo is striving to be an age-friendly community with two seniors-oriented housing facilities, the Salmo Health & Wellness Centre, and numerous resources for seniors. Salmo's flat land, natural environment, and walkable distances to most amenities are also what draws this demographic to the community.

The Village of Salmo and Area G also continue to see an increase in new families moving to the community. This area is still affordable for first time home owners, and for this reason we are also seeing an increase in young families. Every year the community seems to welcome many new families.

As the community grows so does the Salmo Valley Public Library and we continue to be a hub of activity. The library is situated right in the middle of the community and we pride ourselves on being a welcoming and inclusive community space that is accessible and convenient.

The Salmo Valley Public Library is a vibrant, dynamic and engaging community-gathering place that strives to provide the Salmo Valley residents with information, education, technology, pleasure, and support for lifelong learning. We provide this by offering a broad range of reading and related resources, technology, support, and programs. The material and non-material opportunities available through the library are what make it central to the growing community it serves.

One of the challenges that the library continues to face is insufficient staff time. We struggle to meet the demand for programming, tech support and professional development with an operating budget that can only handle a small staff. Every year it gets harder to create a budget that will grow with the demands of the community but stay within the limited amount of funding received - this has become a major challenge. Staff are overwhelmed with work and the demand to meet the challenges and changes needed for these times.

As for many, 2020 has been a year with many significant changes and challenges. One of the positive things that happened for staff was a regular connection with ABCPLD and other Library Partners, as well as the strengthening of support and connection within the KLF. Further positive changes are how well we were able to adapt and play a positive roll within our community during these challenging times. We were able to provide services, when others could not - digital collections, online learning, databases, and then we were able to quickly set up to provide take away (curbside) services. It was wonderful to be able to work to provide these services.

People are now able to come back to the library and are using our traditional services, but they are also still expecting the extra services we provided. This has highlighted our concerns that our funding does

not allow for staff time to provide the required operational technology and infrastructure management. These concerns were already apparent; however, the pandemic has brought them to the forefront.

The Salmo Valley Public Library saw the end of our 2015-2020 strategic plan at the beginning of 2020. Our vision, mission and values have done well to articulate the rationale and inform all of our work over the years. We were successful in achieving most of our goals, with some of these goals being carried over into our new plan as we continue to build on them. We put our new Strategic Plan in place at the beginning of March 2020 and now know that it may need some adjustments due to unforeseen changes we are now aware of due to COVID-19.

Our new five-year plan includes a focus on increasing operation funding, building on community awareness, and adapting and evolving the library programming to meet the communities needs.

Aligning with Provincial Strategic Plan Inspiring Libraries, Connecting Communities

#1 - Improving Access for British Columbians

Library Goal that supports the priority:

GALE Course: We saw a steady increase in online learning during 2020, as many people had the time while staying home.

This program saw multiple outcomes:

- Life long learning happening within the community
- The library was actively promoting GALE courses online, which not only brought people to the GALE course but introduced many to the other services provided through the library online databases.
- One program allowing us to promote other programs

- During 2020 a parent in the community took a GALE course about writing children's stories. This
 led them to self-publish a children's book and they will soon be doing a virtual reading for the
 community.
- Supportive and positive feedback and engagement from the community for the opportunities to enhance their skills while staying home during 2020.
- Sharing of resources and subscriptions between libraries (KLF), which is creating a more sustainable access to resources for all. SVPL would not be able to provided these courses without the support of the KLF

#2 - Building Capacity

- Pursing an Alternative Approval Process to increase some of the library service area
- Creation of a 'Annual report card' that went out to all residents
- Connections and a deeper presence in the community and with the Village council.
- Stronger relationships with the Village

For this reason, much of the TECH funding we received was spent on supporting the community's use of, and access to, technology. We spent much of the funding on adding to our digital collection, as well as improving access to the digital collection. SVPL now has loanable eReaders and iPads to support those who don't have access to digital information, as well as an enhanced online collections that meet our community's specific interests.

Some of the challenges we have faced with implementing these new additions to the library come to the challenges mentioned in our PLGR - staffing and time. With that said, the Salmo Valley Public Library is grateful for this funding to help increase access for our community to technology and information.


Summary

Our community is eager to learn and they are asking for programs and support, but we don't have the staff or funds to keep up. This challenge has also given us great opportunity to collaborate in creative ways both inside and outside of our community.

The community of Salmo and area has many people without access to the internet, or the technology to access the internet. We see this technology grant as an opportunity to help provide that equal access to all members of the communities we serve.

Some of these devices will help our community access information and others will help them create or share content. Furthermore, during this time of a pandemic we are seeing an increase in access to our digital collection and to meet that need we have added to this collection.
