This document is intended to help British Columbian local governments, First Nations, and community organizations find appropriate funding to support energy planning, energy efficiency, and clean energy projects. This list provides summary information about each program/funding opportunity, including the program title, description, details on eligibility, funding available, funding organization, contact information, and website address.

Funding opportunities are organized alphabetically by program name and have been categorized according to the focus of each program: general funding; regionally specific funding; funding for First Nations; funding for Local Governments; upcoming funding; and non-funding programs. A cross-reference table allows for quick identification of program eligibility based on project and community characteristics.

The information is up-to-date as of March 14, 2019, and will be updated periodically as funding details change.

## For Your Information: Did You Know Your Energy Project Could Be a Public Utility?

In BC, public utilities are regulated by BC Utilities Commission (BCUC) under the <u>Utilities Commission</u> <u>Act.</u>

A public utility, as defined by the <u>Utilities Commission Act</u>, consists of any person or entity that owns or operates assets for the production, transmission, delivery or sale of electricity, steam, thermal energy or gas to the public for compensation. This includes thermal and district energy systems, electrical and gas distribution lines, pipelines, electrical transmission and more.

#### Who is excluded as a public utility?

- Municipalities or regional districts operating or providing services within their own boundaries;
- producers who do not resell the service or commodity beyond themselves, their employees or tenants;
- entities within the petroleum industry or in the wellhead production of oil, natural gas or other natural petroleum substances; and
- entities engaged in geothermal production.



### 1.3. Columbia Basin Trust (CBT) – Energy Sustainability Grants





Category



#### Description

The Energy Sustainability Grants program will support projects that create opportunities for alternative & renewable energy generation at Community Purpose Buildings. Applications may also include activities related to energy conservation & efficiency for those buildings.

Eligible costs include, but are not limited to, the purchase and/or installation of alternative & renewable energy generation systems such as: solar panels, biomass energy boilers, heat storage, air or ground source heat pumps, micro hydro systems, and wind turbines.

In addition to the eligible costs listed above, the program may also consider costs associated with energy conservation and efficiency improvements such as: air sealing; heating, ventilation, and air conditioning upgrades, increase in insulation values, and thermostat and other controls.

Eligible applicants include registered non-profits, local governments and indigenous organizations in the Basin that own Community Purpose Buildings. School districts and registered public colleges may be eligible where the project is specifically for a space used for broader public purposes by external organizations and the space is not being used by the school or college for providing education.

#### Description

The Low Carbon Economy Challenge is part of the Low Carbon Economy Fund. It will leverage Canadian ingenuity to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and generate clean growth in support of Canada's clean growth and climate action plan, the Pan-Canadian Framework on Clean Growth and Climate Change. The Challenge has one upcoming stream:

<u>Partnerships Stream</u>: The \$50M Partnerships stream is limited to Indigenous communities and organizations, small and medium-sized businesses (less than 500 employees), not-for-profit organizations and small municipalities (populations less than 100,000). This stream will help ensure a broad range of Canadians are able to participate in the Challenge.

Whether you're upgrading appliances, building new or renovating, FortisBC Conservation and Energy Management program has rebates on building envelop improvements, high-efficiency appliances, equipment, and more. A special "Top Up" program is also available for First Nations' commercial upgrades.

The Energy Conservation Assistance Program provides income-qualified households with a free home energy evaluation, energy-saving products, and advice. Some homes may also qualify for Energy Star refrigerator; insulation in walls, attics and/or crawlspaces; and an Energy Star natural gas furnace.

#### 1.6. Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources – Community Energy Leadership Program (CELP)





Category

#### Description

The Community Energy Leadership Program (CELP) provides funding to energy efficiency and clean energy projects owned by local governments or First Nations. This funding supports communities in reducing greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, increasing energy efficiency, stimulating economic activity, and promoting partnerships with industry to advance British Columbia's growing clean energy sector. Eligible projects must meet the following criteria:

- 1. Clean energy projects or energy efficiency projects
- 2. Incorporate community ownership
- 3. Capital projects, including construction, renewal, retrofit, expansion, or material enhancements (CELP does not fund community energy planning, project design or feasibility studies).

Some examples of projects CELP funds include the capital costs for district energy/heating systems; energy efficient retrofits of community-owned facilities like recreation centres; and solar photovoltaic-energy storage hybrid micro-grid systems for remote communities. ### 1.7. Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources – EfficiencyBC





Category

#### Description

The new EfficiencyBC program helps people save energy and reduce their environmental footprint. Financial incentives through the program can take multiple forms, including replacing a fossil fuel (i.e. oil, propane or natural gas) heating system with an electric air-source heat pump, upgrading to a high-efficiency natural gas furnace or installing improved windows and doors that minimize heat loss.

EfficiencyBC, along with partner programs, will provide up to \$14,000 for a home and up to \$200,000 for a commercial or social housing building to switch to high-efficiency heating equipment or make building envelope improvements. EfficiencyBC is jointly funded by Province and the Government of Canada under the Low Carbon Economy Fund. Program offers are administered by BC Hydro, FortisBC, and BC Housing and with further support from several local governments.

#### Description

The CleanBC Communities Fund (CCF), under the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program is administered jointly by the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy's Climate Action Secretariat and the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MAH). The CCF is a component of the CleanBC plan and it supports the province's energy, economic, environmental and greenhouse gas reduction priorities. The CCF program targets capital infrastructure projects for public use and benefit and meet the following outcomes: increased capacity to manage renewable energy; increased access to clean energy transportation; increased energy efficiency of buildings; and increased generation of clean energy.

Eligible applicants are Local Governments and Indigenous Ultimate Recipients. Not-for-Profit organizations and For-Profit organizations can also apply when working in collaboration with a Local Government or Indigenous government.

# 1.9. Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing – Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program – Rural and Northern Communities (RNC)





Category

#### Description

The Rural and Northern Communities Program, under the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program, administered by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MAH) and focused on improving the quality of life in rural communities by responding to their specific needs. Investments in rural infrastructure will help grow local economies, build stronger, more inclusive communities, and help safeguard the environment and the health of Canadians. The RNC program targets capital infrastructure projects in communities with a population of 25,000 or less and provides additional funding towards projects in communities with populations of 5,000 or less. Eligible applicants are Local Governments, Indigenous Ultimate Recipients, Not-for-Profit organizations and For-Profit organizations (when working in collaboration with a local government or Indigenous government). The Program is focused on infrastructure that will support a variety of areas including food security; reliable road, air or marine access; broadband connectivity; efficient and reliable energy; Indigenous health and educational facilities; community, culture and recreation; local public transit; improved resilience to natural disaster events; and, environmental quality.

The desired results of the energy related outcome is to increase the efficiency of electricity that is generated by a community, as well as creating energy through cleaner alternative methods. Examples include replacing diesel generated power with alternative energy sources including but not limited to solar power, wind power and biofuel.

### 1.10. Natural Resource Canada – Clean Energy for Rural and Remote Communities (CERRC)



#### Description

The Program will target three key areas:

- 1. **BioHeat** to reduce fossil fuel use through the installation, retrofit or investigation into the feasibility of biomass heating or combined heat and power systems for community and/or industrial applications.
- 2. **Innovative demonstrations** to reduce fossil fuel use through the validation of novel renewable energy, energy efficiency, energy storage, and smart-grid technologies and applications. Front-end engineering design studies are also eligible for funding.
- 3. **Deployment of renewable energy technologies** for electricity including hydro, wind, solar, geothermal, and bioenergy. Heat may also be produced, but the primary purpose of the project must be electricity production.
- 4. **Capacity Building** in the form of knowledge and skills development, to support the reduction of diesel in rural and remote communities.

#### **Application Deadlines**

BioHeat, Demonstration, and Deployment Proposals received:

- Thursday, December 4<sup>th</sup>, 2018
   provides option for a 30 minute discussion of your submission with program officers before the final submission date.
- Tuesday, February 26<sup>th</sup>, 2019
   Final deadline to be eligible for the second round evaluation review.
- After February 26<sup>th</sup>, 2019
   Proposals will be considered for the next round of CERRC funding.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> call for preliminary proposals under the CERRC <u>Capacity</u> <u>Building Stream</u> is open and the deadline is 23:59 EDT March 29, 2019.

#### **Funding Available**

\$220 million over six years (starting in 2018) to support rural and remote communities in the provinces and territories (North and South of 60).

#### Remote communities and locations:

- Not connected to the North American electrical grid nor to the natural gas pipeline network

### 3.6. Indigenous Services Canada – First Nation Infrastructure Fund (FNIF)



#### Description

First Nation Infrastructure Fund (FNIF) is the main program through which Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) supports general community infrastructure such as roads and bridges, broadband connectivity, cultural and recreational facilities and other, on reserve.

The goal of FNIF is to improve the quality of life and the environment for First Nation communities. FNIF helps First Nations in the provinces improve and increase public infrastructure on reserves, on Crown Land, and on land set aside for the use and benefit of a First Nation. FNIF also funds those projects off reserve that are cost-shared with non-First Nation partners, such as neighbouring municipalities, or other Indigenous partners (such as self-governing First Nations or Inuit organizations).

### 3.7. Indigenous Services Canada – Community Opportunity Readiness Program (CORP)



#### Description

The Community Opportunity Readiness Program (CORP) provides project-based funding to First Nation and Inuit communities for a range of activities to support communities' pursuit of economic opportunities and leverage private sector resources necessary to realize the full potential of these opportunities. Where First Nation and Inuit communities, or their representative organizations, identify opportunities and lack the financial resources to pursue them, CORP provides communities an opportunity to submit proposals to obtain additional funding.

The CORP Regional Process is designed to support proposals requesting up to \$250,000. Projects requesting over \$250,000 are ranked and reviewed through the national CORP Prioritization Framework Process, which is designed to support projects with the most optimal economic opportunities.

#### 1. CORP Regional Process

An annual call out letter for Statements of Intent (SOI) is issued in the fall. The SOIs are reviewed in compliance
with the National CORP Guidelines. The SOIs are ranked on a regional project ranking scale. The highest ranked
submissions are asked to submit a full application for further review and assessment.

# 3.9. Indigenous Services Canada – New Approach for Housing Support in British Columbia (NAHS)





Category



#### Description

The New Approach for Housing Support (NAHS) in British Columbia provides a wider range of eligible activities and flexibility for First Nations than the <u>Housing Subsidy Program</u>. Both programs are part of Indigenous Services Canada's (ISC) support for First Nations on-reserve housing, but not part of the national <u>First Nations On-Reserve Housing Program</u> which does not effectively support many of the smaller First Nations in British Columbia. NAHS is delivered through the annual <u>First Nations Infrastructure Investment Plan</u> process.

#### **Application Deadlines**

As NAHS is delivered through the annual <u>First</u> <u>Nations Infrastructure</u> <u>Investment Plan</u>, applications must be submitted to ISC's <u>regional</u> <u>office in British Columbia</u> by October 15<sup>th</sup> of each year. To apply, please contact ISC's British Columbia office.

#### **Funding Available**

NAHS has three streams:

- Stream 1 provides funding to help First
  Nations establish a housing strategy that
  works for their community, including
  planning, policy development, and
  training/capacity building opportunities
- Stream 2 provides funding for housing construction or renovation
- Stream 3 provides funding for lot development and subsidies for new housing

## 3.10. Natural Resource Canada – Indigenous Forestry Initiative (IFI)







Category





#### Description

The Indigenous Forestry Initiative (IFI) provides funding to support the economic development of Indigenous peoples in Canada. The activities we fund promote greater participation by Indigenous communities in all natural resource sectors, especially the forest sector. Proposed projects must be aimed at achieving economic development through one of the following activity areas:

- Clean technology and participation in the forest bioeconomy (e.g. a project that promotes using biomass for heat and power to reduce reliance on diesel fuel)
- Environmental stewardship (e.g. a project that focuses on climate change mitigation and adaptation, land reclamation, or environmental/ecological services)
- Use and management of forest resources (e.g. a project that gives people in the community training in forest management)

As well, eligible projects must have at least one partner (e.g. federal or provincial government, industry, or research organization) that has agreed to contribute financially or with in-kind goods or services.

#### **Application Deadlines**

IFI accepts proposals throughout the year, as funds allow. If you are interested in applying for funding under the Indigenous Forestry Initiative, contact the BC Regional Coordinator. Your Regional Coordinator will work with you to determine your eligibility, provide advice, and support you during the application process.

#### **Funding Available**

The IFI invests \$1 million annually to support forest-based Indigenous economic development across Canada. In June 2017, the Government of Canada announced it would expand the IFI program with \$10 million in funding over three years.

# 3.11. Ministry of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation – First Nations Clean Energy Business Fund (FNCEBF)







Category





#### Description

The FNCEBF aims to promote increased Aboriginal community participation in the clean energy sector within their asserted traditional territories and treaty areas through agreements between the BC Government and the eligible applicant to:

- **Capacity Funding:** Provide capacity development funding to support applicants to undertake activities such as feasibility studies or to engage with proponents of clean energy projects.
- **Equity Grant:** Provide grants to qualifying applicants to support capital costs related to the implementation of community energy efficiency and demand-side management projects within their community. Potential help acquire equity positions in clean energy projects or in the construction of renewable energy projects
- **Revenue Sharing:** Share in the revenues from clean energy projects based on new, net, incremental revenues to government derived from water rentals, land rents, and eventually wind participation rents.

#### **Application Deadlines**

This program has regular ongoing intakes. January 31<sup>st</sup> and May 31<sup>st</sup> are the intake closing dates each year. Please refer to the FNCEBF website for details.

#### **Funding Available**

Capacity Funding – up to a maximum of \$50,000 Equity Funding – up to a maximum of \$500,000

### 3.12. New Relationship Trust (NRT) – Capacity Initiative Grants







#### Description

Direct Support funding is intended to help First Nation communities build capacity in the areas that they need it most. A total of \$1.5 million was allocated for direct support in 2017-2018. Funding is available in two streams:

- A maximum of \$25,000 per project is available to individual First Nations
- A maximum of \$50,000 per project is available to groups of three First Nations who are collaborating on a capacity building initiative.

In 2016, Western Economic Diversification Canada made an investment of \$1.5 Million into the New Relationship Trust to create an Economic Development Support Team (EDST) that will provide advice and support to First Nation communities that want to advance economic opportunities.

### 4.3. Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) — Green Municipal Fund (GMF)





Category



#### Description

Canadian municipalities can apply for funding through Federation of Canadian Municipalities' (FCM) Green Municipal Fund for municipal projects that improve air, water, and soil quality, and reduce energy consumption.

Grants are available for plans, feasibility studies, and pilot projects. Low-interest loans combined with grants are available for environmental capital projects.

FCM's Green Municipal Fund can also help municipalities achieve their goals with its resources, peer learning and training activities, knowledge sharing products (including webinars, guidebooks and case studies), as well as networking opportunities.

#### **Application Deadlines**

Applications for plans, studies, and pilot projects are accepted year-round.

Applications for environmental capital projects are accepted twice a year on March 1<sup>st</sup> and August 1<sup>st</sup>.

#### **Funding Available**

For studies and plans, up to 50% of eligible costs to a maximum of \$350,000. For capital projects, up to 80% of eligible costs to a maximum \$10 million combined with a grant for up to 15% of the loan amount.

#### Description

Federation of Canadian Municipalities' (FCM) Municipalities for Climate Innovation Program provides funding, training and resources to help Canadian municipalities adapt to the impacts of climate change, such as flooding, wind events and extreme temperatures (hotter summers and colder winters), as well as reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

FCM's Municipalities for Climate Innovation Program can also help municipalities achieve their goals through its peer learning activities, knowledge sharing products and networking opportunities. The program is delivered by FCM and funded by the Government of Canada.

In budget 2018 the Program was extended to 2021 with an additional \$75 million in funding to help rural communities across British Columbia reinvigorate and diversify their local economies, making them more attractive places to live and work

This has been realized through Project investment, championing the utilization of BC biomass, forming partnerships between B.C.'s research institutions and the private sector, and by actively communicating the potential and importance of bioenergy.

BCBN is aligned with the BC Government's strategy to reinvigorate the bioenergy cluster in B.C. with the goal of supporting greater investment and innovation in bioenergy and renewable biofuel projects and technologies. BCBN's current areas of focus include decarbonizing long-distance transportation (marine, aviation, rail, and trucking), expansion of the renewable natural gas sector, developing the hydrogen economy and the advancement of community and municipal waste to energy initiatives.

#### **Steps to a Winning Grant Application**

#### **Preparing an Application**

- 1. Review the Funding Guide to determine if programs are available to support your project.
- Ensure a good fit. Check your project's goals and objectives against those of the funding program. Review evaluation criteria and ensure that your proposal responds directly to each or as many as possible.
- 3. Contact funding agency. Describe your project and ask:
  - Does this project meet the funding program's goals and objectives?
  - What are key elements of past successful applications?
  - What are evaluation criteria (if not listed on form)?
  - Can supporting material (such as letters of support) be submitted after the closing date?
  - Are previous applications available for review?
  - Is Council or Board endorsement of the application required?
- 4. Create a timeline for application preparation and an application package checklist, including:
  - Obtaining executive committee, Council or Board endorsement, if required
  - Identifying and/or obtaining supporting funding
  - Identifying possible partners and reaching agreements
  - Writing the proposal and ensuring senior management review and final edits
  - Securing letters of support
  - Developing a budget
  - Copying and filing
  - Submission deadline, format, and method of delivery (postmarked document, email, etc.)
- 5. Review application package checklist and ensure that all requirements have been met.
- 6. Submit the proposal on time in the required format.

#### **Application Content**

- 1. Follow the recommended format of the proposal.
- 2. Focus on key elements and ensure that you clearly address evaluation criteria. Include everything you think is important, but be succinct longer is not better.

- 3. List resources your agency has committed or will commit, to ensure the success of the project.
- 4. Identify partners and note how you will work with them to ensure success.
- 5. Describe any planned community engagement processes, if required. Consider using innovative approaches.
- 6. Facts and figures are helpful. If possible, calculate or estimate the magnitude of benefits of the project.
- 7. A budget can be either calculated or estimated, but it should not necessarily reflect the maximum amount of funding available unless you can justify it. Provide a reasonable level of detail for costs, itemize matching funds, and mention in-kind contributions, if any.
