SLENDER FALSE-BROM

(Brachypodium sylvaticum)

HAVE YOU SEEN THIS PLANT?

DESCRIPTION

- Native to Eurasia
- Perennial bunchgrass
- Mature plants distinctly bright green with a graceful, nodding form
- Grow into solid mats, 30 to 45 cm tall
- Usually remain green throughout the year
- Young plants resemble a crouching 'many-legged spider'
- Fringe of fine hairs easily seen around the edge of the leaf when held up to the sky
- Leaf blade flat and floppy (0.75 cm wide)
- Open leaf sheath freely releases the stem when pulled back
- Flower spikelets droop with little to no stalks
- Fibrous root
- Prefers closed to semi-open temperate conifer forests but will establish along dry, open roadsides, cobble riparian areas and grasslands
- Reproduces mainly by seed but also by root and stem fragments Local dispersal mainly by wind, water, wildlife, humans and vehicles. Intentional planting for range improvement or ornamental gardens is the main pathway for long distance dispersal.

PRIMARY THREAT: Increases wildfire risk; www.kingcounty.gov out-competes native forest understory and grassland vegetation.
