Noisy Creek Recreation Site Campground



Campsite Information

Noisy Recreation Site is a scenic, drive-in remote campground offering a memorable experience for families and visitors of all ages. The site offers a shady camping area on hot days, along with excellent opportunities for swimming and boating. Locals and visitors alike enjoy fishing, birdwatching, and wildlife viewing in the area. The campground also serves as an ideal base for ORV users to explore the area and nearby small fishing lakes.

Background:

Noisy Lake Recreation Site is located 55km southeast of Enderby, accessed via Highway 97 and the Kingfisher Forest Service Road. From there, it is an additional 20.3 km along the Forest Service Road to Noisy Creek Campground. The site can also be accessed via from Highway 1 west of Revelstoke via the Wap Forest Service Road, connecting to the Kingfisher route. This large, fee-for-service recreation site is managed through a partnership agreement with Recreation Sites and Trails BC. It is especially busy during the summer months, attracting visitors from across British Columbia and other provinces.

Facilities:

Noisy Creek Recreation Site has:

- 60 campsites
- 60 picnic tables
- 60 fire rings
- 60 number posts
- 12 outhouses
- 1 boat launch
- 2 kiosks
- 1 wharf
- Miscellaneous signage

Scope

Term: The term of the agreement would begin with 1 year (season), with the option to extend for additional years after a successful season.

Operating Season: May 1st – September 30th

Fees: Camping fees are collected May 1st – September 30th annually. All money collected through user fees must be used to cover the costs of providing services at the site, and those services must directly benefit the people who pay the fees. Daily camping fee is set at \$18.00/party or \$9.00/party for seniors 65+ and people with disabilities.

Service Requirements:

The Site Operator's responsibilities will include but are not limited to the following:

Visitor Services

- Provide on-site supervision for safety and maintenance when camping permits are required.
- Interact with visitors: collect fees, explain site rules, and provide information.
- Provide public service and outreach to enhance visitor experience.

Site Maintenance

- Maintain and repair facilities, including early-season cleanup after winter.
- Clean and sanitize toilets daily; pump toilets as needed.
- Perform general upkeep: mowing, weed whacking, raking, garbage disposal, painting.
- Remove cold ashes and dispose of them at a regional dump site.
- Ensure signs are in good repair and maintained.
- Remove non-standard structures from campsites.
- Improve site conditions while following Recreation Sites and Trails BC standards.

Safety and Compliance

- Identify and address hazards, report incidents and accidents to Recreation Sites and Trails BC.

- Communicate with enforcement agencies (RCMP, Conservation Officers, Natural Resource Officers) and report conflicts with people or wildlife.

Administration

- Report regularly to the District Recreation Officer/Recreation Technician on visitor use, finances, and projects.
- Keep records of permits sold and provide annual reports to Recreation Sites and Trails BC.
- Prepare a seasonal report and work plan for approval by Recreation Sites and Trails BC.
