Charge Approved in IIO Investigation of Surrey Shooting

Victoria - The Criminal Justice Branch, Ministry of Justice (CJB) announced today that a charge of Careless Use of a Firearm has been approved against a member of the Delta Police Department in connection with an incident in Surrey on November 7, 2013. The case was investigated by the Independent Investigation Office (IIO), which subsequently submitted a Report to Crown Counsel.

An information charging Cst. Vicken Movsessian with one count of Careless Use of a Firearm, contrary to section 86(1) of the *Criminal Code*, was sworn April 15, 2015 in British Columbia Provincial Court in Surrey under court file number 209087-1. First appearance in the case has been set for April 27, 2015 at 9:30.

The charge arises from an on duty incident involving contact on the date in question between police and the occupants of a vehicle in the area of 108th Avenue and 148th Street in Surrey. It is alleged that in the course of the incident a firearm was discharged, resulting in injury to a male occupant of the vehicle.

Following an investigation, where the Chief Civilian Director of the IIO determines that an officer may have committed an offence, the IIO submits a report to CJB. The Chief Civilian Director does not make a recommendation on whether charges should be approved or what charges CJB should consider.
