Dear Ms. Lapointe,

As you know, a Coroner's Inquest was held from November 14th - 16th, 2017 in Quesnel, B.C. to examine the death of Mr. Ebony Wood. The Coroner's jury made two recommendations to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), to which we provide the following response:

Recommendation 1

Enhance mental health and substance use training provided to first responders that improves their ability to assess behavioural indicators of risk.

Response:

All RCMP officers within British Columbia are required to complete the National Excited Delirium online course and the "E" Division Crisis Intervention and De-escalation Course.

- The Excited Delirium (ED) Course provides practical information for recognizing, responding to and managing this medically high-risk condition, with a focus on recognizing symptoms, understanding that ED is a medical emergency and engaging Emergency Health Services.
- The Crisis Intervention and De-escalation (CID) Course was designed
 specifically for frontline police officers in British Columbia and is consistent with
 the BC Provincial Policing Standards. Its purpose is to ensure that police officers
 will be able to effectively intervene in and de-escalate crisis situations. There are
 both online and classroom components, providing training in a four-phase
 communication model, common mental health and substance use disorders, risk
 assessment, policy and procedure and the BC Mental Health Act.

"E" Division Training Services delivers the CID Course and provides identification of current trends to all police personnel exposed to this training.

Recommendation 2

Ensure any behavioural issues that could endanger the patient or others are communicated to the BCAS when care is transferred.

Response:

Prior to this incident, "E" Division Operational Policy regarding BCAS read, in part, that once an officer had control of an incident/scene, they should allow BCAS to take responsibility for casualty assessment and care. In doing so, they were directed to "Provide the BCAS crew with your assessment" [EOM 45:201-2.2.1]

Although behavioural issues impacting safety would certainly form part of an officer's assessment, on April 18th, 2017, pursuant to our own internal review of this incident, we amended the policy to make it more specific. It now reads,

"Provide the BCAS crew with your assessment including any safety concerns" [EOM 45.201.2.2.1]

Thank you for bringing these recommendations to our attention. We remain committed to improving our investigative services and learning from tragic incidents such as these. The findings of the court, inquiries and inquests contribute significantly to that improvement.
