## INTRODUCTION - LIBRARY AND COMMUNITY PROFILE

Chetwynd is located in the foothills of the Rocky Mountains in Northeastern British Columbia. It is the first town that travellers encounter after emerging from the Rockies along Highway 97 and acts as the gateway to the Peace River area. Nearby there are four provincial parks, two lakes, and several recreational trails. Chetwynd is known for hiking, hunting, fishing and winter sports; perfect for the outdoor enthusiasts. Uniquely beautiful chainsaw carved statues can be found throughout the town site, which is renowned for its annual international chainsaw carving competition.

Chetwynd is among the younger communities in the province of British Columbia. In 1962 Chetwynd became incorporated as a Village. The population of the District of Chetwynd is estimated to be 2503 as of the 2016 census data. This does not include the Regional District unincorporated areas of Moberly Lake, Saulteau First Nations, West Moberly First Nations, East Pine, Hasler Flats, Lone Prairie, and Jackfish. The combined population is estimated to be 7000.

The primary Industries in Chetwynd are forestry, oil, gas, mining, wind power, ranching, and tourism. We have noticed an increase in our industrial population with the pipelines, installation of new windmills and the building of the Site C hydro dam.

The Chetwynd Public Library is known as the community living room, because of the large number and wide variety of services and resources it provides. It is a gathering space that connects and strengthens the community. The warm and welcoming team are always searching for creative ways to connect and engage the community both inside and outside the walls of the library. The Chetwynd Public Library won Non-for Profit of the Year and our Assistant Library Director, Kayla MacDonald, won customer service of the year through the Chetwynd Chamber of Commerce business excellence awards.

## Provincial Funding Break-down

The funding that we receive from the province, \$35,758.00, goes into our regular operating expenses.

- \$16,720 Per Capita Operating
  - We offer free WiFi, ensuring the public can access it from outside of the building 24/7. Staff assist patrons with computers, printing and scanning.
  - We continue to grow our digital resources and promote linkedin learning, the Gale courses as well as Tumble Books for kids.
  - o Programing details are below. We apply for many grants to be able to enhance and grow this part of our library. The social connections and sense of community are huge. It is not always easy moving to a small town, the library is that place that welcomes people and links them to their community.
  - In addition to the regular utilities, maintenance, and janitorial expenses we had a few call outs to the plumber this past year, fingers crossed it holds up until we move to the new building.
  - Provincial networking: with NELF Directors on various topics such as the Overdrive collection and accessibility as well as getting regular updates from the ABCPLD and the BCLTA.
- \$1.958 Resource Sharing
  - We are thankful and proud to be able to bring in any book that our patrons are looking for through interlibrary loan. This past year shipping costs were just over \$2,000 and we purchased \$1,300 worth of mailbags.
- \$7,400 BC One Card
  - O We see regular visitors from all over the province, country and internationally especially in the summer months when so many travellers make the road trip to Alaska. We often have Northern travellers pop into the library for a washroom break and coffee for the road from the bistro, others stop for a while to take a much needed break. We have many camp workers families that will spend time at the library for something to do while in town.
- \$9,680 Equity and Literacy
  - We continually bring in new books. It is a feel good moment when patrons are so excited to hear of a new book that just came out and are able to find it at the library.

We try hard to get to know our patrons and bring in books we know that they will love and enjoy.

## 2. Project/Program Name

## **New Library**

Provide a brief description. Please include details such as any partnerships or resources leveraged to accomplish this project/program.

Since 2016, the Chetwynd Public Library Board of Trustees and the library staff; together with the Peace River Regional District and the District of Chetwynd have been working towards a new library in Chetwynd.

In 2016 there were conversations of doing a renovation project for the library, but after listing off all of the areas in the library that needed replaced, or upgraded such as: the roof, plumbing, ventilation, electrical, windows, storage ... the team agreed that a new building would be the way to go.

- 2016, a consultant specializing in library services was hired by the PRRD to do a Feasibility
   Study, and an Advisory Committee was formed to work through the process.
  - Once the Feasibility Study was complete, the recommendation was to attach the new library onto the existing Rec Centre.
    - The Rec Centre is a building consisting of an Arena built in the 70's, Curling Rink 80's, Wave Pool 90's and expansion project that linked the buildings together in 2010. Already bursting at its seams, not to mention the potential cost of abatement and what it would cost to tie into the existing ventilation and sprinkler system, it was decided this may not be the best option.
    - However, the committee did agreed on the area. One of the biggest deciding factors is the bus route and all youth have the ability to access the library.
    - Being the landowner, PRRD looked at other areas around the Rec Centre where a standalone building would work. After a few options were presented and many discussions later a final location was agreed upon.
    - The new library will be on the opposite side of the Rec Centre it is now, nestled between the skate park and splash park, with a nice amount of greenspace. It will also be bordering the field where the annual international chainsaw carving competition takes place.

- 2017, a decision was made to hire an architect to complete a concept design and cost estimate for the project.
- 2018, a design was completed by the architect working with the Advisory Committee. The design was to go public but was cancelled, the committee felt the cost was too high.
- 2019, the committee used this design to apply for the Investing in Canada Grant Program for Rural and Northern Communities.
- 2020, the committee found out that they were not successful with the grant.
- The end of 2020, beginning of 2021, the committee came back together virtually to discuss what new approach and/or direction they would take towards the goal of a new library.
- 2021, PRRD put out a tender for a design and build.
  - Amy Lievers with Field Lievers Architecture (now Faction Projects) was the successful bidder.
  - The public engagement ran from October to November with a virtual open house on November 03<sup>rd</sup>.
- 2022, the Advisory Committee worked with Amy through various meeting platforms to bring the design of the new library to life.
  - o The ground breaking ceremony took place on June 03<sup>rd</sup> and construction began.
- 2023, projections: the completion is scheduled for the fall. The Advisory Committee will be busy with service agreements, contracts and furnishing choices for the new space.

The ground breaking ceremony was a very heart felt event with the family of Yvonne Elden being present to present a memorial fund. Yvonne was passionate about the community and a huge advocate for libraries.

Throughout this time, the partners worked hard on advocating and sourcing out funding to pay for the new library.

Our Library Director and Assistant Library Director took the training to become facilitators in the Living Life to the Full course through the Canadian Mental Health Association. With the influx of depression and anxiety for various reasons, including the spike coming out of covid, we wanted to be able to offer something worthwhile to our community. We also wanted to it to be free and offer childminding to take away any barriers so those that are struggling with mental health are able to access this valuable information. We applied for additional funding to achieve this gool.

Living Life to the Full is a fun and engaging eight-week course that provides people from all walks of life with effective tools to maximize their ability to manage life's challenges. The group-oriented course is based on the principles of cognitive behaviour therapy (CBT) which focuses on understanding how thoughts, feelings, and behaviours work together to impact well-being. Each 90-minute session focuses on a different topic, such as understanding unhelpful thoughts, engaging in enjoyable activities, coping with anger and solving daunting problems.

In addition to our daily preschool and afterschool programs, our library ran the following:

Family Fun Fridays in February, due to the restrictions but still very much wanting to connect with our families we ran this as a grab and go. We put together weekly activity kits from fun at home scavenger hunts to game nights and movie nights.

We ran a variety of wellness sessions throughout the year, the idea is for the instructor to display what it is they offer and the participant to try it for free. This past year we hosted sessions for backpack basics, regression workshop, gentle yoga, journaling and balancing breath. For our senior population we held a presentation on the Falkland Islands.

We partnered with Moccasin Flats Metis Society, Peace FM, Chet TV, and School District 59 Peace River South to offer a Photography Program to a select few students at Chetwynd Secondary School. Students were given the opportunity to learn the foundations of photography.

With 90 Children registered, we ran a successful summer reading program. It was so nice to have the children back in the library and fun to see Mary Lambert entertain them as part of the "All Together Now" theme.

Due to the influx of calls to the library asking if we knew of any babysitters, the library offered a free babysitter course to fill this gap.

Even though we brought back in-house programming with precautions, it was evident our community was ready for us to be fully open and host events again after our Halloween Walk Through Trick'r Treat.  There was staff "burn out" always shifting gears and never too certain what restriction/barrier would be around the next corner that we would creatively have to overcome in order to continue our programing, reaching patrons,
Emergency response (e.g., fires, floods, extreme weather)	and keep connected to our community partners.  We have advertised that the library is a great place to keep cool on the extreme hot days.
Financial pressure (e.g., rising costs, reduced revenues)	We have seen this in the rising costs of fuel, and the increase in shipping costs and groceries. We have applied for additional grants to cover the cost of food and maintain/exceed the quality that we offer in our library programs.
Staffing (e.g., recruitment and retention, mental health, and wellness)	Competing with the wages of the local industries it is hard to recruit staff.
Disappearing services in the community (e.g., government, banking, health)	Chetwynd has a shortage of health care workers and nurses. Our hospital is often on diversion and patients have to travel to a nearby community.
Connectivity (e.g., low bandwidth, lack of home internet in the community)	Our community may not see fibre until 2025 and internet connection in Chetwynd and the surrounding area continues to be a challenge.

Aging/damaged facilities (e.g., need for repairs, renovations, upgrades/expansions)	The building we are in now is owned by the District of Chetwynd, at this time the plan is to demolish the building; however the fate is up to the DOC.
Community access to the library (e.g., geographic isolation, lack of local public transit, building accessibility)	There is no public transit and only one taxi in town. During the colder months, it is difficult for those that do not drive or like winter driving to access the library.
Vulnerable communities (e.g., people experiencing homelessness, addiction, mental health crisis)	Have recently had conversations with our local EMS providers on how the library can help/assist with some of the situations they may face to keep people safe.
Other (please specify)	Grants and funding, we are completely grateful for the funds that we receive from the province. These funds do help our operational budget. However, so much of our time goes into applying for grants to enhance our library programs. Everyone who walks through the doors of our library are awestruck by what our library has to offer. We are proud of our work and this feedback gives us the leverage needed to continue to source out and keep applying, our community is worth it and our missions is to look out into our community and see a reflection of our outstanding services and we are determined to uphold this. The application and reporting process on numerous grants is so time consuming and takes us away from the trenches and puts us behind a screen for lengthy periods of time. Although at times exhausting it is a necessity in order to get the funding to be able to offer the outstanding programs we do. We are more then just books. If we were to have more funding we would have more time to hit the ground running serving our community, filling gaps and running more of our high demand programming. Last year through 14 additional grant contracts and donations, we received close to \$68,000 to go towards enhancing our library programs. To be able to offer the Imagination Library, the Senior and Elder Community Christmas Dinner, Living Life to the Full, snacks and meals, craft kits, program materials to make the program and events listed above that much better, special, welcoming, heartfelt, and personalized. We are always looking for ways to fulfill what our community needs at that moment and the community connections we make with our community members are so incredibly valuable.
