## BC BROILER HATCHING EGG COMMISSION INTERIM REPORT ON IMPLEMENTATION OF BCFIRB'S SPECIALTY (ASIAN BREED) HATCHING EGG REGULATION SUPERVISORY DIRECTIONS

Thank you for the December 21, 2018 Interim Report (Report) submitted to the BC Farm Industry Review Board (BCFIRB). The Report describes the BC Broiler Hatching Egg Commissions' (Commission) progress in meeting BCFIRB's July 17, 2018 supervisory directions<sup>1</sup> regarding the regulation of specialty (Asian breed) hatching egg production.

The Report was followed by a January 14, 2019 letter from the Commission to BCFIRB and stakeholders. The letter advises that the draft Amending Order referenced in the Report was not approved by the Commission at its January 9, 2019 meeting. Instead the Commission will be reassessing the draft Amending Order and Work Plan, and revised copies will be sent out as soon as possible for review.

After reviewing the Report and January letter, BCFIRB has asked that I provide the following response.

First, thank you to BHEC for agreeing to meet with BCFIRB representatives in February. I understand a meeting date is currently being scheduled. The discussion will focus on BHEC's progress in meeting BCFIRB's supervisory directions, alongside any related questions, concerns and challenges that have arisen.

The Commission did make the regulation of specialty production a priority for 2019 as set out in its Strategic Plan, and are laying the ground work for building their industry knowledge and market information – both of which are vital to establish an effective regulatory framework going forward.

The Commission also plans to use the industry and market information to inform its request to the Canadian Hatching Egg Commission (CHEP) for a separate national specialty allocation. This action is in-line with BCFIRB and Ministry of Agriculture policies on differentiated markets and growing BC's share of production.

The attached table summarizes BCFIRB's overall assessment of which supervisory directions have been met.

## **February Meeting**

Discussing the status of the following three directions will be a core part of the upcoming February meeting.

1. Immediate establishment of a condition-based transferable production permit for Asian hatching egg production (paragraph 113).

Production permits have not been issued to date.

While the Commission did immediately implement a transparent and inclusive process to establish production permits, it did not approve the related draft Amending Order at its January 9, 2019 meeting as scheduled.

The Commission's January letter speaks to further delays in establishing production permits, without providing reasons, clarifying which sections of the draft Amending Order are under further review or setting out a revised timeline for permit implementation.

BCFIRB would like to understand the reasons for the on-going delay and use the February meeting as an opportunity to discuss with the Commission what next steps may be needed.

2. At a minimum the permit must include current production volume by the permit holder including strain and volume of strain by production cycle, which at a minimum is to ensure that the Commission obtains up to date production information (paragraph 113(c)).

It is unclear in the Commissions' Report and the draft Amending Order whether or how it will be including current production volumes and strains as part of the production permits. BCFIRB acknowledges the Commission is starting with flock information sheets and hatchery reporting to collect production information. It also understands that the Commission continues to work with stakeholders to finalize a definition for specialty hatching egg breeders.

That said, BCFIRB expects the Commission to ensure the permits reflect production volume and strain in some form. In turn, BCFIRB expects all specialty hatching egg producers to help facilitate the Commission in meeting this requirement through prompt and accurate information. Updating and refining of this information may be required over

2019 as industry data is collected, definitions are established and development of a final regulatory framework continues.

The Commission is asked to bring forward any questions or concerns it may have about this direction at the February meeting.

3. The Commission is to establish a framework for managing industry entry requests in conjunction with establishing rules for production permits (paragraph 116).

Facilitating entry of new producers remains a BCFIRB<sup>2</sup> and Ministry of Agriculture<sup>3</sup> policy objective. New producers support the flexibility and sustainability of BC's regulated agriculture industries – a sound marketing policy outcome.

Evidence that an industry entry framework will be established in conjunction with the production permits, and then as part of the future regulatory framework (scheduled for December 2019) is not reflected in key documents provided to BCFIRB and stakeholders by the Commission over the last several months. These documents include: the December Report, the draft Work Plan, the Strategic Plan and the draft Amending Order. The draft Amending Order does allow for entry (persons may apply for a permit), but the qualification criteria appear only applicable to those currently producing specialty hatching eggs.

BCFIRB looks forward to talking with the Commission on how it will integrate development of an industry entry framework into its Work Plan going forward.

I look forward to seeing you at the BHEC and BCFIRB representatives meeting in February.
