Purpose:

- This Qualification Matrix identifies EMCR recognized training required for recognized capabilities in SAR in BC
- The GSAR Qualifications Matrix has been developed to provide direction to all GSAR Volunteers, regardless of your length of service, and Training Officers in their training plans and development of GSAR Skills
- EMCR expects that all GSAR Groups will utilize this matrix to plan and execute training for the skills they wish to achieve, or work towards within the recognized capabilities of their Groups. GSAR Groups may exceed the training described, where applicable.
- Pre-Requisites – in some cases you will note that EMCR has listed a pre-requisite as being the GSAR Program (formerly known as the EMRG 1700, plus ICS100), this may not reflect the provider's requirement. The intent is that **EMCR strongly recommends** completion of the GSAR Program prior to undertaking that training. We recognize some volunteers may have this training prior to joining GSAR.

Document Lifecycle:

- This is intended to be a living document. Training Standards are not static and are expected to change. Updates will be required, and dates within the document will assist you in knowing how recent the document or section is, i.e. Wildland Rope Rescue POG is released on January 18, 2022, and the links on that tab are dated February 24, 2022 – this indicates the POG updates have been incorporated into the update.
- It is **strongly recommended not** to print this document, but rather to bookmark it to ensure you always have the most up to date information when reviewing.

Training Cost Responsibility:

- Training Cost Responsibility has been identified for courses, where indicated as EMCR, this indicates that the training provider (i.e. JIBC) invoices EMCR for those courses. Where GSAR Groups are indicated as responsible for training costs, please remember this is a GSAR Group level decision as to whether your group will reimburse you. EMCR does not require training costs to be reimbursed and leaves those decisions to the discretion of the Group.
- Some specialty or professional development courses will indicate GSAR volunteer. This identification of individual expenses does not overrule any GSAR Group decisions to reimburse their members for training costs, at their discretion.
