Re: Extending Authorization for Distilleries, Breweries & Wineries to

manufacture, package, sell and donate alcohol-based hand sanitizer and

sanitizer

General Manager Authority

Under Liquor Control and Licensing Regulation (LCLR), s. 30, the General Manager of the Liquor and Cannabis Regulation Branch may authorize licensed manufacturing establishments to be used for activities not otherwise authorized under the licence or LCLR.

Extension of Authorization

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic and to continue supporting industry with increased opportunities to generate revenue, while also supporting the production of essential health and safety products, the General Manager is **extending the authorization** for brewery licence holders, winery licence holders, and distillery licensees to use their establishments to manufacture and/or package, sell or donate alcohol-based hand sanitizer and sanitizer until **June 30, 2021**.
