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INTRODUCTION - LIBRARY AND COMMUNITY PROFILE

The Castlegar and District Public Library is located in the city of Castlegar in the West Kootenay region of British Columbia. From its humble beginnings in the 1940s in the basement of the United Church, to the current building that expanded in 2000, the Library is supported and appreciated by the community it serves.

Our Library often receives compliments for being an open, welcoming place where friendly staff are ready to assist patrons with their requests and where citizens and visitors can meet to socialize and learn.

We boast busy meeting rooms that host a number of community organizations as well as our own programs. We are happy to offer extensive outreach in the community, and continuously work towards being a "special place in the community to explore, create, share ideas, information and have fun."

The Library serves a wide geographic area including the City of Castlegar, Areas I, and J of the Regional District of Central Kootenay (RDCK), with a service area population of nearly 14,000. Through a service agreement with the Nelson Library, we also serve residents of Area H South of the RDCK. The major employers in the area include Selkirk College, Zellstoff Celgar, and School District 20. The major regional employer, Teck Resources, is located 30 kilometers from Castlegar.

Our library is a public library association within the Library Act. The Province of BC provides 12% of our overall funding. The City of Castlegar and the Regional District of the Central Kootenay provide 85% of our revenue combined. Our goal in 2022 was to return to in person programming beginning with our Summer Reading Club. Our focus was getting back to the basics of library programming with programs that promote and build reading skills as well as socialization. We also continued to build digital resources that gained popularity during the pandemic.

Parent Child Mother Goose

<p>In 2022, the library and the Columbia Basin Alliance for Literacy (CBAL) returned to an in-person Parent Child Mother Goose Program with a 12-week session in the fall.</p> <p>This literacy and relationship-building program for babies and their caregivers gives families a welcoming space to meet others while learning rhymes and songs.</p> <p>The Library and the CBAL each contribute one staff member to the Parent Child Mother Goose program. The Library provides the meeting space and we each advertise the program within the community.</p>

<p>Advancing citizen engagement - The Parent Child Mother Goose Program brings caregivers and their children into our space fostering an early connection with the library. The program encourages social inclusion by gathering caregivers and infants and promotes positive parenting skills. Parent Child Mother Goose is a recognized program that encourages strong family bonds through song, rhymes and storytelling.</p>

What are the key outcomes of this project/program?

For the past 3 years, the Parent Child Mother Goose Program has been online. In the fall of 2022, the program returned to the library with roughly 4-6 caregivers and their babies coming consistently. Our current winter sessions has 13 families coming. Parents are meeting, talking, laughing and learning together.

A to Z Toddler Time / Preschool Storytime / Summer Reading Club

2022 started with a continuation of outdoor weekly storytime for toddlers and preschoolers. Staff also prepared weekly take away craft kits for toddlers through tweens.

In person indoor programming resumed with our Summer Reading Club and continued indoors with 161 kids and youth (ages 3 to 14) attending weekly programs. Activities included many science experiments, Popsicle stick bridge competitions, crafts, prizes and lots of reading. Special guests, Circle of Indigenous Nations Society, children’s author Kathy Sager and Wildsafe BC contributed to the fun.

A to Z Toddler Time welcomes those 18 months to 2 years and storytime for preschool children includes children who are 3 to 5. Each program promotes literacy, early learning, community connection and develops creativity and fine motor skills through arts and crafts.

<p>Advancing citizen engagement</p> <p>Literacy programs bring families into our space fostering an early connection with the library and all of the resources it has to offer. Library programs are free and open to all members of the community.</p>
<p>What are the key outcomes of this project/program?</p> <p>In 2022 our library had 127 individual children's programs with 1,135 attendees. 161 individual children and youth registered for our Summer Reading Program.</p> <p>Library card registrations spike during our summer months as kids join our Summer Reading Club. In 2022, registrations doubled in June (81) and July (94) from previous months.</p> <p>We see families begin with toddler storytime and continue with library programs throughout their early years and into the school years. We watch children grow through our programs over years and for us that is success.</p>
<p>Did provincial grants enable this project/program? If so, how?</p> <p>No. Two federal government grants, Young Canada Works and Canada Summer Jobs funds provide wages for our two summer student hires.</p>

<p>Project/Program Name</p> <p>Reading Buddies</p>

Children strengthen their reading skills while teens earn volunteer hours for graduation while gaining valuable experience. Over the course of the program, the teens and kids build a nice rapport with each other by reading and playing word games for one hour each week.</p>

Advancing citizen engagement

This program brings children and youth together for learning opportunities. It builds a connection with the library and all of the resources it has to offer. Youth have an opportunity for rewarding volunteer experience and children improve their reading skills which gives them confidence in the classroom.

Reading Buddies strengthens the reading skills of children in our community and gives high school students valuable experience and volunteer hours needed for graduation. Over the course of our first series of sessions, the Children/Youth Librarian watched relationships develop as the Buddies became more comfortable with each other. Teenage volunteers are returning for another session, which indicates they are finding the program a rewarding experience. Parents report an improvement in reading skills and an eagerness for kids to return to the program in the coming weeks.

Our staff computers are old enough for us not to really know how old they are! We applied for a Non-Profit Technology Grant through the Columbia Basin Trust (CBT). The grant "supports the acquisition of technology to increase efficiency and effectiveness of non-profits. We received enough money to replace five staff computers and monitors as well as our two circulation computers and monitors. The CBT provided 5,352 towards this project and the Library 1,500.

In 2022, our library submitted an Expression of Interest (EOI) for a Non-Profit Sustainability Building Program grant through the Columbia Basin Trust. The grant offers financial supports to non-profits for energy saving upgrades. The engineer assessing our library recommended LED lighting throughout our building as well as a solar PV array to reduce our energy costs.

According to the completed review of our building, the library will reduce its electricity consumption by 40% with new LED lighting and produce an average of 19,500 kWh hours of energy with a Solar PV Array. These improvements will save the library \$3,310 annually and reduce our building's impact on the environment.

<p>The lendable Launchpads give kids an opportunity to learn from a tablet without the need for an internet connection at home. The tablets are easy to use and preloaded with content making them a safe learning option. With many subjects to choose from, children can build essential skills while having lots of fun.</p> <p>The addition of new titles caused excitement among our families. Our initial collection of 18 tablets have circulated 213 times. The new titles were added to our catalogue in late 2022. We now have 33.</p>

COVID-19 (e.g., safety protocols, proof of vaccination)	Until all of the mandates came off last year, our staff continued to feel a level of stress within our workplace because of the pandemic. Enforcement of mask mandates amid the trucker convoy was tense at times
Emergency response (e.g., fires, floods, extreme weather)	Although very hot at times throughout the summer, our region thankfully did not experience any extreme weather emergencies in 2022.
Financial pressure (e.g., rising costs, reduced revenues)	We increasingly try to balance library operations, programming and serving our patrons with the number of staff we can afford for the number of hours we are open.

Staffing (e.g., recruitment and retention, mental health, and wellness)	Due to funding limitations, our library does not have a full-time staff member dedicated to work our service desk. Current staff share desk duties and can work from 10 to 18 hours a week at the service desk while managing administration, programing and technical services within a 35 hour work week.
Disappearing services in the community (e.g., government, banking, health)	Government of Canada services are located in Trail and Nelson so residents of Castlegar have to travel outside of our community.
Connectivity (e.g., low bandwidth, lack of home internet in the community)	This year we increased our bandwidth to 1 Gbps. At times, we find the internet painfully slow. We are updating all of our staff computers this winter and hope that the combination of new computers and faster internet will be a winning combination.
Aging/damaged facilities (e.g., need for repairs, renovations, upgrades/expansions)	Our library needs a modern refresh. A new roof and HVAC system slated for completion last year met with delays due to a shortage of materials. We are seeing a lot of wear and tear inside our library in terms of carpet, paint and bathrooms.
