

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Sea-to-Sky Land and Resource Management Plan (LRMP)

The Sea-to-Sky LRMP is a sub-regional strategic land and resource plan covering approximately 1,091,000 hectares of land. The plan area includes the communities of Lions Bay, Squamish, Whistler and Pemberton and also overlaps with the traditional territories of the In-SHUCK-ch, Lil'wat, Musqueam, N'quatqua, Sto:lo, Squamish and Tsleil-Waututh First Nations. This high profile area has been subject to land use issues related to rapid development and increased public use of Crown land and resources. The Sea-to-Sky LRMP planning process was initiated in 2001 in an effort to address some of these issues by trying to balance the economic, environmental, and social interests within the area while also giving consideration to the wider regional and provincial context. In general, the Sea-to-Sky LRMP harmonized the outcomes from stakeholder-driven land use planning processes and negotiated land use agreements with First Nations. The Sea-to-Sky LRMP was completed and approved in April 2008.

Monitoring Approach

The monitoring approach developed for the Sea-to-Sky LRMP is more streamlined than traditional LRMP monitoring in an effort to be more needs-focussed and cost-effective. The Sea-to-Sky monitoring approach simply focuses on the state of implementation progress for 140 key Sea-to-Sky LRMP implementation items, as reported by provincial agencies. It does not explore the effectiveness or validation of the Sea-to-Sky LRMP implementation strategies.

Implementation Progress Report

The Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation Progress Report identifies key implementation items and monitors their implementation status, while also noting any factors affecting their implementation. This implementation progress report is intended to serve as an information tool to support discussion on implementation of the Sea-to-Sky LRMP by agencies on the South Coast Management Committee and by First Nations, local governments and key stakeholders on the Sea-to-Sky LRMP Plan Implementation Committee. It reports on implementation progress during the nine month period from April 18, 2008 to January 15, 2009.

Project Implementation Status

10 (45%) of the Projects have had their implementation processes initiated. *Resource Issues* were reported to be the main factor affecting implementation. Projects appear to be more resource-dependent implementation items.

Task Implementation Status


4 (29%) of the Tasks have had their implementation processes initiated. *Resource Issues* and competing priorities were reported to be the main factors affecting implementation. Tasks also appear to be more resource-dependent implementation items.

Legal Practice Implementation Status

93 (90%) of the legal Practices have their implementation processes *Initiated* and 36 (35%) of the items are *Midway to Complete*. *Additional Time Required* was reported to be the most significant factor affecting the implementation of 54 (52%) legal Practices. The legal Practices appear to be more process-dependent implementation items that require longer periods of time to implement.

Overall Implementation Status

The following bar graph gives a summary view of the implementation status for all 140 items.



This implementation progress report monitored 22 Projects, 14 Tasks and 104 legal Practices based upon the implementation status date of January 15, 2009. Of the 140 implementation items monitored, 107 of the items (76%) were reported to have begun their implementation processes, 44 (31%) were *Midway* to *Complete*, 12 (9%) were *Substantially Complete* to *Complete*, and 2 (1%) were *Complete*. It was also reported that the implementation processes for 33 (23%) of the items had not yet been started. The overall status of LRMP implementation is heavily influenced by a small number of regulatory implementation processes for legal Practices as the legal Practices are associated with a small number of legal tools and make-up almost 75% of all monitored items.

Overall, this first Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation Progress Report indicates that provincial agencies have made progress towards the implementation of the LRMP during the nine months from plan completion to the reporting date of January 15, 2009. The second Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation Progress Report is scheduled for March 2010.

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1.0 BACKGROUND AND INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background

1.1.1 Strategic Land and Resource Planning Context in BC

BC's strategic land and resource planning program began in the early 1990's as a response to an international call for sustainability and to growing competition and conflict over Crown lands and resources. During this time, BC's Commission on Resources and the Environment (CORE) developed a Provincial Land Use Strategy that provided the vision and foundation for the development of strategic land and resource planning processes in the Province. In general, Strategic Land and Resource Plans (SLRPs) have been used as a tool to help ease land use conflict among resource agencies, industry, First Nations and the public while also helping to deliver on the Province's Protected Areas Strategy. At this point, more than 85% of the British Columbia is covered by some form of completed strategic land use plan. With the demand for large sub-regional strategic land and resource plans diminishing and the Province increasing its efforts to engage with First Nations, strategic land and resource planning has changed in order to adapt to a new contextual setting.

In 2005, the Province of British Columbia and the First Nations Leadership Council committed to a "New Relationship" vision that focused on addressing Aboriginal concerns through openness, transparency and collaboration in an effort to reduce uncertainty, litigation and conflict for all British Columbians. The development of the "New Relationship" vision signalled the provincial government's commitment to engage with First Nations more on a government-to-government basis. Strategic land and resource planning offered a natural meeting place for the province and First Nations to work towards the "New Relationship" vision.

First Nations have come to play an increasingly important role in strategic land and resource planning in BC. First Nations have become more involved in processes and institutions for shared decision-making about lands and resources. This shift towards more collaborative land and resource planning has gone beyond conventional consultation on proposed SLRP products and has moved towards more meaningful engagement with First Nations in all aspects of strategic land and resource plans. This increased level of collaboration has lead to a greater level of understanding and respect for First Nations interests and cultural values for lands and resources in BC.

In 2007, the Province of British Columbia developed a new vision for strategic land use planning that strived to be more flexible and responsive to current and emerging government priorities while also meeting its New Relationship commitments to First Nations. This new direction reaffirmed the benefits of strategic land use planning but also acknowledged the high costs of comprehensive planning in a time of limited government resources and competing government priorities. As a result, the province challenged itself to deliver SLRP planning, implementation and monitoring activities in a more focussed and cost-effective manner.

1.1.2 Land and Resource Management Plans (LRMPs)

LRMPs are a sub-regional type of land use plan that provides the strategic vision and direction for the management of Crown land and natural resources. LRMPs use maps to identify broad land use zones that have associated goals, objectives and strategies. They basically identify where, how and when different activities may occur on Crown land. More generally, LRMPs help to provide a balanced long-term vision for a specific planning area based upon economic, environmental, social and cultural values.

To ensure that land and resource management decisions on Crown land take into account the needs of local communities, the economy and the environment, LRMPs provide opportunities for all parties with a key interest or stake in the plan to contribute to the plan. As such, LRMPs have been developed through integrated and participatory planning processes that invite input from provincial agencies, First Nations, local governments, non-government stakeholders and the general public. This LRMP planning approach has often been credited with the provision of the following benefits: increased engagement with First Nations; increased land use certainty; improved balance of competing land uses; reduced land and resource conflict; more responsible resource development; and the general advancement of economic, environmental, and cultural sustainability.

1.1.3 Development of the Sea-to-Sky LRMP


The Sea-to-Sky LRMP is a sub-regional strategic land and resource plan covering approximately 1,091,000 hectares of land. The plan area overlaps with the Squamish Forest District and is located north of greater Vancouver and to the east of the Sunshine Coast. The area includes the communities of Lions Bay, Squamish, Whistler and Pemberton and also overlaps with the traditional territories of the In-SHUCK-ch, Lil'wat, Musqueam, N'quatqua, Sto:lo, Squamish and Tsleil-Waututh First Nations. This high profile area has been subject to land use issues related to rapid development and increased public use of Crown land and resources. The Sea-to-Sky LRMP planning process was initiated in 2001 in an effort to address some of these issues by trying to balance the economic, environmental, and social interests within the area while also giving consideration to the wider regional and provincial context.

The Sea-to-Sky LRMP was largely built upon the recommendations submitted by a multi-sector public planning forum and the outcomes of government-to-government agreements with several local First Nations. The public phase of the planning process involved the development of plan recommendations by sector representatives at the planning table with additional input from an Elected Officials Forum made up of representatives from municipal and regional governments. This information was incorporated into the April 2006 Sea-to-Sky LRMP Consultation draft. This draft of the plan became the starting point for government-to-government negotiations with First Nations in the plan area. In general, the Sea-to-Sky LRMP utilized a "hybrid planning model" that harmonized the outcomes from stakeholder-driven land use planning processes and negotiated land use agreements with First Nations to develop the LRMP.

As part of the Sea-to-Sky LRMP process, the Province of British Columbia also carried out a socio-economic and environmental assessment in order to consider the social, economic and

environmental implications of implementing the plan. In the spring of 2008, the Sea-to-Sky LRMP was completed and approved. A map of the plan's land use zones is shown in Figure 1.

1.1.4 Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation Approach

The Province of British Columbia is responsible for the implementation and monitoring of the Sea-to-Sky LRMP. For the purposes of plan implementation and monitoring, the Sea-to-Sky LRMP Inter-agency Plan Implementation Team (IPIT) broke down all LRMP objectives, implementation direction and associated targets into implementation items defined as Projects, Tasks or Practices. These implementation items were compiled into a draft Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation List which serves as the main tool by which provincial agencies have identified their respective LRMP implementation and monitoring responsibilities. This implementation list is not a final inter-agency implementation plan but rather a working draft that provides guidance for current Sea-to-Sky LRMP implementation and monitoring activities. As such, the LRMP Implementation List is subject to ongoing updates and clarifications through agency implementation activities.

In total, the draft Sea-to- Sky LRMP Implementation List currently contains 348 implementation items: 22 Projects; 14 Tasks; and 312 Practices. Projects, Tasks and Practices are defined as:

Projects (22)

Projects are discrete activities such as more detailed area- or issue-specific studies or plans that help in meeting LRMP objectives. Projects may require specific funding beyond agency base budgets and operations.

Tasks (14)

Tasks are miscellaneous activities or smaller/discrete projects that agencies undertake as part of plan implementation. Tasks typically are completed within base budgets and operations.

Practices (312)

Practices provide ongoing long-term management direction in a prescriptive or results-based manner for uses and activities on Crown land. They guide the on-the-ground activities of government agencies and land and resource use proponents. Practices are categorized as being either a legal Practice (104 items) or a non-legal Practice (208 items). Legal Practices require the establishment of specific legal Orders to bring a Practice into effect. Non-legal Practices do not require a new legal Order to bring them into effect and are implemented by agencies through existing regulatory tools and policies and then incorporated into ongoing operational practices.

In the cases where it might take some time to determine, review, approve and/or enact a legal Practice, interim protection measures may be established. Interim protection measures have been established for certain Sea-to-Sky LRMP land use designations like Conservancies, Wildland Zones, Cultural Management Areas and Cultural Places. Once a final legal designation is in place, interim protection measures are removed.

Like all Strategic Land and Resource Plans, the implementation of the Sea-to-Sky LRMP is also subject to the availability of provincial resources and the consideration of other competing provincial government priorities. As such, some degree of implementation prioritization is expected as not all LRMP Projects, Tasks and Practices can be implemented at once. In this regard, the monitoring report and recommendations from the Plan Implementation Committee (PIC) can provide valuable information to the South Coast Management Committee (SCMC) and individual agencies to consider during annual business planning processes.

There are four First Nations in the Sea-to-Sky plan area that have agreements with the province that relate to the Sea-to-Sky LRMP: the Squamish, Lil'wat, In-SHUCK-ch, and Tsleil-Waututh First Nations. Of these First Nations, Squamish, Lil'wat and In-SHUCK-ch have specific Land Use Agreements that have been integrated into the Sea-to-Sky LRMP. First Nations are involved in implementation and monitoring activities through their participation on the Plan Implementation Committee and through government-to-government discussions on the implementation of their respective Land Use Agreements.

1.1.5 Sea-to-Sky LRMP Monitoring Approach

The Sea-to-Sky LRMP monitoring approach is guided by policy direction for land use planning in BC. While a variety of monitoring approaches have been used in the province over the years, current policy direction suggests that SLRP monitoring approaches be designed in way that is more needs-focussed and cost-effective. As a result, a more streamlined SLRP monitoring approach was developed for the Sea-to-Sky LRMP.

The Sea-to-Sky LRMP monitoring approach centers around *Implementation Monitoring*. In other words, it addresses the basic question, "Did we do what we said we were going to do?" In this monitoring approach, provincial agencies are asked to complete annual monitoring forms that note implementation priorities, progress and challenges for all implementation items identified as Projects, Tasks and legal Practices (140 total items). The lead agency for each implementation item is responsible for the completion of an annual monitoring form for that item based upon a status date of January 15, 2009 (Appendix B). The Integrated Land Management Bureau in collaboration with the Inter-agency Plan Implementation Team (IPIT) then consolidates all the monitoring form information into an annual monitoring report. Once a monitoring report is completed, it is shared with the South Coast Management Committee and the Sea-to-Sky LRMP Plan Implementation Committee. After reviewing the monitoring report, the Plan Implementation Committee may develop recommendations for the South Coast Management Committee on LRMP implementation.

The Sea-to-Sky LRMP monitoring approach assumes that the LRMP direction being implemented is sufficient to meet its correlated LRMP management objective(s). The monitoring approach does not formally capture any form of *Validation Monitoring* (which checks the assumption that the strategies used are appropriate to meet the correlated objectives) or *Effectiveness Monitoring* (which determines how effective the implementation strategies are at meeting the correlated plan objectives).

The Sea-to-Sky LRMP monitoring approach monitors the implementation status of legal Practices but does not include the monitoring of non-legal Practices. Non-legal Practices were not included in this monitoring report because of their large number and the onerous resourcing burden that would be required to monitor and formally report on them. This approach is in line with the more focussed and cost-effective Sea-to-Sky LRMP monitoring mandate.

1.2 Introduction

This LRMP monitoring report is described as an implementation progress report due to its monitoring focus on implementation progress.

1.2.1 Purpose of Implementation Progress Report

In general, the Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation Progress Report identifies key implementation items and monitors their implementation status while also noting the main factors affecting their implementation. The report is intended to serve as an information tool to support discussion between the South Coast Management Committee, individual agencies and the Plan Implementation Committee on implementation priorities, challenges and emerging issues in the Sea-to-Sky LRMP planning area. More specifically, the report provides a systematic approach for tracking the progress of the plan's implementation Projects, Tasks and legal Practices.

The sharing of implementation progress reports with provincial agencies, First Nations, local governments, and key stakeholders is intended to foster dialogue through the Plan Implementation Committee and government-to-government discussions that will help to ensure that the intent of the plan is reflected in land and resource decisions in the Sea-to-Sky area.

The development and sharing of this implementation progress report on an annual basis demonstrates provincial accountability and transparency in terms of Sea-to-Sky LRMP implementation. It is consistent with the draft provincial policy direction for the establishment of Plan Implementation and Monitoring Committees and also fulfills the provincial government's Sea-to-Sky LRMP commitment to make annual monitoring reports available to First Nations, key stakeholders and the broader public.

1.2.2 Format of Implementation Progress Report

The format for the Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation Progress Report is an adaption of the more comprehensive and traditional provincial LRMP monitoring format. The report format is in line with the more focussed and cost-effective Sea-to-Sky LRMP monitoring mandate.


Sections 2 to 4 of the report provide implementation progress information for the Sea-to-Sky LRMP implementation items defined as Projects, Tasks and legal Practices. These sections summarize the implementation status and key factors affecting implementation while also providing individual implementation item descriptions that act as a perpetual progress report template for future monitoring reports. The implementation item descriptions are sorted by the same General Management Direction categories that are found in the Sea-to-Sky LRMP.

Section 5 of the report provides a summary of the overall implementation status for all Projects, Tasks and legal Practices. This section also provides some general findings from the interpretation of the monitoring information contained in sections 2 to 4. Section 5 concludes with an acknowledgement of the reports limitations and some recommendations on how to improve the next Sea-to Sky LRMP Implementation Progress Report scheduled for March 2010.

2.0 PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION STATUS

2.1 Project Implementation Summary

There are 22 LRMP Projects being monitored in this implementation progress report. Projects are discrete activities such as more detailed area-/issue-specific studies or plans that help to meet LRMP objectives. Projects may require specific funding beyond agency base budgets and operations. Some Projects have outputs like management plans or the formation of an advisory committee, and others have outputs such as inventories, assessments and/or evaluations. Figure 2 shows the implementation status for Projects.



Agencies reported on three primary factors that can affect the implementation progress of Projects: *Changing Scope*, *Resource Issues* and *Additional Time Required*. The agencies reported that *Resource Issues* were a significant factor affecting implementation for 14 of the 22 Projects (64%) and that *Additional Time Required* was not a factor affecting implementation for 17 of the 22 Projects (77%).

Table 1 shows the key deliverables for the 22 Projects being monitored in this report. It also indicates the implementation status, priority, and estimated completion date as reported by implementing agencies.

Description:

The In-SHUCK-ch Mountain cultural site is a special management area and is managed as four sub-zones. Sub-zones 3 and Zone 4 are zones of forest stewardship harvesting which are subject to further planning³.

Objectives⁴:

• To conserve and maintain the integrity of First Nations' cultural and heritage resources by managing physical disturbance in this zone.

• To maintain landscape connectivity by managing harvest regimes, planning distribution of cutblocks and linking old growth management and established wildlife areas where possible.

Implementation Direction:

• Zone 3 will be guided by a forest stewardship program that is developed collaboratively between the Province and First Nations⁵.

Project ID#11: Review of Land Act Tenures – Owl Creek (First Nations LUA)

Lead: MAL-ILMB

Description:

The Skelulatkwa / Owl Creek watershed is a place focused on rejuvenating First Nations culture through ceremonial use and community education. A range of activities are allowed, where they do not conflict with First Nations cultural and educational learning activities ⁶.

Objectives⁷:



3.0 TASK IMPLEMENTATION STATUS

3.1 Task Implementation Summary

There are 14 LRMP Tasks being monitored in this progress report. Tasks are miscellaneous activities or smaller/discrete projects that agencies undertake as part of plan implementation. Tasks are typically completed within base budgets and operations. Most of the Tasks involve working with agencies, local governments and the public in managing valuable resources within the plan area. Education for the public regarding responsible use of resources and safe activities within wildlife habitats, including development of best management practices are some of the deliverables of the Tasks identified in the LRMP. Figure 3 shows the implementation status for Tasks.



Agencies reported on three primary factors that can affect the implementation progress of Tasks: *Changing Scope*, *Resource Issues* and *Additional Time Required*. The agencies reported that *Resource Issues* were a significant factor affecting implementation for 10 of the 14 Tasks (71%) and *Additional Time Required* was not a factor affecting implementation for any of the Tasks.

Table 2 shows the key deliverables for the 14 tasks being monitored in this report. It also indicates the implementation status, priority, and estimated completion date as reported by implementing agencies.



4.0 LEGAL PRACTICE IMPLEMENTATION STATUS

4.1 Practice Implementation Summary

There are 104 legal Practices being monitored in this progress report. Practices provide ongoing long-term management direction in a prescriptive or results-based manner for uses and activities on Crown land. They guide the on-the-ground activities of government agencies and land and resource use proponents. Legal Practices (104 items) require the establishment of specific legal Orders to bring a Practice into effect. Non-legal Practices (208 items) do not require a new legal Order to bring them into effect and are implemented by agencies through existing regulatory tools and policies and then incorporated into ongoing operational practices. The legislative tools used to implement the legal Practices are listed in Appendix E. Figure 4 shows the implementation status for the legal Practices.



Agencies reported on three primary factors that can affect the implementation progress of legal Practices: *Changing Scope*, *Resource Issues* and *Additional Time Required*. The agencies reported that *Resource Issues* were not a significant factor affecting implementation for 89 of the 104 legal Practices (86%); *Additional Time Required* was a significant factor affecting implementation for 54 of the 104 legal Practices (52%); and *Changing Scope* was not a significant factor affecting implementation for any of the legal Practices.

Table 3 shows the legal tools for implementing the legal Practices, the number of legal Practices associated with each legal tool, the Sea-to-Sky LRMP topics associated with the legal practices and the corresponding implementation status of the legal Practices as reported by the lead implementing agencies.



5.0 SUMMARY OF OVERALL IMPLEMENTATION STATUS

This section uses all the information found in this report to summarize the overall implementation status of the Sea-to-Sky LRMP as of January 15, 2009. It presents some key findings and some general interpretations of the findings. It also acknowledges some of the limitations of this report and explores some possible ways to improve the next Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation Progress Report scheduled for March 2010.

5.1 Overall Implementation Status

A total of 140 Projects, Tasks and legal Practices are monitored in this report. Figure 5 summarizes the implementation status for these Projects, Tasks and legal Practices as of January 15 2009.



5.2 Key Findings and Interpretation

5.2.1 Key Findings

All Implementation Items

- 107 of 140 items (76%) have their implementation processes *Initiated*;
- 44 of 140 items (31%) have their implementation processes *Midway* to *Complete*;
- 12 of 140 items (9%) have their implementation processes Substantially Complete or Complete; and
- 88 of 140 items (63%) were categorized by agencies as being a *high priority* implementation item, 39 (28%) were reported as being a *medium priority* implementation item and 13 (9%) were reported as a low priority implementation item or not reported at all.

Projects

- Projects make-up 16% of all implementation items being monitored for the Sea-to-Sky LRMP
- 10 of the 22 Projects (45%) have had their implementation processes *Initiated* and 12 of the Projects (55%) have not been *Initiated*
- No Projects were reported as Completed
- Resources Issues were a significant factor affecting implementation for 14 of the 22 Projects (64%)
- Additional Time Required was not a factor affecting implementation for 17 of the 22 Projects (77%)

Tasks

- Tasks make-up 14% of all implementation items being monitored for the Sea-to-Sky LRMP
- 4 of the 14 Tasks (29%) have had their implementation processes *Initiated* and 10 of the 14 Tasks (71%) have not been *Initiated*
- No Tasks were reported as Completed
- Resources Issues were a significant factor affecting implementation for more than 10 of the 14 Tasks (71%)
- Additional Time Required was not a factor affecting implementation for any of the Tasks

Legal Practices

- Legal Practices make-up 74% of all implementation items being monitored for the Sea-to-Sky LRMP
- 93 of the 104 Legal Practices (90%) of the have their implementation processes *Initiated*
- 36 of the 104 Legal Practices (35%) have their implementation processes *Midway to Complete*
- 2 legal Practices were reported as *Completed*
- Resources Issues were not a significant factor affecting implementation for 89 of the 104 legal Practices (86%)
- Additional Time Required was a significant factor affecting implementation for 54 of the 104 legal Practices (52%)
- Changing Scope was not a significant factor affecting implementation for any of the legal Practices

5.2.2 Interpretation of Key Findings

- Legal practices make-up almost 75% of the monitored implementation items in this report but they
 are associated with only a small number of legal tools (i.e. Wildlands ELUA Order, Land Act 93.4,
 S2S LUOR Order etc.). As such, the reported progress on LRMP implementation is heavily
 influenced by the status of a small number of regulatory implementation processes for legal
 Practices.
- Resource Issues were not seen as a significant factor affecting implementation for 85% of the legal Practices. This fact may explain why 90% all of the regulatory implementation processes for legal Practices have been *Initiated*. However, it is expected that it will take some time for these processes to be completed because they are more process-dependent and Additional Time was frequently reported as a factor affecting implementation.

- Projects and Tasks appear to be more resource-dependent implementation items as opposed to
 Legal Practices which are more process-dependent implementation items. This may explain why
 Resource Issues are reported to be a significant factor affecting the implementation of more than
 64% of the Projects and Tasks. It may also partially explain why more than 55% of the Projects and
 Tasks have not yet been initiated.
- Of all the implementation items being monitored, Tasks have the highest percentage of items not yet initiated. In general, this appears to be the result of the Tasks being a lower priority implementation item for agencies and there being *Resource Issues* to support implementation.
- Of all the implementation items monitored in this report, Agencies have reported that about 63% are a *High Priority* for implementation and 28% are a *Medium Priority* for implementation. This indicates that provincial agencies support the implementation of the Sea-to-Sky LRMP in the context of available resources and the provincial government's competing priorities.
- Overall, this first Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation Progress Report indicates that provincial agencies have made progress towards the implementation of the LRMP during the nine months from plan completion to the reporting date of January 15, 2009.

5.3 Discussion

5.3.1 Limitations of Report

This implementation progress report has several limitations in terms of communicating the overall implementation progress for the Sea-to-Sky LRMP:

- All the Projects, Tasks and legal Practices in this report are viewed equally even though they may
 vary a great deal in terms of scope, effort and resources required to implement. As such, the
 summaries and key findings presented in this report represent a generalization of Sea-to-Sky LRMP
 implementation progress as of January 15, 2009.
- The monitoring information collected for this report was based upon the information collected from lead agency representatives. The extent to which this information accurately reflects the views of the agency is left up to the Sea-to-Sky LRMP Inter-agency Plan Implementation Team representative to determine.
- The summaries and key findings in this report may have missed some other key factors affecting implementation by analysing only three basic categories: *Resource Issues*, *Changing Scope* and *Additional Time Required*.
- In an effort to produce a more focussed and cost-effective Sea-to-Sky LRMP implementation progress report, this report does not include the monitoring of 208 Practices that do not require a new legal Order for implementation. This means a significant amount of implementation monitoring of the Sea-to-Sky LRMP is not covered in this report.

• The monitoring information used to formulate this report is based upon a status date of January 15, 2009 but the actual completion date of this report is March 2009. Due to the time needed to compile the monitoring information and produce the final report, this report cannot capture any implementation progress changes that may occur after January 15, 2009 until the next scheduled report in 2010.

5.3.2 Considerations for Future Implementation Progress Reports

The development of the next Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation Progress Report may consider the following recommendations:

- The August 2008 Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation List should be updated before the next agency monitoring period to capture any potential refinements to the list
- The legend on the monitoring forms should have clearer definitions added. This would help to improve the consistency in interpreting and completing the monitoring forms
- Agency representatives should be encouraged to complete all aspects of the monitoring form to ensure complete data sets for compilation and analysis
- Consideration should be given to any comments from the South Coast Management Committee, the Plan Implementation Committee and individual agencies that might improve the format and content of the next Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation Progress Report scheduled for March 2010.

Appendix A. Implementation And Monitoring Roles And Responsibilities

Several organizational bodies involved in the implementation and monitoring of the Sea-to Sky LRMP have defined roles and responsibilities:

South Cost Management Committee (SCMC)

The SCMC is the sub-regional inter-agency decision body for the Sea-to-Sky planning area that funds and endorses implementation and monitoring activities:

- It endorses the ILMB Strategy for Sea-to-Sky LRMP implementation and monitoring
- It determines priorities as it relates to the implementation of the Sea-to-Sky LRMP through its annual corporate business planning.
- It considers information on LRMP implementation progress, issues and new information from annual Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation Progress Reports and annual Recommendations from the Sea-to-Sky Plan Implementation Committee
- It views annual Implementation Progress Reports prior to their distribution and publication
- It endorses the Terms of Reference for the Plan Implementation Committee

Inter-agency Plan Implementation Team (IPIT)

The IPIT is an inter-agency body formed of provincial ministry representatives from the Sea-to-Sky area who are directly involved in the coordination of plan implementation and monitoring. The IPIT is made up of representatives from: Ministry of Forests and Range, Ministry of Environment, Ministry of Tourism, Culture and the Arts, Ministry of Agriculture and Lands, and Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources:

- It acts as the primary communication conduit to agencies on implementation and monitoring matters
- It endorses the Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation and Monitoring Framework
- It is responsible for developing and endorsing the Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation List
- It coordinates the completion of annual plan monitoring forms
- It endorses annual Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation Progress Reports and provides them to the SCMC and the Plan Implementation Committee
- It provides plan implementation and monitoring support information to both the SCMC and the Plan Implementation Committee

Integrated Land Management Bureau (ILMB)

ILMB is responsible for the overall inter-agency coordination of Sea-to-Sky LRMP implementation and monitoring:

- It develops the initial draft of the Sea-to-Sky LRMP Implementation Strategy and the Implementation and Monitoring Framework
- It develops the initial draft of the Sea-to-Sky Implementation List
- It chairs and/or coordinates the SCMC, IPIT, and the PIC.

- It coordinates the implementation of Land Use Agreements with First Nations and leads further government-to government discussions and negotiations on outstanding land use planning issues.
- It leads the coordination and development of annual LRMP Implementation Progress reports
- It facilitates any amendments to the Sea-to-Sky LRMP based upon information from annual Implementation Progress Reports from the IPIT and annual recommendations from the PIC

Lead Agencies

Lead agencies are agencies that have lead responsibilities in terms of implementing and monitoring LRMP Projects, Tasks and Practices:

- They partake in the Sea-to-Sky LRMP Inter-agency Plan Implementation Team
- They develop service plans related to plan implementation that consider corporate and agency implementation priorities along with resource availability.
- They coordinate and lead the implementation of the Projects, Tasks and Practices that they are responsible for
- They ensure that there is consistency between general LRMP plan direction and an agency's basic jurisdictional management of on-the-ground activities
- They report out on plan implementation progress through the completion of annual plan monitoring forms
- They address information requests and questions from the SCMC and the PIC

Plan Implementation Committee (PIC)

The main role of the PIC is to provide a forum for public stakeholder, local government and First Nation input on the implementation of the Sea-to-Sky LRMP:

- It reviews annual LRMP Implementation Progress Reports and provides annual recommendations to the SCMC based upon the monitoring reports, emerging issues and new information
- It will assist the province in determining implementation priorities while also providing advice to resolve LRMP implementation issues
- It helps to provide local awareness of the LRMP and its direction

First Nations

There are four First Nations in the Sea-to-Sky plan area that have agreements with the province on the LRMP: Squamish, Lil'wat, In-SHUCK-ch, and Tsleil-Waututh. Of these First Nations, the Squamish, Lil'wat and In-SHUCK-ch have specific Land Use Agreements that have been integrated into the LRMP. First Nations are involved in implementation and monitoring activities through their participation on the PIC and through government-to-government discussions on the implementation of their respective Land Use Agreements.

The committee's role is to recommend programs to increase environmental awareness, ensure that the natural environment is considered in land-use and resource development decisions, hold public inquiries, prepare reports and make recommendations to Cabinet about environmental issues.

Forest Act Part 13

Part 13s can be used to specify an area of Crown land as a designated area. Conditions can be attached to any timber harvest-related permits, licenses or plans issued within a designated area. Permits, licenses or plans within this area can also be suspended. The annual allowable cut of a timber supply area or tree farm license area can be reduced if they fall within the designated area.

Parks are designated either by the schedules to the Act or by regulation (order in council). Under the Act, the Minister has the decision-making powers to issue park use permits to applicants wishing to conduct commercial enterprises in a park (including those, which operate and maintain campgrounds on behalf of BC Parks).
