Re: Liquor service at farmers markets held in event-oriented Liquor Primary establishments

Introduction

In June 2014 government announced changes to allow manufacturers to sell liquor at farmers markets. While farmers markets are typically held outdoors, the current policy change will allow manufacturers to sell liquor at farmers markets that are held within an event-oriented liquor primary establishment (LP), such as an arena or stadium.

Previous Policy

Licensees must apply to 'de-licence' prior to allowing another licensee to use the establishment to serve liquor.

New Policy

Event-oriented LPs (e.g. arenas, stadiums, conference centres) are not required to 'delicence' prior to allowing a manufacturer with a farmer's market authorization to sell liquor at a farmer's market in the LP, as long as the LP does not provide liquor service at the farmer's market.

Event-oriented LPs will continue to be required to de-licence prior to allowing other licensees (Special Occasion Licences, Caterers) to serve liquor in their establishment.
