

What are oxo-degradable plastics?

Oxo-degradable plastics (including oxo-biodegradable plastics) contain additives that break down through oxidation, leaving microplastics that pollute the environment. They often claim to degrade and are commonly used in products that are marketed as biodegradable, green or eco-friendly.

What you need to know

PROHIBITED



As of July 15, 2024, B.C. businesses can no longer sell or distribute any packaging or single-use (disposable) products that contain oxo-degradable plastics. This doesn't affect products made from conventional plastics.

What you need to do

 Stop selling single-use products that contain oxo-degradable plastic

Speak to your suppliers, and check the labels on all single-use plastic products you sell or distribute.

Stop offering packaging that contains oxo-degradable plastic

Don't provide customers with single-use items or packaging made completely or partly from oxo-degradable plastics.

These items are exempt under the regulation, and may continue to be used.

EXEMPTIONS

Medical devices containing oxo-degradable plastic

Oxo-degradable plastic items made for sale or distribution outside of B.C.

Oxo-degradable plastics may be found in some packaging and disposable products that claim to degrade or fragment, such as:



Dog-waste bags



Garbage bags



Dry-cleaning bags

Acceptable items are typically labelled as: Made from recycled content Made from PE (polyethylene) Made from LDPE (low-density polyethylene)

Items to avoid are typically labelled as:	
Oxo-degradable	8

Oxo-plastic	8
