



Highway 16 from Prince Rupert to Prince George stretches nearly 800 kilometres in BC’s northern region. Where transportation options are available, residents need to find that information quickly and easily .

This document includes information on transit, medical transportation, inter-city bus, rail, and community-based services. It provides a single source of information on these and other related services, such as driver training programs and business licensing information for starting up a new service.



TRANSPORTATION SERVICES

Transit

Medical Transportation

LICENSING SERVICES

Driver Licensing

- Information is available on all driver training school locations licensed or registered by ICBC. See the Driver Training Industry of British Columbia website (www.dtcbc.com/resources/ds-locations/default.asp) or call **1-866-339-0363**.

- If you are unsure of the type of driver’s licence you need to operate a specific type of vehicle or passenger service, ICBC has information on Driver’s Licence Classes and Types. Contact ICBC to determine qualifications to operate shuttle services (**1-800-950-1498**). A commercial driver’s licence requires a safe driving record.
- Should you wish to apply for a licence to start up your own driver training school, or to teach a driver training course, see the Driver Training Industry of BC website (www.dtcbc.com/driving-schools) or call **1-866-339-0363**.

Business Licensing

- To operate a business in Prince Rupert, you need a business licence issued by the City of Prince Rupert. See Prince Rupert Business Licensing (www.princerupert.ca/cityservices/licencesandpermits/businesslicensing) or call **250-627-0934**.
