Drug Benefit Council (DBC)	DBC met on November 7, 2016. DBC considered various inputs including : a clinical evidence review of tinzaparin for the treatment of VTE associated with cancer, completed August 23, 2016. The DBC also considered a 2014 meta-analysis by the Cochrane Collaboration comparing long-term treatment with low-molecular weight heparins (LMWHs) versus oral anticoagulants in patients with cancer and symptomatic VTE, as well as Clinical Practice Reviews from two specialists, manufacturer comments on the clinical evidence review, and a Budget Impact Assessment. Patient input was not collected.

Reason(s)	 Drug coverage decision is not consistent with the DBC recommendation. Based on the DBC's reasons for recommendation, tinzaparin did not demonstrate advantages over warfarin with respect to efficacy and safety, with the exception for clinically relevant nonmajor bleeding. By comparison, dalteparin, another low molecular weight heparin (LMWH), demonstrated some advantage over warfarin with respect to efficacy but not safety. Based on the clinical practice reviewers' inputs, tinzaparin is a reasonable treatment option in patients who have failed, or who are unable to tolerate, oral therapy with warfarin, and could be used as an alternative to dalteparin, especially in patients with renal impairment. At the submitted product price, tinzaparin may be less costly than dalteparin for some patients. The Ministry considered DBC recommendation and reasons as well as currently covered options for the treatment of VTE associated with cancer and determined that tinzaparin is a viable option without additional cost to PharmaCare.
