Interior Health

Interior Health is responsible for ensuring publicly-funded health services are provided to over 730,000 residents of the Southern Interior. This large geographic area covers almost 216,000 square kilometres, including larger cities such as Kelowna, Kamloops and Cranbrook, as well as a many rural and remote communities.

- \$381 million for the **Interior Heart and Surgical Centre** in Kelowna.
- \$30 million to complete two unfinished floors in **Vernon Jubilee Hospital's Polson Tower**, accommodating 60 inpatient beds.
- \$80 million for a new clinical services building at **Royal Inland Hospital** in Kamloops the first phase of redevelopment.
- \$21 million for **Shuswap Lake Hospital** redevelopment and emergency department expansion.
- \$20 million for an intensive care unit and electrical upgrade at **East Kootenay Regional Hospital** in Cranbrook.
