Visual Quality Objectives (VQOs) are acceptable degrees of change from the natural-appearing landscape caused by land-use alterations. VQOs are initially based on visual landscape inventory information. Biological, economic technical and social considerations may influence the final VQOs which are established by the M.O.F. District Manager or contained in higher level plans.
