

Proposed Tenure Disposition in the Great Bear Rainforest North Timber Supply Area

Purpose of this Document

This document provides detail on a tenure transfer in the Great Bear Rainforest (GBR) North Timber Supply Area (TSA).

The tenure transfer requires the approval of decision makers in the Ministry of Forests (the "Ministry"). Details on the legal requirements for the approval and the process the ministry will employ to determine if the disposition should be approved, are within the document titled "Disposition of an Agreement Administrative Guide". Details of the Disposition Requests

The Ministry of Forests has received an application to complete the following tenure transfers in the Great Bear Rainforest North TSA:

- The subdivision of Replaceable Forest Licence (RFL) A16850 with an allowable annual cut (AAC) of 83,382 m³/yr into an amended A16850 with an AAC of 15,846 m³/yr and the creation of three new RFLs, A99081, A99841 and A99715 with AACs of 41,690 m³/yr, 15,845 m³/yr and 10,001m³/yr respectively.
- 2. The transfer of the subdivided RFL A16850 with an AAC of 15,846 m³/yr from Interfor to the Metlakatla First Nation or its wholly-owned corporate nominee.
- 3. The transfer of the new RFL A99081 with an AAC of 41,690 m³/yr from Interfor to the Heiltsuk Tribal Council or its wholly-owned corporate nominee.
- 4. The transfer of the new RFL A99481 with an AAC of 15,845 m³/yr from Interfor to the Lax Kw'alaams First Nation or its wholly-owned corporate nominee.
- 5. The transfer of the new RFL A99715 with an AAC of 10,001 m³/yr from Interfor to the Gitga'at First Nation or its wholly-owned corporate nominee.
- 6. The transfer of A16837 with an AAC of 14,049 m3 from Sonora Logging to the Gitga'at First Nation.

What is a Replaceable Forest Licence and what rights are being provided?

RFL's are a form of forest tenure that provide harvesting rights in a TSA. RFLs are replaced every 10 years with a new term of 15 years. Details of the RFLs being subdivided and/or transferred follows:

Are there other Tenures or Permits that will be transferred?

Interfor has indicated that some road permits (RPs) cutting permits (CPs), and Licences of Occupation (permits issued under the *Land Act*) may be transferred in whole or in part to the new tenure holders. There will be no ancillary permits transferred as part of the transaction with Sonora Logging.

Where will the RFLs be allowed to operate?

The RFLs will provide the holder with the right to apply for CPs and RPs within the GBR North TSA. The approval of the CPs and RPs will require consultation with First Nations and the approval of the District Manager to ensure they meet all legal requirements. A map of the GBR North TSA is attached.

It is a common practice for tenure holders in a TSA to enter into an operating area agreement to restrict their operations to a certain area of the TSA. This arrangement avoids tenure holders from overlapping operations and helps to ensure orderly planning in the TSA. These operating area arrangements are business to business arrangements by tenure holders and are not mandated by the ministry.



It is expected that new tenure holders will operate within the operating area historically allocated to the RFL they acquire and any future operating area changes will be done through discussion with other tenure holders in the GBR North TSA.

What harvest rights have been provided in the GBR North TSA?

The GBR North TSA's current AAC is 803,000 m³/yr as of January 1, 2017. The GBR North TSA AAC was allocated (or apportioned) into Forest Licences and for use by BC Timber Sales as follows:

Are manufacturing facilities involved in the transaction?

There are no timber processing requirements with the RFL.



Is there contracting requirement associated with the RFLs?

There are no contractors with contractor rights associated with these RFLs.

What happens to existing obligations, such as for silviculture and roads?

If there are outstanding silviculture obligations accrued under the RFL from previous harvesting, the new holder of the RFL becomes responsible for all of these obligations once the transfer is completed.

Going forward, the new holder will also be responsible for all future silviculture requirements associated with their own harvesting under the RFL, as well as obligations to pay stumpage and annual rent.

Existing obligations associated with road permits are still being determined between Interfor and the intended recipients, as some road permits may be fully deactivated and some road sections may be removed from a permit.

Requests may also be made under the provisions of the *Forest and Range Practices Act* for a new holder to transfer outstanding silviculture obligations back to Interfor, where both parties agree to do so and have received the Minister's approval. This is a separate process from the transfer of the RFL.

Interfor continues to work with individual First Nations to ensure that each transaction clearly identifies the obligations that come with the transferred tenure agreements and road permits. Where possible, Interfor seeks to align the holding of existing obligations where they are clearly located within a particular Nation's traditional territory. Where a First Nation partner is unwilling to assume obligations associated with a road permit or outstanding silviculture obligations from previous harvesting, these obligations remain with, or will be transferred back to, Interfor.

Within the GBR North TSA, Interfor has indicated that all outstanding silviculture obligations will likely be retained by the company, subject to agreements with First Nation partners. Interfor has committed to the province that all silviculture and road obligations that remain with their company will be met.

How will harvest operations be conducted?

Interfor has submitted a major FSP amendment under the *Forest and Range Practices Act* to Interfor's existing Multi-Licensee Forest Stewardship Plan #675 for consideration by the Ministry. Metlakatla and Lax Kw'alaam will be FSP licence holders under this approved amendment.

Gitga'at and Heiltsuk Tribal Council will be developing their own Forest Stewardship Plans.
