

Foundation Agreement

This landmark reconciliation agreement between shishalh Nation (shishalh) and B.C., signed in October 2018, recognizes and respects Aboriginal title and rights, and supports self-determination and self-government. The provincial government and shishalh are working together to protect the environment, as well as promote economic opportunity and growth for shishalh and the entire Sunshine Coast region.

Recent Updates

- Following a review under the B.C. Geographical Naming Policy, three place names within the shishalh swiya / Sunshine Coast area have been changed effective 26 March 2021:
 - Wilson Creek (community) changed to ts'ukw'um (community)
 - ➤ Wilson Creek (creek) changed to ts'ukw'um (creek)
 - Saltery Bay (bay) changed to **skelhp** (bay)
- Recognizing Indigenous place names is a key part of B.C.'s broader reconciliation efforts and part of B.C.'s implementation of the *Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act*. Article 13 specifically refers to place names.

- The multi-stage process required for the transfer of District Lot (DL) 1592 is beginning:
 - ➤ B.C. and shishalh have started the initial steps to resolve interests and land encumbrances on DL 1592.
 - > Engagement with local governments and some stakeholders has begun.
 - ➤ The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure has started engagement with shishalh on the Bypass Corridor in support of the transfer of DL 1592.







Recent Updates Continued

- Since the release of the Pender Harbour Dock Management Plan, 148 replacement tenures out of a total of 294 have been issued and progress continues to be made.
- B.C. and shishalh are bringing additional *Land Act* authorizations into Shared Decision-Making as outlined in the Foundation Agreement. *Land Act* authorizations for docks are currently being reviewed under the Shared Decision-Making umbrella, and the plan to include all other *Land Act* authorizations is in development. More information will be shared as the details become available.
- B.C. and shishalh are also bringing Existing Use Groundwater Licensing into Shared Decision-Making. This will be the first shared decision-making under the *Water Sustainability Act* and a working group has been collaboratively developing processes under this new legislation.

Upcoming

- B.C. and shishalh have developed a website, public brochure and guidance materials to help communicate the Shared Decision-Making Review Process for moorages in the swiya. The communication materials and info for the new website will be distributed this summer.
- The shishalh-B.C. Land Use Planning group will continue to carry out studies and collect background information this summer to help inform future land use planning discussions.
- An Engagement Summary Report, outlining what was heard during the initial engagement on the land use planning process, will be posted on the shishalh-B.C. land use planning project website in June.
