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

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INTRODUCTION

This Planning Guide and Framework is designed to help educators and Aboriginal communities work in partnership to develop learning resources that reflect and honour the cultures and history of the Aboriginal peoples. Recognizing that no one text could possibly include everything students might need to learn about any one culture, the focus here is on creating a learning resource that:

- teachers can use to support the provincially prescribed curriculum
- helps students throughout British
 Columbia to better understand the rich
 diversity of Aboriginal cultures that exist in
 the province and, in particular, to learn
 more about the First Nation whose
 traditional territory embraces the places
 where they live and attend school.

The *Planning Guide and Framework* includes best-practice examples from recent Aboriginal learning resources, such as those shown on the following two pages, and "key ideas" that experienced resource developers have found it helpful to keep in mind when engaged in this type of work.

Organization of this Document

As its title suggests, this document is organized into two distinct components:


The Planning Guide provides a brief overview of the process of creating a learning resource. It contains advice based on the findings and practice of other, experienced resource developers, and it provides tips on effective organization, research, writing, and production. Although the focus here is on the development of print materials, much of the information can be adapted for the production of educational videos, CD ROMs and other multi-media materials, and online resources.

The Framework provides some actual working materials that community researchers and writers can use to create their resource, including

- an open ended planning grid that will be helpful to a committee deciding what to include in the material from both historic and cultural perspectives
- some research sheets for selected topics; these sheets provide sample questions that the material might seek to answer
- illustrative pages from published Aboriginal learning resources that show how research related to a particular topic or issue can translate into finished product.

Examples of Existing Aboriginal Resources

Many wonderful resources are currently being produced to help students at all grade levels learn more about the history and cultures of British Columbia's many, diverse First Nations Concerned about the limitations of earlier resources used to teach students about their peoples, members of several First Nations throughout the province have over the past ten years worked with school district and local educators to develop materials that represent their cultures more accurately and appropriately. 
