Stz' uminus Forest Agreement (the "Agreement")

Between:

Stz' uminus also known as Chemainus First Nation As represented by the Chemainus First Nation Chief and Council (the "Chemainus First Nation")

And

Her Majesty the Queen in Right of the Province of British Columbia As represented by the Minister of Forests and Range ("British Columbia")

(collectively the "Parties")

Whereas:

- A. British Columbia and First Nations Leadership Council, representing the Assembly of First Nations-BC Region, First Nations Summit, and Union of BC Indian Chiefs ("Leadership Council") has entered into a New Relationship in which they are committed to the reconciliation of Aboriginal and Crown titles and jurisdiction, and have agreed to implement a government-to-government relationship based on respect, recognition and accommodation of Aboriginal title and rights.
- B. This Agreement is in the spirit and vision of the "New Relationship".
- C. Work is underway regarding the implementation of the New Relationship and that this Agreement may need to be amended in the future to reflect the outcomes of that work.
- D. The Chemainus First Nation has a relationship to the land that is important to its culture and the maintenance of its community, governance and economy.
- E. The Chemainus First Nation has Aboriginal Interests within its Traditional Territory as shown by the bold line on the map attached as Appendix A.
- F. The Parties wish to enter into an interim measures agreement in relation to forest and/or range resource development within the Traditional Territory.

- G. References in this Agreement to Crown Lands are without prejudice to the Chemainus First Nation's Aboriginal title and/or rights claims over those lands.
- H. British Columbia intends to consult and to seek an Interim Accommodation with the Chemainus First Nation on forest and/or range resource development activities proposed within the Chemainus First Nation Traditional Territory that may lead to the infringement of the Chemainus First Nation's Aboriginal Interests.
- The Chemainus First Nation intends to participate in any consultation with British Columbia or a Licensee, in relation to forest and/or range resource development activities proposed within the Chemainus First Nation's Traditional Territory, that may lead to an infringement of the Chemainus First Nation's Aboriginal Interests.
- J. British Columbia and the Chemainus First Nation wish to resolve issues relating to forest and/or range resource development where possible through negotiation as opposed to litigation.

Therefore the Parties agree as follows:

1.0 Definitions

For the purposes of this Agreement, the following definitions apply:

- 1.1 "Operational Decision" means a decision that is made by a person with respect to the statutory approval of an Operational Plan that has potential effect in the Chemainus First Nation's Traditional Territory.
- 1.2 "Operational Plan" means a Forest Development Plan, Forest Stewardship Plan, Woodlot Licence Plan, a Range Use Plan, or Range Stewardship Plan that has a potential effect in the Chemainus First Nation's Traditional Territory.
- 1.3 "Aboriginal Interests" means aboriginal rights and/or aboriginal title.
- 1.4 "Administrative Decision" means one or more of the following decisions made by a person under forestry legislation.
 - The making, varying or postponing of Allowable Annual Cut (AAC) determinations for a Timber Supply Area or a Forest Tenure;
 - The issuance, consolidation, subdivision, amendment or boundary adjustment of a Forest Tenure or a Range Tenure;
 - The adjustment of Animal Unit Months in a Range Tenure;

CH J.

The extension to the term of, or replacement of a Forest and/or Range

- The disposition of volumes of timber arising from undercut decisions on a Forest Tenure;
- The conversion of a Forest Tenure to a different form of Forest Tenure;
- The reallocation of harvesting rights as a result of the implementation of the Forestry Revitalization Act;
- The issuance of a Special Use Permit;
- The decision regarding approval or extension of a Tree Farm Licence Management Plan, Community Forest Management Plan and/or Woodlot Licence Management Plan;
- · The deletion or addition of provincial forest;
- The transfer of AAC between Timber Supply Areas;
- The removal of private land from a Tree Farm Licence; and.
- The establishment of an interpretive forest site, recreation site and/or recreation trail.
- 1.5 "Forest Tenure" means an agreement granting rights to harvest Crown timber as defined in the *Forest Act*.
- 1.6 "Range Tenure" means an agreement granting rights over Crown range as defined in the Range Act.
- 1.7 "Traditional Territory" means the Chemainus First Nation's asserted Traditional Territory as shown on bold black on the map attached in Appendix A.
- 1.8 "Licensee" means a holder of a Forest Tenure or a Range Tenure.
- 1.9 "Interim Accommodation" means the accommodation provided in this Agreement, of the potential infringements of the economic component of the Chemainus First Nation's Aboriginal Interests arising from or as a result of forest and range development, prior to the full reconciliation of these Interests. The revenue component reflects the present budget limitations of the Minister of Forests and Range. It is acknowledged that other accommodations, including economic accommodations, may be jointly developed by the Parties during the term of this Agreement.

2.0 Purpose and Objectives

The purposes and objectives of this Agreement are to:

2.1 Create viable economic opportunities and to assist in the improvement of social conditions of the Chemainus First Nation through economic diversification.

- 2.2 Provide interim payment and other economic benefits to the Chemainus First Nation through a forest tenure opportunity and/or economic benefits related to forestry received by British Columbia from forest resource development.
- 2.3 Address consultation and provide Interim Accommodation, as set out in this Agreement.
- 2.4 Provide a period of stability to forest and/or range resource development on Crown lands within the Traditional Territory of the Chemainus First Nation during the term of this Agreement, while longer term interests are addressed through other agreements or processes.

3.0 Economic Benefits to the Chemainus First Nation

During the term of this Agreement, British Columbia will provide one or more of the following economic benefits to the Chemainus First Nation:

3.1 Forest Tenure

- 3.1.1 After the execution of this Agreement and, if applicable, once volume becomes available through the timber reallocation process, the Minister will expand the Chemainus First Nation's existing Woodlot Licence (WL 1713) to 800 hectares as generally outlined in black bold (Expansion W1713) on the map attached as Appendix B.
- 3.1.2 After the execution of this Agreement and, if applicable, once volume becomes available through the timber reallocation process, the Minister will invite Chemainus First Nation to apply under section 47.3 of the Forest Act for a second Woodlot Licence of up to 800 hectares in size as outlined in black bold (WL 1906) on the map attached as Appendix C.
- 3.1.3 A Woodlot Licence entered into as a result of an invitation to apply under Sections 3.1.1 and 3.1.2 of this Agreement:
 - 3.1.3.1 Will be for a term of no longer than 20 years, as determined by the Minister;
 - 3.1.3.2 Will contain a term that the Woodlot Licence will not expire or terminate solely because this Agreement terminates pursuant to Section 7.3;
 - 3.1.3.3 Will include a term that Chemainus First Nation may not dispose of the Woodlot Licence except in accordance with the Forest Act;

CF (V) Cz

- 3.1.3.4 Will contain other terms and conditions required by law, including the condition that Chemainus First Nation must comply with this Agreement; and,
- 3.1.3.5 Will include other terms and conditions as may be required by the regional or district manager.
- 3.1.4 The Minister may invite the Chemainus First Nation to apply for subsequent licences under the *Forest Act* for a term that would commence after the expiry of this Agreement.

3.2 Interim Payment

- 3.2.1 During the term of this Agreement, British Columbia will make an interim payment to the Chemainus First Nation of \$529,800 annually.
- 3.2.2 The funding commitment set out in section 3.2.1 is subject to the availability of annual appropriations for that purpose by British Columbia.
- 3.2.3 Subject to the Parties entering into this Agreement by March 30, 2007, the effective date for calculating the first interim payment will be September 1, 2006.
- 3.2.4 Upon signing of this Agreement, the Chemainus First Nation will be paid the full revenues for one year (\$529,800). Subsequent payments will be made at the end of each quarter starting at the quarter ending September 30, 2007.
- 3.2.5 For the purposes of determining amounts for partial years, one-fourth (i.e. ½) of the annual amount will be used for each fiscal quarter or part thereof that the Agreement is in effect. Payments will be made quarterly.
- 3.2.6 In the circumstances that the Chemainus First Nation provides notice under section 7.3, to terminate the agreement, and the termination date is prior to March 30, 2008, the Chemainus First Nation agrees to reimburse the Government of British Columbia an amount equivalent to the total of the payment they have received under section 3.2.4 minus the amount calculated under section 3.2.7 for the period of time between March 30, 2007 and the date that the agreement is terminated.
- 3.2.7 For the purposes of determining the amount that the Chemainus First Nation will reimburse to the Government of British Columbia under section 3.2.6, the amount will be determined by calculating the number of days between March 30, 2007 and the termination

date, determining the percentage of the fiscal year that those days represent, converting that percentage into a dollar amount and deducting that dollar amount from the payment received by the Chemainus First Nation under 3.2.4

3.2.8 British Columbia will not seek to direct or influence the expenditure of the funds provided to the First Nation.

4.0 Capacity Funding

British Columbia (through the Forest Management Team) shall work with 4.1 Chemainus First Nation to establish a budget in relation to projected cost of implementation of the consultation efforts referred to in section 6.0 for each year of the 5 years of this Agreement following March 31, 2007 for the purposes of assisting the Chemainus First Nation in making an application to the New Relationship Trust Fund to assist with such costs.

5.0 Consultation and Accommodation Regarding Operational and Administrative Decisions and Plans

- The Chemainus First Nation is entitled to full consultation with respect to all 5.1 potential infringements of their Aboriginal Interests arising from any Operational or Administrative Decisions or Plans affecting the Chemainus First Nation's Aboriginal Interests, regardless of benefits provided under this Agreement.
- 5.2 The parties agree to address consultation on Administrative Decisions, Operational Decisions and Operational Plans through participation of the Chemainus First Nation in strategic level planning processes.
- During the term of this Agreement, and subject to the terms and the intent 5.3 of this Agreement being met and adherence by British Columbia, the Chemainus First Nation agrees that British Columbia will have provided an Interim Accommodation with respect to the economic component of potential infringements of the Chemainus First Nation's Aboriginal Interests as an interim measure as a result of forest activities occurring within their Traditional Territory.
- The interim payment set out in this Agreement reflects an amount that 5.4 British Columbia, through the Minister of Forests and Range is able to pay as an interim measure, which the Chemainus First Nation has agreed to accept.

The Province acknowledges that the timber opportunities and funding 5.5 provided through this Agreement are an interim accommodation only and

their Traditional Territory.

- 5.6 British Columbia acknowledges that the extent of private land holdings as a result of the E&N Railway grant on southern Vancouver Island limits the amount of Crown timber available to provide economic opportunities for the Chemainus First Nation.
- 5.7 Nothing in this Agreement restricts the ability of the Chemainus First Nation to seek additional accommodation for impacts on its Aboriginal Interests from forest resource development within its Traditional Territory.
- The Parties will use every reasonable effort to agree upon collaborative arrangements for implementing this Agreement that will include establishing a Chemainus First Nation/Ministry of Forests and Range Forest Management Team ("FMT") and a framework for information sharing and consultation, within three months of signing this Agreement. When completed, a Terms of Reference for the FMT and a consultation protocol will be attached to this Agreement as Appendix D and E, respectively.
- 5.9 The Chemainus First Nation agrees that in consideration of the economic benefits provided by the Government of British Columbia in section 3.0, the Government of British Columbia has provided an interim accommodation with respect to the economic component of potential infringements of the Chemainus First Nation's Aboriginal Interests resulting from Operational and Administrative Decisions made by statutory decision-makers from time to time during the term of this Agreement.
- 5.10 Any Administrative Decision made by the Government of British Columbia shall not be interpreted as concurrence by the Chemainus First Nation unless expressly stated.
- 5.11 Where the Chemainus First Nation is a member of a larger Tribal Nation, this Agreement does not limit the obligation of British Columbia to fulfil its consultation obligations with the Tribal Nation.

6.0 <u>Dispute Resolution</u>

6.1 If a dispute arises between British Columbia and the Chemainus First Nation regarding the interpretation of a provision of this Agreement, the Parties or their duly appointed representatives will meet as soon as is practicable to attempt to resolve the dispute.

**The Columbia and the Chemainus First Nation regarding the interpretation of a provision of this Agreement, the Parties or their duly appointed representatives will meet as soon as is practicable to attempt to resolve the dispute.

- 6.2 If the Parties are unable to resolve differences at the appropriate level, the interpretation issue will be raised to more senior levels of British Columbia
- 6.3 If the interpretation dispute cannot be resolved by the Parties directly, they may appoint an independent and mutually agreeable mediator to resolve that dispute within 60 days, or such period as agreed upon, or the Parties may choose other appropriate approaches to assist in reaching resolution of the interpretation issue.

7.0 Term and Termination

7.1 The term of this Agreement is 5 years.

and the Chemainus First Nation

- 7.2 This Agreement will take effect on the date on which the last Party has executed it.
- 7.3 This Agreement will terminate on the occurrence of the earliest of:
 - 7.3.1 The expiry of its term;
 - 7.3.2 90 days notice by one Party to the other Party; or,
 - 7.3.3 The mutual agreement of the Parties.
- 7.4 Neither Party shall terminate this Agreement on the grounds that the other Party has challenged an Administrative or Operational Decision by way of legal proceedings.
- 7.5 Prior to the expiry of the 90 days when 90 day notice of termination has been given under Section 7.3, the Parties agree to meet and endeavour to resolve the issue that has given rise to the 90 day notice of termination.

8.0 Renewal of the Agreement

- 8.1 Prior to the expiry of the term of this Agreement, if the terms and conditions of this Agreement are being met, British Columbia and the Chemainus First Nation will seek the necessary authorities and approvals to enter into negotiations to renew this Agreement, or to conclude a new forestry agreement, consistent with the New Relationship.
- 8.2 Any subsequent forestry agreement between British Columbia and the Chemainus First Nation may provide for an opportunity to acquire a licence, other forest tenures, and/or other economic benefits, as well as other terms and conditions that are agreed to by the Parties.

9.0 Amendment of Agreement

- 9.1 Any alteration or amendment to the terms and conditions of the Agreement must be in writing and duly executed by the Parties.
- 9.2 Either Party may request the participation of the other Party to review the effectiveness of this Agreement annually and consider amendments to this Agreement.
- The Parties agree that new approaches for consultation and accommodation, including benefit and revenue sharing, will be developed as a priority under the New Relationship by British Columbia and the Leadership Council. The Chemainus First Nation may choose to opt into such approaches as they become available, through amendment of this Agreement or other mutually agreeable methods.

10.0 Entire Agreement

10.1 This Agreement and any amendment to it constitute the entire Agreement between the Parties with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement.

11.0 Notice

- Any notice or other communication that is required to be given or that a Party wishes to give to the other Party with respect to this Agreement, will be in writing and will be effective if delivered, sent by registered mail, or transmitted by facsimile to the address of the other Party as in this section of the Agreement.
- Any notice or other communications will be deemed to have been given on the date it is actually received, if received before 4:00 p.m. If received after 4:00 p.m., it will be deemed to have been received on the next business day.
- 11.3 The address of either Party may be changed by notice in the manner set out in this section of the Agreement.

12.0 Miscellaneous

- 12.1 This Agreement shall be interpreted in a manner consistent with provincial, federal and constitutional law.
- 12.2 This Agreement is not a treaty or a lands claims agreement within the meaning of sections 25 and 35 of the *Constitution Act*, 1982 and does not define or amend aboriginal rights, or limit any priorities afforded to aboriginal rights, including aboriginal title.
- 12.3 This Agreement does not address or prejudice conflicting interests or competing claims between First Nations.
- 12.4 This Agreement will not limit the positions that a Party may take in future negotiations or court actions.
- The Province acknowledges and enters into this Agreement on the basis that the Chemainus First Nation has Aboriginal Interests within their Traditional Territory and further that the specific nature, scope or geographic extent of Aboriginal Interests of the Chemainus First Nation have not yet been determined. Broader processes engaged in to bring about reconciliation will result in a common understanding of the nature, scope and geographic extent of Aboriginal Interests or treaty interests of the Chemainus First Nation.
- 12.6 Nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted to authorize any infringement that may occur following the termination of this Agreement, even if that infringement is caused by a decision that was made during the term of this Agreement.
- This Agreement does not address or affect any claims by the Chemainus First Nation regarding infringement of its Aboriginal Interests arising from past Operational or Administrative Decisions made previous to the signing of this Agreement.

- This Agreement and any decisions and or Licenses issued during the term 12.8 of this Agreement do not change or affect the positions either Party has, or may have, regarding jurisdiction and authorities.
- Any reference to a statute in this Agreement includes all regulations made 12.9 under that statute and any amendments or replacement of that statute and its regulations.
- There will be no presumption that any ambiguity in any of the terms of this 12.10 Agreement should be interpreted in favour of either Party.
- The applicable laws of British Columbia and Canada shall govern this 12.11 Agreement.
- British Columbia encourages Licensees to enter into mutually-beneficial 12.12 arrangements with the Chemainus First Nation.
- This Agreement is not intended to limit any obligation of Licensees or other 12.13 third parties to the Chemainus First Nation.
- This Agreement may be entered into by each Party signing a separate 12.14 copy of this Agreement, including a photocopy or faxed copy, and delivering it to the other Party by fax. Each facsimile will be deemed to be an original for all purposes and all counterparts taken together will be deemed to constitute one document.
- This Agreement does not exclude the Chemainus First Nation from 12.15 accessing forestry economic opportunities and benefits, which may be available, other than those expressly, set out in this Agreement.

13.0 Giving Effect to the New Relationship

- Notwithstanding this agreement, the Parties will, at the request of the 13.1 Chemainus First Nation, enter into discussions, and may negotiate interim agreements in relation to forestry, range and related planning that give effect to the New Relationship, which may include, but are not limited to the following components:
 - a process for shared decision making about the land and resources; (a)
 - (b) new mechanisms for land and resource protection;
 - a process for the Chemainus First Nation's land use planning at all (c) spatial scales and for reconciliation of Crown and the Chemainus First Nation's plans; KERDIE A J.S

- (d) dispute resolution processes which are mutually determined for resolving conflicts rather than adversarial approaches to resolving conflicts:
- (e) financial capacity for the Chemainus First Nation and resourcing for British Columbia to develop and implement new frameworks for shared land and resource decision making and other components listed above; and
- (f) on a priority basis, interim protection for landscapes, watersheds and/or sites identified by the Chemainus First Nation to be reserved from resource development pending the outcome of negotiation of agreements referred to in a-e above.
- The Parties acknowledge that there are broader processes underway with respect to the New Relationship which will benefit and, at times assist, the Parties in negotiating with respect to the issues set out in section 14.1.




