INTRODUCTION

On November 30 and December 1, a certification inspection was completed on Maple Leaf Foreign Nationals School – Dalian (MLFNS-Dalian) in Dalian, Liaoning Province, People's Republic of China, referred to as the School in this report. The purpose of this inspection was to determine if the requirements for the British Columbia (BC) education program have been met, according to the *BC Offshore School Program Certification Agreement* (the Agreement). The inspection team (the Team), appointed by the Executive Director of the Independent Schools and International Education Branch, British Columbia Ministry of Education and Child Care (the Ministry) in accordance with the Agreement, consisted of Darren Spyksma and Dr Laurie Anderson, who served as Chair for this inspection.

The School's BC program has an enrolment of 79 students, in grades K to 9. The School consisted of two stand-alone sites up until the beginning of this year when the downtown campus was closed and the program consolidated at the KaiFaQu campus.

During the visit to the School, the Team reviewed all standards required in the *BC Offshore School Program Certification Agreement* and *Operating Manual* and met with the Superintendent of China Maple Leaf Education Systems (CMLES), the Offshore School Representative (OSR), the BC Principal and BC teachers.

The Owner/Operator, China Maple Leaf Educational Systems (CMLES) is responsible for the BC program. CMLES offered the first BC offshore program in 1997 (in Dalian) and has grown into an international education system with over 46,000 students in China and other Asian countries. The BC program's philosophy, objectives and special features include the belief that the fusion of the best of western and Chinese educational philosophies and practices best prepares students to flourish in our global society. The School also believes that children's innate desire to learn is the basis for their educational growth.

The Team would like to thank Maple Leaf Foreign Nationals School – Dalian for its hospitality, cooperation and preparedness for the inspection visit.

Comment: The School's business plan submitted to the Ministry is thorough and well-organized. The focus is, appropriately, on post-COVID-19 recovery and attracting more foreign families to the School. The School's enrolment in 2019 was 152, is currently 79, and the enrolment target for 2028 is 180.			
The Principal has implemented a multi-faceted marketing plan to achieve the School's enrolment goal. This includes promotional partnerships with the other two Maple Leaf Foreign Nationals Schools (Yiwu and Wuhan), collaborations with local chambers of commerce (US, Japan, etc.) and local hotels, and a social media campaign (e.g. the School has a YouTube channel, a website and is on Instagram showing student demonstrations).			
The School's goal for Section 2.30 of the Annual Report (Continuous School Improvement for Student Outcomes) is to provide equitable opportunities for all students in both academic and cultural programs. Evidence of this goal was found in both classroom practices (engaging and challenging learning activities) and in the various clubs and programs the School has (cooking club, Japanese dance club, student council).

Comment: Detailed plans, combined with vibrant learning environments and interviews of staff and students confirms that BC program implementation exceeds minimum requirements. Core competency self-reflection was evident in all areas of the School and is part of the regular learning practices. The School continues to look for new and meaningful ways to incorporate the First Peoples Principles of Learning, including combining them with curricular competencies from language arts, Applied Design, Skills, and Technologies, and social studies, culminating in a project on how modern technology was first developed by First Peoples.			
Commendation: The School is commended for having self-assessment of Core Competencies as a regular part of the learning practice in each class.

Comment: Students are assessed upon entry and a plan for English language acquisition is established by the school team. The School has English language learning (ELL) support in the School that combines both small group, short-term pull-out programs, and ongoing in-classroom support. The program is so successful that students who are not in need of support want to be part of the ELL pull-out groups. The ELL support teacher and the classroom teacher work as a team to support each student. The School also completes benchmarking to ensure growth in reading and writing. The School tracks this data and uses it to support learning and professional development.			
Commendation: The School is commended for the collaboration present in addressing the language acquisition needs of each student.

Students also have an opportunity to participate in clubs twice a week. The wide variety of clubs comes from student interest, teacher aptitude, and outside support. These clubs are used as a way for all students to practice and develop various core and curricular competencies.

Learning documents include Big Ideas, Core Competencies, curricular competencies, content, learning activities, assessment practices, and methods for differentiation. Increased clarity on how expectations and assessments are different when two grades are taught together would strengthen the program.			
Commendation: The School is commended for ensuring that all learning plans were detailed and in use in the classroom.

Comment: Formative and summative assessment practices along with regular self-assessment and goal setting is present in all classrooms. Teachers use benchmarking data, Foundations Skills Assessment results, and classroom information to adjust programs to meet the needs of the students. Clear tracking of student progress is evident in classrooms. Teachers also take the opportunity to expand individual learning through the use of peer assessment in some classrooms.

Comment: The School is well resourced. Each teacher confirmed that they had the resources they needed to be an effective teacher. Physical and Health Education supplies including basketballs, spike ball, badminton, and other supplies are more than adequate. The library is robust and well-stocked with varied resources to match learner interest.

Comment: The School has recently finished redesigning their communication of learning to align with the new reporting requirements. The first issuing of the new report format was during the inspection. Parents have access to weekly communication from teachers using a digital platform, they participate in monthly presentations of learning, and have the opportunity to participate in parent/teacher conferences and student-led conferences. Formal reports are issued at the end of each term and include the use of proficiency scales and descriptive feedback using BC curricular competencies.			

Commendation: The School is commended for creating a reporting template that is informative, aligned with the new BC reporting order, and balances the needs and interests of families.
