

INVASIVE TREES IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

The following non-native tree species have been assessed by the BC Ministry of Forests' Invasive Plant Program and the BC Inter-Ministry Invasive Species Working Group and confirmed as either invasive or potential species of concern* to British Columbia. These tree species may spread quickly and threaten environmental, social, cultural and/or economic values.

While none of the following species are currently Provincially regulated, planting, selling, or trading of these species is strongly discouraged and removal where possible is recommended. Potential replacement species to plant instead of a few of the trees listed below can be found in the <u>Grow Me</u> <u>Instead Guide (https://bcinvasives.ca/play-your-part/plantwise/grow-me-instead/)</u>. Sightings of these tree species can be reported to the Province via the options listed at <u>gov.bc.ca/invasive-species</u>.
