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# Executive Summary

## Background

The 2013/2014 District Literacy Plan builds upon the plans and progress made from our prior District Literacy Plan. We continue to support our literacy vision, which states:

*“All residents of the Southeast Kootenay will have the opportunity to attain, improve, and maintain the literacy skills necessary to fully participate in the community and economy.”*

To this end, we continue to value and support all literacy initiatives and the development of lifelong learning opportunities through sustainable and quality literacy resources that are accessible for all community members. Through these efforts, we continually strive to:

- Increase literacy awareness throughout all communities;
- Sustain, strengthen and expand the existing literacy services and programs;
- See literacy services and programs embedded in community settings; and
- Create and maintain collaborative partnerships to enhance literacy service delivery.

The purpose of this updated document is to highlight our successes, our challenges and our future directions for improving literacy opportunities for lifelong learning in all communities located in School District 5 (Southeast Kootenay).

## Collaboration and Community Development

Before we begin reflecting on our challenges, successes, and future goals, it is extremely important to acknowledge the role of collaboration in the creation and fulfillment of this plan. Literacy work is, in essence, community development, and as such is accomplished only through communication, partnership, and collective resource contributions. Without the time, creativity, and resources of all our partners, the goals in this plan would be impossible to meet.

Collaboration is extremely valuable, but it takes time and reflection to perfect. Throughout this process of community development, we have learned many things. First and foremost, communication and buy-in are essential. All service providers need to be aware of networking opportunities and be able to see their service’s connection to literacy. This requires open and clear communication, which can be challenging in a large region like ours. Secondly, collaboration takes time. Foundations need to be strengthened with each passing year in order to transform a community’s culture. This kind of growth requires consistency and dedication from community members, and service providers.

Despite the challenges, we in Southeast Kootenay strongly believe in the value of collaboration and literacy work in community development. As we head into a new year and a new plan, we are committed to the work that we have started and will pursue our goals collectively.

### **Current Community Literacy Conditions**

- Increasing numbers of amenity migrants
- The continued transient nature of College of the Rockies students
- The purchase of the Tembec Building in Cranbrook by the Ktunaxa Nation may lead to more opportunities for collaboration
- Increased use of library programs due to bridging initiatives between public libraries and school districts
- A continued high unemployment rate in the Kootenays
- Increasing student population in School District #5
- Population spike in children aged 0-3 resulting in greater need for early childhood and family literacy programming

### **2012/2013 Successes**

- Strategic partnerships and collaborations developed amongst Community Partners; see Appendix 3A & 3B
- StrongStart attendance continues to increase across School District #5
- The Early Childhood Development Teams continue to provide strong programming in all communities and demonstrate progressive leadership
- The goals of the Young Parents' Education Program continue to be met with the graduation of two learners this year and nine attaining course credits
- Numbers of First Nations families accessing literacy programs continue to increase
- Bradley Binder went online in the spring of 2013

### **2012/2013 Challenges**

- Identifying youth at risk and developing appropriate literacy programs
- Maintaining library programs and services due to reduced funding for school and public libraries
- The provincial government/teacher/CUPE labour unrest continues to adversely affect collaboration and programming
- Increasing general awareness of literacy and building a 'learning community'
- Coping with a wide area to cover, which makes communication and collaboration challenging
- Encouraging parent participation in their child's literacy development continues to be a challenge
- Children entering kindergarten have decreased social, emotional and literacy skills

Actions, resources, timelines and measures are outlined for each goal area to support effective implementation of the plan in the fall of 2013.

The plan is a living document that is flexible and responsive to changing community needs. As such, continued regular District Literacy Advisory Committee and Community Literacy Planning Committee meetings will occur to support implementation, monitoring and annual updating of the plan.

## Literacy Vision

The district literacy planning process identified the following literacy vision for the region:

**All residents of the Southeast Kootenay will have the opportunity to attain, improve and maintain the literacy skills necessary to fully participate in the community and economy.**

To this end, we value and support all literacy initiatives and the development of lifelong learning opportunities through sustainable and quality literacy resources that are accessible for all community members. Through these efforts we continually strive:

- To increase literacy awareness throughout all communities
- To sustain, strengthen and expand the existing literacy services and programs
- To embed literacy services and programs in community settings

## Definition of Literacy

For the purposes of this document we support the broad definition of literacy provided by Literacy Now:

**Literacy is an essential cultural, social and academic practice that involves not only reading, writing, and numeracy, but also a variety of abilities including viewing and representing, aural literacy including language, musical and listening skills, and cultural literacy including civic skills.**

**Literacies enable us to communicate, represent and evaluate knowledge in multiple ways. The more literacies we learn, the greater our understanding of the world. Literacy is a continuum of skills. We can become more literate.**

The District Literacy Advisory Committee adopted the following definition in 2008:

**Literacy skills are critical indicators of preparedness of Canadians for the workplace and further education. They provide the capacity for innovative thinking and ability required in today's knowledge based economy. People with high levels of literacy are more likely to be engaged in society, which benefits them and as well the communities they live in.**

The District Literacy Plan reflects and values the intent of both the vision and definition of literacy and serves as a basis for dialogue to improve the literacy opportunities for lifelong learning in all communities.

# **2013/2014 District Literacy Plan**

## **Overview Update**

The District Literacy Plan is broken into two parts. Part 1 captures the Elk Valley and Electoral Districts A and B Community Literacy Plan; and Part 2 contains the Cranbrook and Electoral District C Community Literacy Plan. Both parts were completed using the same process in which Community Literacy Planning Committees went through the following four step planning process:

1. Each committee identified local, regional and provincial/national events which affected our communities in the past year and the challenges they presented.
2. Successes and challenges in providing literacy services and addressing literacy needs were noted.
3. Each committee identified the gaps in services and reflected on the resources required to provide them (an ongoing process) along with compiling current community literacy programs (See Appendix 2A & 2B).
4. A list of achievable goals and actions for the coming year were then articulated.

The results of the Community Literacy Planning Committees efforts are reflected in the community plans and the appendices that follow. Ongoing tracking, reviewing and adapting is necessary to ensure the plans remain relevant and support achievement of stated goals.

- Has a District-wide point of view.
- Receives and collates information from Community Literacy Planning Councils.
- Looks for common themes and goals that are district wide.
- Identifies actions and potential partners with resources that can be brought together to address district wide goals.
- Writes the updated District plan document.
- Submits plan to the School District Board of Education for approval each fall.

## Community Literacy Planning Council – Cranbrook, Elk Valley (Fernie, Elkford, Sparwood)

- Recognizes and respects that organizations and institutions in the community have independent planning and accountability processes.
- Provides an opportunity to network, explore common goals and objectives and work together to achieve the goals of both individual organizations and the community.
- Links to existing community planning processes to address the 4 pillars: Early learning success, School aged, Adult, and Aboriginal literacy.
- Identifies community goals for literacy development and actions needed to address those goals through partnerships amongst literacy providers.
- Collates information and reports to the District Planning Committee.

## Conclusion

The collaborative efforts required to create the South East Kootenay District Literacy Plan reflect the commitment individuals and organizations have to achieving improved literacy skills.
