TYPES OF VOLUNTEERS

- Pre-registered and pre-trained volunteers
 - Are affiliated with an existing volunteer organization
 - Are known to us
 - Are trained and ready to go
- Convergent volunteers
 - Are not affiliated with an existing organization
 - These are people who show up on the day if spill wanting to volunteer
 - We must provide on the job training

WHY ARE WE DOING THIS?

- 2011 legislative session directed Ecology to create a volunteer coordination system (ESSB 1186)
- When people want to help, we want to ensure that there is a plan that will facilitate an organized way to use volunteers safely and effectively
- Our goal is to have people pre-register and pre-trained

WHAT ARE WE DOING NOW?

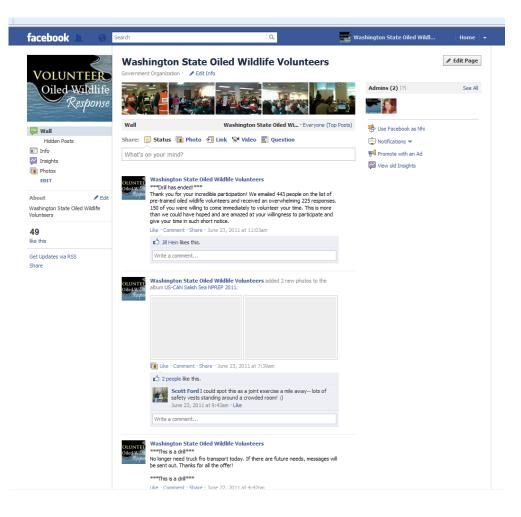
- Develop a mechanism to register volunteers.
 - Web-based system to register, communicate and inform volunteers (PIER SYSTEM)
- Develop a Volunteer Management Plan
 - Part of Northwest Area Contingency Plan customizable for different geographical areas
- Testing volunteers in drills
- Engaging with local emergency managers around the state to develop a structure for registering and processing volunteers
- Engaging with local community volunteer groups

WHAT DO WE HAVE NOW?

- Approximately 450
 pre-trained oiled
 wildlife volunteers.
- Ad-hoc training opportunities



National Preparedness for Response Exercise Program (NPREP) 2011



- We sent email messages to 435 wildlife volunteers
- We also posted to the oiled wildlife volunteer
 Facebook page
- We received 325 responses in the 2 days of the drill
- 33% were available to show up that day and committed to 2-3 days of the response
- Over the course of the weeks after the drills, we continue to get email responses from volunteers
- Total count of response 401

CHALLENGES WITH USING VOLUNTEERS

- Liability coverage for volunteers
- Finding suitable job for volunteers
- Maintaining a level of trained volunteers
- Maintaining volunteer information
- Keeping volunteers at a level of interest when no real experience is available
