<p>Brenden Ventures - Appeal commenced in 2019 and dismissed in 2020. This appeal was triggered due to a Board decision to ensure the quota issued to this producer was being used as intended. The Board had clear documentation on the regulations and impacts for non-compliance. Clear communication to producers is necessary.</p> <p>J&amp;E Egg Farm - This appeal also commenced in 2019. It was triggered by the Boards decision to require the new entrant to market their production as per the requirements laid out for their New Producer Program Draw. There was some ambiguity in the wording of the requirements that left some room for interpretation. The BCEMB must ensure that all requirements for New Entrants and those who are entering through the New Producer Program draw are well defined and stated up front, prior to an applicant submitting their application.</p>
