INTRODUCTION

On October 16 and 17, a certification inspection was completed on Canada Qingdao Secondary School (CQSS) in Qingdao, Shandong province, People's Republic of China, referred to as the School in this report. This was the first onsite inspection conducted on this program since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. The purpose of this inspection was to determine if the requirements for the British Columbia (BC) education program have been met, according to the BC Offshore School Program Certification Agreement (the Agreement). The inspection team (the Team), appointed by the Executive Director of the Independent Schools and International Education Branch, British Columbia Ministry of Education and Child Care (the Ministry) in accordance with the Agreement, consisted of James Christopher and Edward Noot, who served as Chair for this inspection.

The School's BC program has an enrolment of 178 students, in grades 10 - 12. The BC program is housed within Shandong Province Qingdao No. 9 High School which is a well-known Chinese secondary school established in 1900. The entire student population is around 2,300 students.

During the visit to the School, the Team reviewed all standards required in the *BC Offshore School Program Certification Agreement* and *Operating Manual* and met with the School's Owner/Operator, host school Principal, Offshore School Representative (OSR), BC Principal, BC Vice-Principal and BC teachers, and the program's International Director and Program Manager. Informal interactions with other staff and students occurred during the on-site inspection.

The Owner/Operator, Mr. John Zhu, representative of Canadian-Sino Education Exchange Centre (CSEEC), is responsible for the BC program. CSEEC operates three other BC offshore schools in China, all located in Shandong Province. The Owner/Operator has an additional company based out of Vancouver that owns and operates one Group 4 independent school.

The BC program's philosophy, objectives and special features include a mission statement which describes the School's focus as, "creating global citizens who are focused on high academic achievement. By working in a safe and caring environment, students can find success in all aspects of life." The School emphasizes clear rules and guidelines for all students to promote consistency across all domains of the School, both in and out of the classroom. The School commits to embracing two educational curricula: the Chinese high school system and the BC graduation program, with the goal of students achieving success in both programs and being prepared for future studies outside of China.

The Team would like to thank Canada Qingdao Secondary School for its hospitality, cooperation and preparedness for the inspection visit.

The School has implemented a 'house system' that provides time for daily physical activity and other team building opportunities, in the hopes of enhancing student community and connectedness, thereby elevating commitment, diligence and learning.

The Owner/Operator meets the requirements set forth in the Agreement and demonstrates a strong commitment to the ongoing success of the School. His presence during the school inspection is evidence of his active involvement and interest in supporting school success.		
The Owner/Operator works constructively with the School's leadership team, along with the Offshore School Representative (OSR) and other staff.		
Commendation: The Owner/Operator is commended for hiring a superintendent for his schools in China and Canada, allowing for more focused leadership support and teacher professional development.

Comment: The Team verified that the School has a letter on file from the Qingdao Education Bureau that authorizes Canadian-Sino Education Centre (CSEEC), in conjunction with Qingdao No. 9 School to operate a British Columbia offshore school program, leading to graduation with a BC Dogwood Certificate. The letter is dated December 2022, and is effective for five years.		



The BC program is operated in accordance with the requirements set out in the Agreement. The letter references no objections to the three items noted in section 5.03 of the Agreement; namely that the program will operate in accordance with the Agreement, the program will lead to a BC graduation certificate, and the program will be taught by teachers certified by the BC Teacher Regulation Branch.

The approval letter has been translated as per Ministry guidelines.

2.04-2.05 The School meets building inspection/safety, food preparation/cafeteria and fire safety codes/regulations. Facilities are deemed to be suitable to support the BC program.

Comment: The School is situated on a modern, spacious, attractive and well-equipped campus. CQSS is located in the international building of a new campus of the host school (Qingdao No. 9 High School). The campus has sports facilities, science labs, art rooms, computer labs, a library, auditorium, etc. CQSS has access upon request to use any of the host school's facilities.
CQSS has the exclusive use of seven classrooms with smart boards in the international building, two staffrooms, an administration office, a CQSS library (which was not functional at the time of the inspection), and a computer lab. All but five students at CQSS live in the dormitories on campus and eat three meals a day at the school cafeteria.
The Team verified that the school facilities are entirely suitable to support the BC program. The Team notes that school community has been greatly enhanced by consolidating the entire BC program on one floor.
Certified translations of building, safety and cafeteria compliance documents are in order. The School is in compliance with local regulations and all inspections are up to date.
The School has a written emergency plan for natural disasters (i.e., fire, earthquake) and holds regular drills for students to practice these protocols. The documentation includes a protocol for the unplanned temporary or permanent closure of the School. The School's emergency plan is annually vetted for accuracy and functionality by the Offshore School Representative (OSR) and detailed in the 2023 Annual Report.
An ad hoc contingency planning committee remains in place to address any urgent health or safety concerns that may arise. All response planning will be coordinated with Qingdao No. 9 School.



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The Team commends the School for consolidating the BC program to one floor, which has created increased feelings of cohesion and community for BC program students.

The Principal possesses a valid Certificate of Qualification from the BC Teacher Regulation Branch (TRB) which meets the requirements outlined in the Agreement.

The School is currently understaffed as they seek to hire another qualified teacher. This necessitates the Principal taking on an increased teaching role, which in turn leaves little time for administrative leadership, teacher evaluation and the like.

Comment: The School meets the requirements for administrative support as outlined in section 2.08 of the Annual Report. Along with support from the Offshore School Representative (OSR) and Owner/Operator, the School has a full complement of administrative support staff that work directly with the BC Principal.
An experienced English-speaking Administrative Assistant has responsibility for maintaining student records, data collection and daily administrative needs within the School. She is also responsible for the translation of documents and acts as an interpreter between the parents and the School. In addition, she manages web based TESS (Windsor) - the student information system used to store and transmit school and student data to the Ministry. Along with her administrative work, the Administrative Assistant acts as a liaison between CQSS and Qingdao No. 9 High School and between the School, Principal and parents.
The School employs academic advisors to assist with arranging visits by Canadian universities and to support the graduating class with university and study visa applications.
The Chinese International Director, who is an advocate of the BC program, is also a link with the host school.
A newly appointed CSEEC Superintendent, based in Vancouver, works to support leaders and offers professional development for teachers and administrators.
Commendation: The School is commended for appointing a Superintendent with oversight of professional development for teachers and administrators, as noted in section 2.02 of this report.

Teacher files are in order, although evidence of teacher evaluations as per school policy is lacking. A principal evaluation did not occur last year due to travel restrictions, but an evaluation is planned for the second semester of this year as per school policy.

It was noted, however, that currently this assessment data is not being effectively used to target academic interventions for individual students to improve their language skills. The School encourages teachers to incorporate English language learning (ELL) strategies into their teaching, but this tends to vary in effectiveness.

In addition, the School has assigned two teaching assistants (TAs) to each grade level to support student progress. They provide a liaison between families and the School and individual coaching to students. These supports tend to be reactive, based upon parent or teacher concerns, rather than proactive teaching and learning supports in the classroom.

Although improvement is significant from grade 10 to 12 as measured on the BC Literacy Graduation Assessments, the results still fall far below the provincial average.

In addition, implementation of BC's curriculum at the School has been somewhat hindered by both staff turnover and the lack of targeted teacher and student resources, both print and electronic, that have been developed in the last few years to support the specific goals and requirements of BC's curriculum.

Comment: Instructional time allotments comply with Ministry requirements. Students receive 882 hours of instruction per year plus an additional 189 hours of second language instruction in Mandarin provided by the faculty at the host school.

Comment: Teachers use a wide range of assessment methods and rubrics and provide opportunities for student reflection and self-assessment. It was not clear to the Team the extent to which assessment results informed classroom instructional practice. In addition, some internal sharing of assessment strategies would be beneficial to those teachers who have been slowe to adapt their teaching/assessment practices.
Required graduation assessments are conducted in the School's computer lab under the appropriate exam conditions with diligent proctoring protocols.

Comment: Classrooms at the School are each equipped with SMART boards and the teachers are quite skilled at integrating this technology into their teaching.
At the grade 11 and 12 levels, students are encouraged to bring their own devices and there is a seamless sharing of resources, assignments, etc. between teachers and students and among the students themselves. Currently grade 10 students are not permitted to bring devices to class.
The students have access to library materials from the host school but there is no library of English-language materials in the BC offshore school itself.
BC program students use the sports facilities of the host school and have access to science labs but teachers report that the challenges in booking lab time discourage them from using this option.
Commendation: The Team commends the teaching staff for their effective and seamless integration of technology into their daily classroom instruction.

Comment: School reporting protocols are in compliance with BC reporting requirements and include four written reports and four opportunities for parent conferences in person or virtually.
The school year is based on a two semester and four term system. There are four formal report cards, one at the end of each term (November, January, March, and June). Parent-teacher conferences occur after each report where parents of students of concern are required to come in, and any other parents who wish to speak to the teachers may also make an appointment.
This year, students are writing self-reflections on a regular basis, which are stored in the students' files. The School has always asked teachers to provide at least one comment for

each student in each course and the administrative team is looking into possibilities for adding a graduation status update to the end-of-year report card.

Comment: The comprehensive teacher handbook details the school organization, mission statement, marking and grading procedures, professional development, dispute resolution protocol, computer and internet usage, emergency procedures, student discipline, progress reporting, grading appeal procedures, and the learning assessment policy.				
The Team noted that the handbook contained a very useful section on Qingdao which includes history, transportation, restaurants, shopping and the like.

- appointing a superintendent with oversight for professional development for teachers and administrators.
- consolidating the BC program to one floor, which has created increased feelings of cohesion and community for BC program students.
- establishing an excellent teaching and learning relationship and natural rapport between teachers and students.
- the effective and seamless integration, by staff, of technology into their daily classroom instruction.

Requirements

In order to meet the requirements of the BC Offshore School Program Certification Agreement, the Team requires that by November 24, 2023, the Owner/Operator provide the Executive Director of the Independent Schools and International Education Branch, responsible for the BC Offshore School Program, with a plan and timeline for proposed implementation of the following items:

- The School is required to ensure that all teachers' assignments (for both semesters) align with the specifics of their Letters of Exemption.
 - As of November 24, 2023, this requirement has been met to the satisfaction of the Ministry.



SUMMATIVE RECOMMENDATION

The Inspection Team recommends to the Executive Director of the Independent Schools and International Education Branch that, contingent on responding to the above requirements to the satisfaction of the Executive Director, the British Columbia education program offered at Canada Qingdao Secondary School continues to be recognized as a British Columbia-certified school.
