During the 2022-2023 fiscal year, the Canada-British Columbia Agreement on French Language Services ("the Agreement") has continued to improve access to information and services for French-speaking British Columbians. Each year, the collaboration between the Government of British Columbia and the federal government assists ministries, Crown corporations and provincial municipalities in their efforts to improve access and delivery of services in French to French-speaking British Columbians.

2022-2023 highlights:

Early childhood: Language transmission

Westshore Parks & Recreation Society (WSPR) has expanded current licensed daycare and licensed preschool program offerings to include French programming, activities and special events for the children and families. WSPR worked closely with Société francophone de Victoria (SFV) to provide two staffing resources to run the programs. The program added value to WSPR and its daycare and preschool programs by introducing the children to the French language in a fun and interactive way. The funding enabled Westshore Parks and Recreation to strengthen its role as a continued service provider of French programming by partnering with SFV.

"My five-year-old has been participating in the French and Music classes provided through WSPR. He looks forward to his lessons and has expanded his skill set with musical instruments. The French lessons are age appropriate, and in a short time, he has been able to retain some French vocabulary. He can sing songs and count to ten in French. We are thrilled with this opportunity and hope to see this program continue!"

Immigration:

In addition to their existing engagement strategies (e.g., B.C. attends Destination Canada annually, targeting priority occupations in healthcare, childcare, and education), the Immigration Program branch updated the BC PNP program policy so that candidates with language proficiency in both English and French can now receive additional points in the registration system. In addition, the Branch created a new role dedicated to community engagement, increasing its capacity to engage with key stakeholders, including with the Francophone community.

Economic Development:

A new relationship was established between Innovate BC, a Crown Corporation whose mandate is to promote the tech sector in B.C., and the Société de développement économique de C.-B., who is now an Innovate BC community partner, to support francophone tech companies in the province. In 2022-2023, Innovate BC, in collaboration with Francophone Affairs, targeted tech companies who had an interest in developing their French-language service offerings.

CONTEXT:

Funds from BC Gaming, BC Arts Council, and municipalities were supplemented by funds from the Canada-British Columbia agreement on French-language services, allowing community organizations to continue their programming.

It should be noted that the BC Arts Council accepts funding applications written in French.

Events:

- 1. Canada Day
 - The Canada Day celebrations featured an award-winning, Montreal-based artist, Joyce N'Sana, whose performance was described as one of the highlights of the day. The performance was made possible by a collaboration between City of Victoria and Société francophone de Victoria.
- 2. Francophonie Day in B.C.
 - This year's celebration of Francophonie Day in B.C. highlighted the immigration sector and the contributions of a strong community to welcoming immigrants. In addition, the day was used as a networking opportunity to connect francophone community stakeholders with government executives from their respective sectors. The networking event was a resounding success as it strengthened ties within and across sectors and stimulated engagement efforts within government.
- 3. Maple Sugar Festival in Nanaimo In-person celebration of traditional French-Canadian winter activities (e.g. toffee pulling, music, dance, and traditional foods) spread over a period of three days.
- 4. "Printemps de la francophonie" (Francophone Spring) at Simon Fraser University.

 Workshops, round tables, films, and performances promote exchanges between French-speaking young adults in the fields of literature, history, political science, music, health, and education in French.

5. Jeux Franco-Canadiens du Nord et de l'Ouest The remaining funds that were held back due to delays in the event caused by COVID-19 were disbursed earlier than anticipated to allow organizers to secure lower prices for transportation.	
6. Francophone Youth Games This event continues its recovery from the pandemic and has been adapted to suit the smaller-than- normal number of participants seen as a result of pandemic restrictions. 100% of participants said they would enroll again next year.	
7. Francophone Youth Parliament The Francophone Youth Parliament returned to an in-person format within the Legislative Chamber for the first time since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, which also coincided with the 25 th anniversary celebration of this event. 98% of participants said they would enroll again next year.

CONTEXT:

There were 14 responses to the satisfaction question. The percentage of organizations that say they are satisfied or very satisfied is 36%, or 5 people. Seven people answered "neutral" and two people were dissatisfied. It is important to note that only 4 of the 14 responses indicated that they had received funds under the Canada-British Columbia Agreement.

Of the four people who answered that they were funded by the Agreement, three answered the satisfaction question. All three respondents indicated that they are very satisfied with the administration of the agreement.

This suggests that there are some responses that do not relate to satisfaction with the agreement and that the low satisfaction score relates to something other than the agreement.

Through the survey, FA confirmed that the community priorities identified in 2018 are still relevant, with 80% of participants rallying behind them.
