#### INTRODUCTION

This inquest into the death of David Kenneth Smelts commenced at 0930 hours on November 27, 2007, at the Victoria Court House, and continued on November 28, 2007. Mr. John Orr was counsel to the coroner and Ms. Helen Roberts appeared on behalf of the Attorney General of Canada (representing the RCMP). Deputy Sheriff A. 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#### PRESIDING CORONER'S COMMENTS

The following is a brief synopsis of the issues reviewed during the inquest. The purpose of these comments is to assist the reader to more fully understand the Verdict and Recommendations of the jury. It is not intended to be considered evidence nor is it intended in any way to replace the jury's verdict.

Mr. David Kenneth Smelts came to his death on October 6<sup>th</sup> 2006, at Victoria General Hospital. The time of death, as recorded by the physician on duty in the Victoria emergency room, was 2026 hours. The pathologist, Dr Lee, testified that there was no natural disease process that caused or contributed to Mr. Smelts' death. Dr. Martz, the toxicologist, testified that Mr. Smelts died of cocaine intoxication. Mr. Smelts had a large amount of cocaine in his blood at a level of 3.9 mg/L.

On the night of October 6 2006, Mr. Smelts, alone in his car, crashed into a highway divider after crossing the highway and driving the wrong way into oncoming traffic. Following impact his vehicle was inoperable and his subsequent removal from it difficult. Two men who witnessed the collision were able to render immediate assistance and call 911. The witnesses reported Mr. Smelts to be agitated and uttering incoherent sounds. Paramedics and RCMP observed him attempting to inject himself while still in his vehicle.

Mr. Smelts told paramedics and RCMP that he had cocaine in the syringe. Mr. Smelts told a paramedic very clearly that he had purchased \$240 dollars worth of cocaine and used it all. Exhibits taken by the RCMP during their investigation identified that he withdrew \$240 from his bank account at 1348 hrs and a further \$100 at 1729hrs. This amount would purchase approximately 4.5 gms of cocaine.

RCMP had a difficult time removing Mr. Smelts from the vehicle and it took three members to pull him out. Once removed, he was handcuffed behind his back and placed face down on the roadway. It was shortly after this that he became unresponsive and in spite of paramedics gaining a heart rate while at the scene, he subsequently went into asystole en route to the hospital and could not be resuscitated.

The emergency room physician noted in the hospital record that they were unable to measure any vital signs at the emergency department and Mr. Smelts was pronounced dead on arrival.

Pursuant to Part 4, ss.39 of the BC Coroners Act, the following recommendation is forwarded to the Chief Coroner of the Province of British Columbia for distribution to the appropriate agency:

#### RECOMMENDATION OF THE JURY

To: Honorable George Abbott Minister of Health 1515 Blanshard St., Victoria, BC V8W 3C8

1. Additional funded treatment facilities should be made available for people with mental health and or/drug related issues.

The jury heard evidence from Mr. Smelt's sisters about his long struggle with mental health and drug addiction. The sisters felt their brother suffered from a mental health disorder in conjunction with a drug addiction. His sister testified that mental health and addiction go hand in hand and need to be treated together. One visit to a hospital resulted in staff providing him with a pamphlet when he went there and asked for help. The family has learnt since his death that there are a lot of other families that have members like David Smelts.

#### Jury Statement:

The jury finds that law enforcement and emergency personnel acted in an appropriate, efficient and professional manner.
