During the 2021-2022 fiscal year, the Canada-British Columbia Agreement on French Language Services ("the Agreement") has continued to improve access to programs and services for French-speaking British Columbians. Each year, the collaboration between the Government of British Columbia and the federal government assists ministries, Crown corporations and provincial municipalities in their efforts to ensure access and delivery of services in French to French-speaking British Columbians.

An important result not reflected in the annual reports of the Agreement, because it is not explicit in the performance indicators, is the lasting relationships between Government and Francophone community organizations initiated and developed by the Intergovernmental Relations Secretariat – Francophone Affairs (IGRSFA). This relational work performed in symbiosis with the strategic objectives of the Agreement is an essential element in the provision of services in French in British Columbia.

Here are four salient examples of the catalytic and symbiotic role of IGRSFA and the Agreement:

- 1. <u>Ministry of Finance, Office of Gender Equity (OGE) Inform'Elles and Women's Network</u>

  OGE is responsible for Ministries' engagement with feminist and women's organizations, as well as other organizations involved in gender equity and the advancement of women.
  - In 2021-2022, the government supported a Women's Network project "Acting together for a community without violence" through provincial funding for French language services in the amount of \$65,000. The goal of the project is to provide culturally appropriate services and training while strengthening partnerships between official-language communities and creating lasting ties between them. IGRSFA facilitated a meeting between senior officials from OGE, Inform'Elles, and Women's Network. These two organizations are now officially identified as key contributors within the sector.
- 2. <u>Ministry of Employment, Economic Recovery and Innovation, WorkBC B.C. Francophone Federation (BCFF) and the B.C. Francophone Immigration Network (BCFIN)</u>
  - For many years, IGRSFA has facilitated conversations between WorkBC and FFCB. Over the years, the BCFIN has joined the conversation.

These exchanges resulted in two initiatives.

- i. WorkBC's creation of a job posting computer application. This tool provides a quick job search and a "personalized job alert" service that sends instant notifications to inform users of new postings that fit their criteria.
- ii. The creation of a French page on the WorkBC site.
- iii. A request from WorkBC to the BCFF and the BCFIN for the development of a workshop to raise awareness of national and international Francophone cultures. The purpose of the workshop will be to educate WorkBC employees who provide employment services on the various Francophone cultures, and the various expectations and needs of people who speak French from all over the world. Once finalized, the goal is for this workshop to become part of the onboarding program for WorkBC staff and their service providers.

#### 3. Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Training – BCFF and its members

The Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Training (AEST) works to ensure that British Columbians can access affordable, relevant and appropriate education and skills training programs. The programs are designed to meet the unique and varied needs of individuals, employers, and organizations.

IGRSFA facilitated the organization of training sessions by AEST, specifically for Francophone organizations. AEST thus informed them of the services and subsidies available to Francophone organizations as employers. Following the sessions, some organizations received funds to fill the shortage of skilled labour they were facing.

#### 4. French-language services policy

One of the highlights of the 2021-2022 fiscal year is the province's announcement of the development of a French-language policy on Francophonie Day (March 11, 2022). If adopted, this policy would formalize some of the current practices and further assist ministries in the provision of services to the province's French-speaking residents.

#### 2021-2022 Agreement funding highlights:

The following projects highlight the continued success of the 2021-2022 federal-provincial collaboration on French-language services:

#### Arts and culture: Introduction to circus arts

This project carried out in Ucluelet, in Western Vancouver Island, allowed young people aged 5 to 18 to learn various disciplines related to circus arts, such as juggling, balance boards, stilts, trapeze, tightrope, and clowning. Young people also develop skills that are transferable from the circus to life, such as discipline, perseverance, and team spirit. The Circus Camp took place between Christmas 2021 and New Year's Day 2022, just in time to keep the youngsters busy over the holiday season.

"Since its launch, the Youth Circus has established itself as an exemplary program for use by teaching professionals as a tool to motivate students to persevere in their studies, prevent them from disengagement, and instill in them the desire to excel." #### Early childhood: Language transmission

The city of Richmond provided a weekly seasonal program for preschoolers. "French Fun" has gradually grown to become an integral part of the Richmond community. The program lasts 20 classes, for a total of 44 sessions and supports the development of the French language in children who will be attending French immersion schools. The program also creates employment opportunities for young people in French immersion.



#### **Justice: 2021 Translation Pocket Guide**

The translation of the guide to the <u>Youth Criminal Justice Act</u> was a long-term project. The specialized legal terminology and the risk of legal action if an error crept into the text meant that the guide had to be edited by several governmental bodies.

Due to the sensitive information contained in the guide, the translation was sent for review to Justice Canada and to British Columbia court systems, namely, staff from Court Services Branch, Corrections Branch, British Columbia Prosecution Service, and the Canadian Mounted Police.

Café de Paris offers language training to healthcare professionals who are in regular contact with French-speaking patients. Professionals have a sufficient linguistic level to engage in a general conversation but may not have mastered the necessary medical vocabulary.

Café de Paris was previously administered by RésoSanté, and a transfer of the administration of the program to Provincial Language Services (PLS) has increased the ability to reach employees in provincial health facilities.

Two programs involving 60 participants were offered, and a waiting list of 300 healthcare professionals was established.

- 1. The "My Voice" Advance Care Planning Guide is a guide that allows the user to reflect on what is important, document their beliefs and wishes, and develop an advance care plan that outlines wishes in case a person is unable to do so when the time comes.
- 2. The "Integrated Child and Youth Teams in BC" mental health and addictions care webpage is now available in French.
- 3. To help people in need, the City of Vancouver has created a map identifying free or low-cost food distribution points. In April 2022, the city decided to no longer produce the map in French and the link was removed.
- 4. The "<u>Child's Health Passport</u>" provides parents with a central place to record their child's growth, illnesses, injuries, allergies, hospitalizations and vaccinations. It also contains information about child safety and where to find other helpful parenting resources. This booklet is printed and distributed by the Federation of Francophone Parents of British Columbia. (FFPBC).
- 5. The Child Health bookmark promotes the "Baby's Best Chance" document, a parent's guide to pregnancy and baby care and "Toddler's First Steps", a guide to child development, healthy eating, health and well-being, parenting, and child safety. The bookmarks were printed and distributed to BC Service Centers and are being distributed by the FFPCB.

- 2. Disseminated French-language legal documents case law material more widely within the British Columbia Prosecution Service.
- 3. Participated in bilingual prosecutor recruitment activities.
- 4. Allowed a greater number of prosecutors to have access to French courses.

Labour market program information sessions Three information sessions for Francophone organizations were organized to allow the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Training to explain the education and training programs available to them. Following the information sessions, twelve applications were submitted by Francophone organizations, seven were approved and four are awaiting a response.
<ul><li>4. Web map of French language services in B.C.</li><li>A provincial map that makes it possible to find services offered in French throughout the province.</li><li>Data for each sector is provided by provincial organizations.</li></ul>
5. 2020 Canadian Francophonie Games (JeuxFC) The provincial government continues to support JeuxFC. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the JeuxFC were postponed to summer 2021. In December 2021, the National Organizing Committee made the decision to cancel the games. BC continues to work with the local organizing committee towards planning and carrying out a different activity while keeping the spirit of the JeuxFC.
6. Love and money The project aims to empower employees of community groups with the economic consequences that a marital choice can have on women and their children. A group of 16 women attended two 45- minute online workshops in spring 2021. Another workshop is planned for organizations in the

Francophone immigration sector in May 2022.

#### CONTEXT:

Funds from BC Gaming, BC Arts Council, and municipalities were supplemented by funds from the Canada-British Columbia agreement on French-language services, allowing community organizations to continue their programming. The leap from in-person to virtual to hybrid programming has brought challenges that community organizations have skillfully overcome.


It should be noted that the BC Arts Council accepts funding applications written in French.

#### **Events:**

1. Circus arts

The project allowed young people aged 5 to 18 to learn the various disciplines related to circus arts. A total of 24 young people participated face-to-face (maximum capacity) and 2,500 young people virtually.

- 2. Théâtre de la seizième Four performances of ZERO by Mani Soleymanlou were seen by 300 people.
- 3. Film Festival in Victoria
  147 people took the opportunity to watch at least one film in French from a choice of three international
  French films and two Canadian ones.
- 4. Francophonie Day in B.C.
  This virtual event celebrated in 2022 put the spotlight on arts and culture. 205 people watched live, while 52 watched later for an average viewing time of more than ten minutes, which is high for the world of social media platformS.
- 5. Maple Festival in Nanaimo In-person and virtual celebration of the festivities spread over a period of three days entitled the "Maple Sugar Festival".

#### CONTEXT:

#### **IGRSFA Annual Survey**

Twenty-nine people responded to the satisfaction question. The percentage of organizations that say they are satisfied or very satisfied is 62%, or 18 people. Ten people answered "neutral" and only one person was dissatisfied. It is important to note that only 12 of the 32 responses indicated that they had received funds under the Canada-British Columbia Agreement.

Of the 12 people who answered that they were funded by the Agreement, ten answered the satisfaction question. Of those ten, 5 are very satisfied, 4 are satisfied, and 1 is neutral. Three respondents indicated that they were not sure if they were funded by the agreement, and of these three, 1 is satisfied, 1 is neutral, and 1 did not answer the question.

This suggests that there are some responses that do not relate to satisfaction with the agreement. The apparent reduction in satisfaction could be (in part) due to this discrepancy. Because the responses are anonymous, IGRSFA is unable to follow up to dig deeper into the data or act on it.

Through the survey, IGRSFA confirmed that the community priorities identified in 2018 are still relevant, with 81% of participants rallying behind them. Finally, IGRSFA gathered information on awareness of a BC government funding program with potential benefits to the community (Community Workforce Response Grant). 58% of respondents were unaware of this program.
