

On June 14<sup>th</sup>, we <u>announced the launch of the BC Demographic Survey</u>. We're encouraging all people in B.C. to take the BC Demographic Survey to help identify systemic racism in government services.

The survey is open until October 15 and is online available in 15 languages at: <a href="https://antiracism.gov.bc.ca/bcdemographicsurvey">https://antiracism.gov.bc.ca/bcdemographicsurvey</a>

The survey takes 15 minutes.

Invitations to complete the survey are being sent to 800,000 random households throughout B.C. There is also a paid advertising campaign that will run throughout the summer.

#### **BACKGROUND**

In 2022, the B.C. government introduced the <u>Anti-Racism Data Act</u> (or ARDA) to safely collect race-based data. This data will be used to help identify where people aren't getting equitable services. To identify where people experience gaps and barriers in accessing public services, BC Stats has launched the **BC Demographic Survey**.

The survey was created through engagement with Indigenous, Black and other racialized communities. It includes questions related to race, ethnicity, ancestry and other areas of identity. The survey is voluntary, but the more people, regardless of background, who complete the survey, the better and more accurate the data to identify, then eliminate, systemic racism in B.C. government services.

To support greater participation, we're offering grants to racialized, 2SLGBTQIA+, intersectional and faith-based community organizations as well as Indigenous governments. Successful grant recipients can receive up to \$2,500 to pay for expenses such as equipment rentals, communications materials and honorariums. Interested community organizations can apply for grants on a rolling basis until the end of August. #### **KEY MESSAGES**

- Everyone deserves equal access to strong public services.
- Right now, too many people are being left out and left behind because programs and services aren't designed with them in mind.
- Systemic racism and other forms of discrimination have shaped the delivery of government programs and services for generations. It's harmful and hurtful and undermines our goal of delivering strong public services for everyone.
- That's why we've launched the BC Demographic Survey.
- The survey was created through engagement with Indigenous, Black and other racialized communities. It includes questions related to race, ethnicity, ancestry and other areas of identity.
- The information collected by this survey, combined with information already held by government, will help identify areas where people aren't getting equitable services because of systemic racism, so government can address them.
- BC Stats is conducting the survey as they're the province's trusted source of official statistics about B.C.'s people and economy.
- We need people of all backgrounds to participate in this survey to help government improve programs and services – so everyone is treated with the dignity and respect they deserve.

- 1. What is the difference between the anti-racism questionnaire and the B.C. Demographic Survey?
- The anti-racism questionnaire will inform new legislation set to be introduced in 2024. This legislation will hold government accountable for addressing systemic racism in its programs and services uncovered through the BC Demographic Survey.
- The BC Demographic Survey includes questions related to race, ethnicity, ancestry and other areas of identity. The purpose of the survey is to identify gaps and barriers some people face when accessing government supports.
- 2. Why do I need to take this survey? How will this help in bringing about a change in systemic racism?
- Many programs and services in B.C. were designed generations ago, without the benefit
  of what we know now about inclusivity and equitable access.
- To identify problems with existing programs and services we need information about what works, what doesn't work, and for whom.
- The information collected through the BC Demographic Survey will help government identify where people of different backgrounds are experiencing barriers accessing services.
- We need people of all backgrounds to participate in this survey to get accurate information about where services are leaving people behind.
- 3. How many people need to fill out this survey for it to be useful and provide the information that is needed?
- Ideally, as many people as possible in this province will fill out this survey. That is the best-case scenario.
- The more people who complete the survey, the better and more accurate the information to identify, then eliminate where systemic racism is occurring in B.C. government services.
- We all benefit when government can deliver strong public services that work for everyone in B.C.

- 4. What is being done to make sure the survey is as representative of BC's population as possible, not overrepresenting or underrepresenting certain groups?
- We have sent invitations for the survey to 900,000 households across the province ensuring that places with small populations are included.
- Alongside these invitations, we'll be launching a media campaign to raise awareness about the survey.
- We're also providing grants to community organizations to raise awareness with their community members and promote the importance of completing the survey.
- With this approach, we expect to reach a significant number of people across the province.
- This will provide a good representation of B.C.'s population, and we will be able to do a lot with the amount of data that we receive.
- 5. I'm white, why is it important for me to fill out this survey?
- Public services need to work for everyone.
- Because you care about your neighbours.
- You care about people who have different experiences than yours.
- Everyone has experienced some challenges with government services.
- Everyone has complex identities.
- While you may not require certain government services now, you may need them in the future, for example, benefits for the elderly population, assistance in case of disability and so on.
- 6. I have shared my experiences with racism in government many times Human Rights Commission, Anti-Racism engagement, others? why does government need my personal information to believe that there is racism in government?
- We have been very vocal that systemic racism exists in government programs.
- The BC Demographic Survey is going to help us identify specifically where systemic racism is happening so that we can make specific and targeted changes.
- The demographic information will help us, for example, in making sure the education system doesn't privilege some children over others and that healthcare services are delivered in culturally safe ways to the different racialized people across B.C.

#### 7. How do I know that my information will not be misused if I fill out this survey?

- BC Stats is collecting the information as they're the province's trusted source of official statistics about B.C.'s people and economy.
- BC Stats is required to protect confidentiality by law.
- Under Section 9 of the Statistics Act, BC Stats cannot disclose information that could be used to identify a person.
- The information collected is also protected under Section 30 of the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy (FOIPPA).

### 8. Where will this information live and will it be shared with other government bodies, public or private bodies?

- It will be put into secure servers and stripped of personal identifiers.
- It will not be shared outside of that secure environment.
- In the case of Indigenous governing entities, there is a question on the survey that asks
  Indigenous people if they want their personal information shared with their local
  nation. Indigenous nations also need demographic information to build services for their
  communities.

#### 9. How much is the Province offering in community grants? Who can apply?

 To encourage everyone to take part, grants of up to \$2,500 are available to community organizations or Indigenous (First Nations, Inuit or Métis) governments, tribal councils, band councils, or organizations willing to raise awareness of the survey with their communities and/or clients and to provide encouragement and support to complete the survey.

#### 10. What will this amount be used for?

- The grant money can be used for activities, including but not limited to:
  - face-to-face outreach on the survey to create awareness with hard-to-reach communities,
  - o tools for people to self-complete the survey such as a tablet,
  - o newsletter or other communications, meetings/events, social media outreach
  - o and use of government-issued BC Demographic Survey amplification kits.

#### **DRAFT NEWSLETTER ARTICLE**

We all deserve to live in a province where we have equitable opportunities to thrive. But many of the systems and structures our society is built on turn a blind eye to the unique needs of Indigenous Peoples and racialized people.

That's why the B.C. government is running two important initiatives this summer. They're asking everyone in B.C. to fill out the BC Demographic Survey to help identify and eliminate systemic racism from government programs and services. The survey is available online in 15 languages until Oct. 15 and will take about 15 minutes of your time. The B.C. government is also asking for public input in developing anti-racism legislation that will hold government accountable for addressing systemic racism within its programs and services, and to provide supports to those who have been negatively impacted.
