#### **Licenced Producers**

For the purposes of PARP reporting, unless small lot producers are specified, producer should be taken to mean licenced producers or growers, and represents one producer holding a licence to produce quota.

Licenced producers are either established producers or new producers, defined below.

#### **Established Producers**

Any producers who have been in the sector for 10 years plus a day.

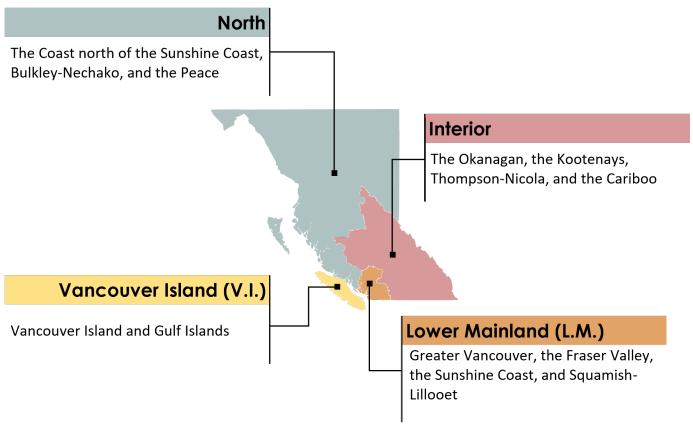
#### **New Producers**

Producers who have been in the sector for 10 years or less.

#### 2.5 Decision Assessment

#### **Decision Assessment**

Identify key lessons learned regarding process and outcomes from appeals & supervisory reviews:

#### BCCGA and PPPABC vs BCCMB – Live Price formula

BCFIRB issued its decision on the appeal heard in October 2018. The Board was pleased with the BCFIRB decision to dismiss the appeals and with the BCFIRB findings, in particular that the Board followed a procedurally fair process; the development of a pricing formula was based on a procedurally sound process and should remain in place until such time as the Chicken Board

establishes a new pricing formula; and the upholding of the BCCMB interim live price formula and support for the Board's process and application of SAFETI.

The Board worked to achieve the BCFIRB direction for the BCCMB to issue a decision regarding a long term pricing formula not later that period A-161 (February 2020). The Board attempted to address the BCFIRB observation "that open and ongoing communication between the Chicken Board, the Primary Processors and the Chicken Growers is essential for the success of BC's chicken industry". The Board established a Pricing Working Group (PWG) consisting of processor and grower representatives to work with an independent facilitator to propose definitions and measures of "reasonable return to growers" and "processor competitiveness in the Canadian market" as well as a recommendation for a long term pricing formula. The PWG met 8 times between July 8 and December 31, 2019. Progress was being achieved; however, recommendations had not yet been filed with the Chicken Board.

#### Cedar Creek Farms vs BCCMB

Cedar Creek Farms filed an appeal of the Chicken Board's January 24, 2019 decision to deny the request to remove restrictions on the Vancouver Island New Entrant Grower quota. The BCCMB applied for a summary dismissal of the appeal which was granted by BCFIRB on May 10, 2019.

#### Cedar Creek Farms vs BCFIRB

Cedar Creek petitioned the BC Supreme Court for a judicial review of the BCFIRB decision to grant the summary dismissal application and sought an order to quash the decision of May 10, 2019 BCFIRB decision and order an remitting the matter back to the BCFIRB. The case was heard by the Courts in October; however, no decision had been issues as of December 31, 2019.

#### K&M Farms vs BCCMB

K&M Farms appeals the decision of the Chicken Board that denies a request for annualization of its mainstream production. BCFIRB issued its decision on the appeal heard in June 2018 ruling in favour of K&M Farms. The Chicken Board accepts the BCFIRB appeal panel decision and will apply learnings to future decisions.

#### Rossdown Natural Foods vs BCTMB

The Chicken Board intervened in the appeal regarding the Turkey Board's decision to set processing costs for custom processing K&M Farms 2019 turkey production. The implications of the prior BCFIRB decision on this matter for the chicken sector as well as the potential for precedent prompted the Chicken Board's intervention. The BCFIRB appeal panel provided commentary on the Chicken Board's submission which the Chicken Board has taken into consideration and will apply in the future as this issue and potential implications for the chicken sector remain outstanding.

Production Type	Explanation
Mainstream Quota:	Is a class of quota expressed in kilograms of live weight for the production and marketing of chicken allotted by the Board. Mainstream quota is for the production of regular broilers, roasters, Cornish, or certified organic, and is derived from a commercially available broiler chick stock, such as, but not limited to, Hubbard ISA, Cobb Vantress, or Ross Breeders.
Regular Broiler Chicken	Is any chicken (with the exception of Asian Chicken and chicken used for egg production) that is under 6 months of age, bred and raised specifically for meat production.
Certified Organic Chicken	Is chicken certified as organic by an agency accredited by the Organic Associations of British Columbia or such other certifying authority as has been recognized by the Board.
Specialty Quota: Asian Chicken	Is a class of quota expressed in kilograms of live weight for the production and marketing of chicken allotted by the Board. Specialty quota is designated by the Board for the production of specialty chicken including Asian chicken, such as Silkies and Taiwanese Chicken. The Board may designate specialty quota for the production of innovative new products that do not currently exist in the marketplace including those derived from a traditional or heritage breed. Effective with the commencement of quota period A-126 (September 7, 2014) Redbro is no longer classified as Specialty chicken.

#### 4.4 Quota Transfer Restrictions

# **Transfer Restrictions**

1. Quotas issued under the New Entrant Program for Growers are restricted:

- To the region where they are issued (Lower Mainland, Island or Interior) for as long as a commercial processor is operating in their region.
- To the processor which they have been directed by the board until their final issuance of new entrant (incentive quota) has reached its 10 year maturity date.

2. Interior Quota is restricted to the Interior region and may not be transferred to another region of the province with the following exception found in Part 41, section 41.6 of the BCCMB General Orders: A grower registered in the Interior for at least two years may make application to the Board to relocate his entire quota anywhere in the province. Further, section 41.7 states: Where the Board has approved a relocation of quota to a new production unit in accordance with section 41.6, no transfer of the relocated quota will be approved by the Board before a date two years following the date of actual relocation of the quota.

3. Vancouver Island Quota has the following restriction found in Part 40 of the General Orders which states in Section 40.3: *In accordance with Order in Council, number 761, approved June 1, 2000, the Board must not permit a disposition or transfer of quota issued to a person to produce regulated product on Vancouver Island to any area of the Province other that Vancouver Island unless the Board sets aside quota exclusively for purposes of the production of regulated product on Vancouver Island in an amount equal to the amount the Board permits disposed of or transferred off Vancouver Island.*
