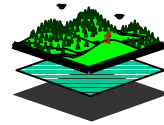
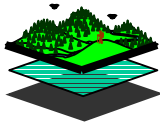

HOW LOCAL GOVERNMENTS CAN USE THE OKANAGAN-SHUSWAP LRMP

This Fact Sheet is one of a series of Implementation Fact Sheets/Bulletins prepared by the Plan Support Team (PST) to provide information on various components related to the implementation of the Okanagan-Shuswap LRMP (OSLRMP). Fact Sheet #6 identifies linkages between strategic management direction in the OSLRMP document and the activities of local governments. Specific provisions of the LRMP can assist local governments directly in undertaking their planning functions and acquiring land for public purposes. In addition, the LRMP can assist local government staff to respond to provincial agency referrals and can inform local government planning processes.
