ROAD RESTRICTIONS NOTICE #2 March 22, 2024

for the Prince George Natural Resource District (including Robson Valley)

This notice becomes **effective Monday March 25, 2024, at 10:00am**, at which time it supersedes Road Restrictions Notice #1 dated March 05, 2024.

Note: Reduced Night-haul Window

Be advised, pursuant to Section 6 (2) (e) of the Forest Service Road Use Regulation, road restrictions will be implemented on Forest Service Roads (FSRs) within the Prince George Natural Resource District (including the Robson Valley), as follows:

All Forest Service Roads in the Prince George Natural Resource District (including Robson Valley):

Effective Monday March 25, 2024, at 10:00am:

Nights Midnight (00:01am) - 09:00am: 100% Highway Legal Axle Loading.

Days 09:00am - 11:59pm: 50% Highway Legal Axle Loading.

Effective Sunday March 31, 2024, at 09:00am:

Nights Midnight (00:01am) - 09:00am: 70% Highway Legal Axle Loading.

Days 09:00am – 11:59pm: 50% Highway Legal Axle Loading.

Use of the FSR's for the following is not restricted:

- Road maintenance activities.
- Industrial equipment lowbedding (maximum 100% Highway Legal Axle Loading, and must only be done in most favorable road conditions).
- Tree planting activities.
- Grocery, fuel, and other essential deliveries to communities.
- Camp resumption activities (maximum 100% Highway Legal Axle Loading, and must only be done in most favorable road conditions).

Road users must monitor roads for damage. If any subgrade damage occurs, activity must cease immediately.

The road restrictions are established to limit the use of heavy loads on FSRs during periods when the road surface and subgrade are susceptible to damage. Road users are reminded of their obligations under Section 10 of the Forest Service Road Use Regulations:

Damage to roads

- **10** (1) A person must not use a forest service road or operate or cause to be operated a motor vehicle or other equipment on it in a manner that damages the forest service road.
- (2) If damage results to a forest service road as a result of a contravention of subsection (1), the district manager may, in addition to any other remedy available at law, order the person who committed that breach to pay to the government the reasonable costs of the repair.

Road users should anticipate road restrictions of up to 50 percent of legal highway axle loading. If damage continues, the District Manager will consider closing the FSR to industrial traffic. For more detailed information on MOTI load restrictions, please visit the MOTI webpage.

MOTI-Load Restrictions.

Exemptions may be considered for specific sections of FSRs that are pre-determined to have all-season load bearing characteristics. Applications for such exemptions must be applied for in writing early to the District Manager, and associated with pre-considered operational strategies and rational of how damage will be prevented and/or incurred damage will be mitigated. The District Manager may require a professional sign-off of all road use, repair plans and final mitigation.
