Decision Assessment

Development of a Long-Term Pricing Decision/BCFIRB Supervisory Review -- The work of the Pricing Working Group (PWG) initiated in 2019 continued into March 2021 and was terminated as a result of the BCFIRB decision to initiate a Supervisory Review of chicken pricing. The Board worked with the Commission and the BCFIRB Liaison to establish terms of reference, workplan and engagement strategy for the Supervisory Review. The Board and Commission remain first instance regulators and decision makers in the process, which will culminate with those decisions forming the basis of recommendations to the BCFIRB Panel for review and approval. The Board and Commission issues background documents in October of 2021 and held 2 industry round tables as part of the engagement strategy. Work on the files was disrupted throughout 2021 due to response and management of COVID pandemic issues, such as ordered plant closures and national allocation issues. It was further delayed due to wild fires in the BC Interior, Heat Dome and the Atmospheric River events which impacted the entire province.

Cedar Creek Farms/Court of Appeal: The Cedar Creek file moved from summary dismissal at BCFIRB, to BC Supreme Court, to the BC Court of Appeal. The appeal court hearing took place on November 20, 2020 via ZOOM and the decision was rendered on February 22, 2021. The Board and BCFIRB prevailed and the Chamber Judge's decision was overturned. The Court of Appeal found the Chambers Judge erred in finding that there was procedural unfairness in the FIRB process. The FIRB process was found to be fair, and properly informed by the principles of natural justice and procedural fairness. The court of Appeal set aside the order of the Chambers Judge and restored the decision of BCFIRB. The restrictions placed on Vancouver Island New Entrant Quota stands.
