About the North Cowichan Active Transportation Overpass

The proposed new overpass will connect people travelling on foot or rolling (for example, using a bicycle, wheelchair or scooter) safely across Highway 1. It will also help to maintain the flow of traffic along Highway 1 by reducing vehicle turning conflicts.

By making it easier to get around without a car, it will help to support the actions B.C. is taking through CleanBC to lower climate-changing emissions by 30% by 2030.

Why is the Project needed?

Today, there are no safe options for people to cross Highway 1 between Beverly Street and James Street/ York Road intersections — a distance of more than 700 metres. Approximately 30% of all pedestrian movements across this section of Highway 1 are against existing signed pedestrian restrictions or in areas where at-grade pedestrian crossings may not be safe.

With the opening of the new 1,100-student Quw'utsun Secondary School in 2024, the number of people crossing the highway to reach restaurants and businesses is expected to grow considerably.




The North Cowichan Active Transportation Overpass is a proposed new active transportation overpass that will cross Highway 1 between Beverly Street and James Street/York Road.

Project features

4.2m-wide overpass with a grade of 6% to accommodate people walking and rolling (for example, using bicycles, wheelchairs and scooters)

Stairs by the southeast and southwest corners to improve connections on either side of Highway 1

Additional features, including fencing along landscape center median to discourage jay-walking and full lighting along the new overpass

Aesthetically pleasing bridge design

Closure of left turns into businesses along Highway 1 between Beverly Street and York Road to improve overall safety for people and cars.

What other options did we consider?


We considered 7 potential overpass designs. The design that you see on this board was chosen because it meets the project objectives related to safety and accessibility, does not require cyclists to dismount, and has the least impact on neighbouring properties.



Project features



Improved active transportation safety: Providing a grade-separated protected crossing option for people walking and rolling over Highway 1, eliminating unsafe mid-block at-grade pedestrian crossings.



Traffic flow and safety for drivers: Improving traffic flow and reducing the potential for collisions along Highway 1 by closing mid-block left turn bays.



Greater connectivity and mobility: Building an overpass that is designed for people travelling using bicycles, wheelchairs and scooters as well as on foot, including improved connections to the local active transportation network.





Overpass appearance:

The new overpass will be designed to fit in with the surrounding community. It will include improved landscaping and existing overhead utility lines will be moved underground.

Improved access management:

New curbs will help drivers to easily identify business access locations and to see the difference between the driveable part of the road and the pedestrian part of the road when they are turning.
