The Board will conduct a hearing to inquire into your conduct, circumstances of which are set out in the attached schedule, to determine whether you have acted incompetently and breached a term and condition of your licence.

Non-Appearance by Respondent: If you fail to appear at the date, time and place set for the hearing, the Board is entitled to proceed with the hearing in your absence upon proof of receipt of the Notice of Citation by you and may take any action, without further notice to you, that it is authorized to take under the *Act*.

SCHEDULE

1. On or about March 26, 2020 at or near Kelowna, BC, you acted incompetently and breached a term and condition of your license by doing one or more of the following:
