Heritage Capacity and Economic Impact Survey



Statistical Summary: 2010-2020

The table below includes the 2010 though 2020 results of the Heritage Capacity and Economic Impact (HCEI) survey, formerly known as the Building Capacity for Heritage Conservation survey. The annual survey raises awareness of heritage conservation tools and emphasizes the strategies that are most effective in building heritage conservation capacity at the local level. The survey facilitates the assessment of heritage conservation capacity across the province and provides information to support Heritage Branch policy planning.

While annual, we do not receive information for all local governments in the province, the information we do have allows us to know the minimum number of heritage planning tools implemented and the total amount spent by participating

local governments on heritage conservation in a calendar year. It is important to note that each year's results should be seen as a baseline of information for that year, and that the results for all years are not an indication of growth or change over time.

The survey is a tool that evolves each year. Prior to 2016, the survey was sent to all local governments each year, and each year the number of respondents and the set of local governments responding to the survey changed. In 2016 to 2018, the BCHC survey was sent to local governments according to a six-year distribution system based on population. In 2019 and 2020, the survey was sent to all local governments and the responses were extrapolated based on population size to approximate the responses for all 190 local governments. The basic content of measuring key heritage conservation capacity indicators remains consistent.

⁴ These results are extrapolated according to the distribution plan described above the table. It was generated using the following formula: total for every year group + (total for the every three years group x 3) + (total for the every six years group x 6).

⁵ These results are extrapolated using a different method than previous years to approximate for all 190 local governments.

⁶ In 2019 the total reported number includes both heritage commissions and similar entities.

⁸ This represents the responses to the question: "Does your local government have full time or part time staff?" Therefore, it is not a representation of the total number of full-time or part-time staff but the number of local governments with full-time staff.

⁹ This represents the response to the question "How many full-time staff spend a portion of their time working on heritage matters?" Therefore, it is not a representation of the percentage of time full time staff spend working on heritage matters.

¹⁰ This is based on the response to the question of how many hours employees spent a month working on heritage planning and projects. The amount is equivalent to full time employees categorized as working 70 hours a month.

¹¹ This question changed in 2019 to include a multiple choice response of what environmental benefits are considered when they are a factor in planning decisions.
