Decision Assessment

There were no appeals filed during the dairy year. The BC Farm Industry Review Board (BCFIRB) released a decision on an appeal from the prior year from Adrie Stuyt. The BC Milk Marketing Board subsequently petitioned the Supreme Court of BC for a judicial review of the BCFIRB decision. The court overturned specific aspects of the BCFIRB decision and sent the matter back to BCFIRB for reconsideration.

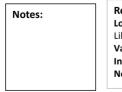
