Collection of Personal Information Notification

The personal information you provide at HIBC or ICBC is collected for the following purposes:

- Enrolment in the Medical Services Plan (MSP); and,
- Application for a BC Services Card and its authorized programs.

Personal information is collected under the authority of section 26 (c) of the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (FIPPA). Information may be disclosed pursuant to section 33 of FIPPA.

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The BC Services Card. Your CareCard, and more.



One Card. Many Services.

The new BC Services Card is part of government's plan to modernize BC's health care system. It replaces your CareCard, can be combined with your driver's licence, and also acts as your photo ID. It's more convenient, more secure and will enable access to other government services in the future.

Most adults will have to renew enrolment in the Medical Services Plan (MSP) by 2018 and apply for a BC Services Card at a driver licensing office (DLO).

If you choose to combine your CareCard with your driver's licence, your privacy will be protected. Health care providers will not be able to see your driving record, and police or ICBC agents will not be able to access your health information.

Use your BC Services Card the same way you use your CareCard to access health services today. There's no additional fee, it's one less card to carry and getting yours is easy.

What do I need to do?

I'm an adult who lives in BC:

You can renew enrolment in MSP and apply for a BC Services Card at the same time as you renew your driver's licence or BCID. Even if you don't drive or have a BCID, you will still need to renew enrolment and apply for a BC Services Card at any ICBC DLO before 2018.

Adults 75 and older are not required to renew enrolment in MSP, but may apply for a BC Services Card when they renew their BCID or driver's licence.

Adults who cannot physically attend a DLO will need to contact Health Insurance BC for further information on getting their card.

I have children:

Minors under 19 do not need to renew enrolment in MSP and can continue to use their CareCard. All newborns will be issued a BC Services Card.

I'm new to BC:

If you are new to BC, you must first enrol by submitting an MSP enrolment application to Health Insurance BC, and then, go to an ICBC DLO to complete your enrolment and apply for your BC Services Card.

What if I *don't* apply?

CareCards and Gold CareCards can continue to be used to access health services until 2018.

After 2018, failure to renew enrolment in MSP may result in cancellation of MSP coverage. This means you might have to pay for medical services like a visit to your doctor. In emergency situations, no one will be denied essential medical services.
