# Certification Inspection Report BRITISH COLUMBIA PROGRAM

#### **INTRODUCTION**

On November 23 and 24, a certification inspection was completed on Maple Leaf Foreign National School—Yiwu (MLFNS-Yiwu) in Yiwu, Zhejiang province, People's Republic of China, referred to as the School in this report. The purpose of this inspection was to determine if the requirements for the British Columbia (BC) education program have been met, according to the *BC Offshore School Program Certification Agreement* (the Agreement). The inspection team (the Team), appointed by the Executive Director of the Independent Schools and International Education Branch, British Columbia Ministry of Education and Child Care (the Ministry) in accordance with the Agreement, consisted of Darren Spyksma and Dr Laurie Anderson, who served as Chair for this inspection.

The School's BC program has an enrolment of 202 students, in grades 1 to 12 (an increase of six since September when the School's Annual Report was submitted). The School shares a campus with the Chinese host school, which has an enrolment of approximately 1,000 students.

During the visit to the School, the Team reviewed all standards required in the *BC Offshore School Program Certification Agreement* and *Operating Manual* and met with the Chinese host school Principal, Offshore School Representative (OSR), BC Principal and all the BC teachers.

The Owner/Operator, China Maple Leaf Educational Systems (CMLES) is responsible for the BC program. The parent company, Maple Leaf Education Systems (MLES) is an international organization with over 46,000 students in all grades in several countries. Maple Leaf Schools were founded in Dalian in 1995 and opened the first BC certified offshore school there in 1997. The China division of MLES has elementary, secondary and foreign nationals schools throughout the country.

The BC program's philosophy, objectives and special features include an emphasis on the best features of both the western and Chinese educational models. This includes critical thinking, academic excellence, balancing innovation and tradition, and the strong belief that every child



possesses a strong desire to learn, to understand the world, and to share their acquired knowledge with others.

The Team would like to thank MLFNS-Yiwu for its hospitality, cooperation and preparedness for the inspection visit.

The plan has already yielded positive results, with the school population now at 202, an increase of six students since September, and almost 70% increase since the 2019 pre-COVID-19 enrolment of 124. The source of students at the School remains the children of foreign nationals engaged in businesses in Yiwu.

The School's policies and procedures in this area have also been fully vetted by the Offshore School Representative (OSR). The School has a well developed policy on emergency procedures, including contingency plans in the event of an extended closure.

There is a full-time nurse in the School and in the event of serious injuries, there are several hospitals nearby.

Comment:

The Team reviewed curriculum planning documents and interviewed teachers to confirm that BC's curriculum has been implemented from grade 1 to grade 12.

Course overviews, unit plans, and sample lesson plans demonstrated integration of selfassessment of Core Competencies, First Peoples Principles of Learning, as well as Big Ideas and curricular competencies. The anticipated need for differentiation to student learning needs was also evident in the planning documentation. Commendation:

The Principal and staff are commended for organized documentation that accurately reflects BC's curriculum.

Comment:

The School uses the admissions process to get an accurate understanding of students' English language proficiency prior to admissions. The School uses various tools, such as school-wide assessments and the Foundations Skills Assessment (FSA) to track growth over time for each student. Teachers are aware of the language needs within their classroom and work to differentiate their instruction to meet these individual needs. There is some English language support available outside of the classroom and plans are in place to increase this support as the population grows.

## Commendation:

Teachers are commended for creating learning environments that adjust to the needs of the students, emphasizing the importance of English language acquisition throughout all subject areas.

## Comment:

The School meets the course credit requirements for the graduate learning years. All required courses are provided by the School in person with an anticipation that some elective courses will be offered as online courses in the second semester if the number of students interested in a specific course is low and there is not a teacher available to teach the course.

The School does not offer any Board/Authority Authorized (BAA) courses at this time.

Commendation:

The Principal and teachers are commended for prioritizing face-to-face learning for all of the required courses in the graduate learning years.

(e) of the Agreement; namely, that all BC program courses offered in the School meet or exceed Ministry learning outcomes/learning standards identified in the educational program guides for each course.

Comment:

The course planning documentation exceeds the requirements, and all documentation is collated, organized, and updated to ensure that new staff have a starting point in their teaching rather than having to create something new as they begin teaching at the School.

The classrooms are well supplied with learning resources including manipulatives for numeracy instruction. The classrooms have small English libraries, and they are used as part of daily reading. The classrooms contain relevant curricular resources both for hands-on activities and as paper-based learning resources. Teachers have access to an adequate amount of funds to purchase new resources that they need to fulfill the expectations of learning with BC's curriculum. The School is in the process of improving the resources in the science laboratory to make better use of the space as a learning area. The School also has a computer lab to support the use of online learning resources such as IXL.
