The objectives include: 1) to increase access to support and services for band members at risk of experiencing family violence and violence against women; 2) to assist victims of family violence and violence against women through individual and family counselling; 3) to develop, train, and implement a local Community Response Team, consisting of band members, staff and service providers; 4) to provide educational presentations on violence to students at the Blueberry School.	\$26,000	Buick Creek

The second phase will include two different groups: 1) A 10 week First Nation men's group based on the "Kizhaay Anishinaabe Niin: I am a Kind Man" program and 2) A 10 week First Nations women's group based on Haven Society's program "Strategies for Empowerment". Its goal was to address a gap in voluntary services for those men choosing to address their abusive behaviour towards their partners. Change for Good: Phase II will build on the lessons and successes of Phase I. Like Phase I, this project aims to address both family violence and violence against women using the same broad objectives: 1) to provide accessible counselling for those voluntarily choosing to address abusive or violent behaviour, and 2) to increase community awareness of both family and gender-based violence.	\$30,000	Penticton

Through the "Friendship, Not Fear, Anti-bullying Program", Trails Crossing Friendship Centre will aim to improve inter race relations by promoting understanding and acceptance. The project will engage all youth in the community in activities that transcend and bridge the cultural canyon. The Friendship Center will host youth drop-ins and engage youth in activities that promote friendship.
